





# PROJECT UPDATE SANTA ANA COLLEGE CENTRAL PLANT AND INFRASTRUCTURE

### **Project Summary:**

- Construction of a new central plant building and replacement of all underground utilities (domestic water, sewer, fire water, storm drain, gas, electric and data).
- Central Plant facts:
  - Reduces electrical loads during peak demand periods.
  - Has a chilled water loop, connecting 7 existing buildings to the HVAC equipment to provide cooling.
  - Includes a new Energy Management System (EMS) to be able to control building temperatures and monitor system remotely.
  - Building is designed to meet LEED Silver certification.

### **Budget:**

▶ \$68.17 million





# PROJECT UPDATE SANTA ANA COLLEGE CENTRAL PLANT AND INFRASTRUCTURE

### **Current Activities:**

- Install and test piping for chilled water (phase 2)
- Install, backfill and inspect storm and sewer manholes at Middle College Road (phase 2).
- Hydronic pipe testing and inspection (phase
   I Lot 6/Campus Road)



### **Upcoming Activities:**

- Install and test piping for storm drain, sewer, domestic water and fresh water (phase 3A.3).
- Install chilled water and gas (west of phase 2).
- Install foundation rebar at Central Plant
- Concrete pour footings at Central Plant

### **Current Status:**

- The project is approximately 2 months behind the original target schedule.
- There have been numerous unforeseen conditions encountered.
- A recent softball field irrigation valve failed to turn off overnight and flooded the new Central Plant footings and will need to be redone, as concrete pour work has been delayed.
- The impact to the schedule is still TBD.



#### **Project updates:**

#### Discussion points:

Discussion took place regarding the trees being removed from the central mall in preparation of the utility infrastructure and landscape/hardscape redesign. It was noted that current trees are very old, many diseased, most inappropriately trimmed in the past....which has led to safety concerns. **Discussion:** Ms. Matsumoto provided the committee with an overview of the following projects: Active SAC projects:

#### Measure E:

- Chavez Hall Renovation Geotechnical investigation underway on humidity levels and working on developing a remediation plan for the building to reduce the humidity. There is no immediate health and safety issue.
- Temporary Village, Phase II Village reconfiguration underway to accommodate the Johnson Center staff.
- Bristol Street Sidewalk Improvement This is a new project to complete the work that
  was originally part of the previous site perimeter improvement project, including the
  removal and replacement of the sidewalk on Bristol Street between 17<sup>th</sup> and Washington
  Streets.
- Orange Education Center Building Certification \$34.6 million is the target budget, \$30.43 has been allocated, still short \$4.23 as of today. Project is in design development phase. Target construction is January 2018, it has been rumored that move in would happen in 2018-19, that is not possible, just a rumor. The OEC Project Update from the November 9, 2015 presentation to the Board of Trustees is attached as information.
- U Portables Certification Programming has been completed and currently out to bid. This project includes ADA upgrades, restroom improvements and fire, life and safety upgrades. It was never intended to keep these portables this long, therefore, we now need to bring them up to code.
- Aquatics Building Exterior Bleachers Architects continue working on coordinating with the bleacher consultant to develop construction details. DSA submittal in March and anticipated installation in June 2016.

#### Measure Q:

- Central Plant and Infrastructure Some delays already. Continuing the installation of the temporary fencing, demolition and export, installation of domestic water lines and layout. Chilled water piping fabrication is causing a delay. Fencing will be going up near Phillips Hall and hopefully the project will make up some time in phase III.
- Johnson Center Program document is finalized and has been approved by the Campus and the District, preliminary schematic design phase has begun. Budget of \$40.7 million with \$35.07 million funded by Measure Q, deficient \$5.64 million

- Johnson Center and Building J Demolition Building needs to be decommissioned in the summer of 2016 and will be used as a staging center until demolished.
- SAC Science Center The design development package is due in March with DSA approval target of September 2017.
- Parking Lot at 17<sup>th</sup> and Bristol Streets Meeting with the City of Santa Ana next week as they are trying to make a zone change, the City doesn't want a parking lot on the corner they want retail in that space. The project construction schedule is being re-evaluated.

Project Budget History – This is a new document that provides history on projects from initial start up to what the current estimated total project budget is. This document will be updated and budget modifications noted.

Also included is a list of scheduled maintenance projects including project budgets, completed projects at the colleges, Prop 39 projects and District Office projects.

ADA Upgrades – The \$500,000 is just for minor upgrades for the path of travel repairs in parking lot I adjacent to the U portables, parking lot 6 and switchback near the Aquatics Center. The list of upgrades for the SCC campus is in the \$25 million ballpark. The District does **not** have any funding for this obligation that is court ordered. This work must be completed within a specific timeframe, however, there aren't funds available for this work at SCC. Please share this with your constituent groups and that funds need to be identified.

**Agenda Item:** Sustainability Plan
