Pathways of Student Persistence and Performance



Introduction

The RSCCD Research Department publishes this report annually which shows students' semester-to-semester persistence and course completion rates.

There were 2,030 first-time freshmen enrolled in classes at Santiago Canyon College in Fall 2014 (end of term). This group, or "cohort," was tracked to subsequent semesters (active third week of class), resulting in a calculated persistence rate. Persistence rates are displayed by ethnicity and by educational goal.

The course success section of this study includes performance in the classroom. The proportion of enrollments in apprenticeship has, historically, contributed significantly to the number of grades received at SCC. Separating this group will provide a more accurate snapshot of course success for students in both apprenticeship and the traditional college program.

The purpose of this report is to identify trends over time. Typically, there are relatively few significant changes. Observed changes are usually gradual and result from shifting composition of the student population, shifting economic conditions, and/or changing program offerings. The addition or expansion of programs can cause fluctuations in student demographics and educational goal distributions of the student population and, therefore, can also cause changes in persistence rates (proportion of students persisting to the next semester) and course success rates.

Summary

Persistence

- Second semester persistence rate for Fall 2014 first-time freshmen dropped one percentage point from last year's cohort (72% from 71%). Changes in persistence rates varied across all cohorts.
 - o Third, fourth and fifth semester persistence rates increased slightly (61% from 58%, 56% from 53%, and 42% from 40% respectively),
 - o Sixth semester persistence rates held steady at 35%, but
 - o Seventh and eighth semester rates fell slightly (24% from 28% and 19% from 24% respectively).
- ➤ Second semester persistence rates for African-American students increased by three percentage points, while those for Latino and Asian students dropped one percentage point each. White students maintain a persistence rate of 73%. The historically high variance in rates for African-American students is largely due to the very small cohort size.
- Degree-directed students (declaring educational goals of earning an AA/AS degree and/or transferring to a four-year university) comprise nearly three-quarters (72%) of the Fall 2014 first-time freshman cohort continuing a steady upward trend over the last decade (66% to 78%).
 - o Similarly, degree-directed student persistence to the second semester has risen steadily over prior years' cohorts (85% to 88%) and significantly exceeds first-time freshmen persistence at large (66% to 78%).

Course Success

- > SCC course success rate, overall, remains constant since Fall 2012 at 69%.
- ➤ The proportion of enrollments in the apprenticeship program (for the purposes of this report, apprenticeships are identified using subject area) has, historically, contributed significantly to the number of grades received at SCC (comprising nearly one-fifth of total enrollments in Fall 2011). That proportion, however, has declined significantly; it is currently eight percent of SCC enrollments.
 - O Apprenticeship students usually succeed at high rates (96% to 97%), and the Fall 2014 success rate of 96% was no exception. Separating this group from the total results ensures a more accurate snapshot of course success for both apprenticeship and traditional college coursework.
- ➤ Course success rate in traditional college coursework, non-apprenticeship, remained constant at 67%.
 - The five subjects with highest success rates include: Public Works (95%),
 Library Studies (92%), Nutrition and Surveying (88% each), and Ethnic Studies (87%).


Persistence

Overall Persistence

- ➤ The college has not had the high persistence rate it had in Fall 2010 (at 78% to a 2nd semester); however, it has held steady since Fall 2012 (71% to 72%). Changes in persistence rates varied across all cohorts.
- ➤ Second semester persistence rate for Fall 2014 first-time freshmen dropped one percentage point from last year's cohort (72% from 71%).
- ➤ Third, fourth and fifth semester persistence rates increased slightly (61% from 58%, 56% from 53%, and 42% from 40% respectively).
- > Sixth semester persistence rates held steady at 35%.
- ➤ Seventh and eighth semester rates fell slightly (24% from 28% and 19% from 24% respectively).


Persistence by Ethnicity


Though it is important to disaggregate persistence data by ethnicity, it should be used cautiously as not all groups have the same number of students. The historically high variance in rates for African-American students is largely due to the very small cohort size.

- ➤ Second semester persistence rates for African-American students increased by three percentage points from 63% to 66%. This rates has bounced from a low of 36% to a high of 74% in the last five years.
- Asian students usually persist at the highest rates (85% to 92%), and held steady at 88% in Fall 2014.
- Latino, the largest group of students, also maintained high persistence rates (68% to 80% for the last five years) at 70% (two percentage point drop from last year).
- ➤ Whites have maintained a persistence rate of 73% for the last two years.






Persistence by Educational Goal

- ➤ Degree-directed students (declaring educational goals of earning an AA/AS degree and/or transferring to a four-year university) comprise nearly three-quarters of the Fall 2014 first-time freshman cohort (72%).
- ➤ Similarly, degree-directed student second semester persistence has risen steadily (85% to 88% for the last five years) and is at 87% (one percentage point higher) in Fall 2014.
- Persistence to subsequent semesters increased from prior year until seventh and eighth semesters where there is a drop (three and five percentage points respectively). This is not necessarily a bad indicator as we hope students have completed their goals at SCC and continued onto the universities and/or to the workplace.

Course Success

Success in Apprenticeship

- ➤ The proportion of enrollments in the Apprenticeship program (for the purposes of this report, apprenticeships are identified using subject area) has, historically, contributed significantly to the number of grades received at SCC (comprising about one-fifth of total enrollments in Fall 2011). That proportion, however, has declined significantly in recent years; apprenticeships contribute eight percent of Fall 2014 enrollments.
- Students traditionally succeed in apprenticeship coursework at high rates (96% to 97%) and the Fall 2014 rate (96%) was no exception. Separating this non-traditional group from the total results is a more accurate snapshot of course success for both apprenticeship and non-apprenticeship.


Success in General College Coursework (Non-Apprenticeship)

- The Fall 2014 success rate in Non-Apprenticeship classes remained constant at 67%, as did the course success rate in all classes (69%).
 - o The subjects with highest success rates include: Public Works (95%), Library Studies (92%), Nutrition and Surveying (88% each), and Ethnic Studies (87%).
