**RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT
EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATOR EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT**

1. **Parties.** The Rancho Santiago Community College District ("District"), on the one hand, and Corine Doughty ("Administrator"), on the other hand, hereby enter into this Educational Administrator Employment Agreement ("Agreement") pursuant to sub-section "a" of Section 72411 of the *Education Code*. District and Administrator are referred to herein individually as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."

2. **Position.** District hereby employs Administrator in the position of Dean of Business and Career Technical Education Division ("Position"). Administrator is an "academic employee" as defined in sub-section "a" of Section 87001 of the *Education Code*, is an "educational administrator" as defined in sub-section "b" of Section 87002 of the *Education Code*, and is a "management employee" as defined in sub-section "g" of Section 3540.1 of the *Government Code*.

3. **Term.** District agrees to employ Administrator, and Administrator agrees to serve in the Position, for the period commencing September 19, 2011 and ending June 30, 2013. If, prior to June 30 of any other year other than the last year of this Agreement the District does not send or deliver a written notice to Administrator that this Agreement shall not be extended for an additional year, then this Agreement automatically shall be extended for one more year. This provision shall not be interpreted in any way to authorize any extended Agreement to be for a term of more than two years. Any notice of non-reemployment in the position must be given by the District at least six (6) months in advance of the date of termination of this Agreement.

4. **General Terms and Conditions of Employment.** This Agreement is subject to all applicable laws of the State of California, the regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the rules, regulations, policies, and procedures of the District. These laws, rules, regulations, policies, and procedures, which may be amended, augmented, or repealed from time-to-time, are incorporated into this Agreement.

5. **Duties and Responsibilities.** Administrator agrees to perform all of the duties, and accepts all of the responsibilities, as specified in the job description for the Position, and all duties and responsibilities which may be delegated or assigned to Administrator by the Board of Trustees, the Chancellor, or any supervising administrators. Administrator is expected to devote full efforts and energies to the Position. At any time during the term of this Agreement, the Board of Trustees may adopt or amend the job description for the Position. Administrator may undertake outside professional activities, including consulting, speaking, and writing, either with or without compensation, provided that such activities do not impair the effectiveness of Administrator or interfere with Administrator's duties. In those cases in which Administrator engages in outside professional activities which generate compensation for services provided, Administrator shall utilize vacation days.

6. **Transfer, Reassignment, or Title Change.** The Chancellor, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, may transfer or reassign Administrator to any position within the

District for which Administrator is qualified, and may change the title of the Position, during the term of this Agreement, but there shall be no loss of compensation by Administrator due to such discretionary transfer, reassignment, or title change.

7. **Salary.** District shall pay an annual salary to Administrator in the amount of \$118,188 per academic year (July 1 through June 30), pro-rated if less than a full academic year, paid on a monthly basis. District reserves the right to increase the salary of Administrator during the term of this Agreement, but any such increase shall not be construed as an indication that this Agreement will be renewed or extended. Administrator agrees that District also reserves the right to decrease the salary of Administrator during the term of this Agreement as long as such decrease, on a percentage basis, is no more than what is implemented on a general basis for regular, full-time faculty of the District. Administrator is an exempt employee and is not eligible for overtime pay or compensatory time off.

8. **Work Year.** Administrator is a full-time employee of the District with a work year of 12 months per year. Administrator is entitled to be absent during District-designated holidays.

9. **Health and Welfare Benefits.** District shall provide Administrator with the same health and welfare benefits as currently approved or as subsequently modified by the Board of Trustees for all District administrators.

10. **Vacation.** Administrator shall accrue two and one-quarter vacation days for each month of service. Administrator may not accumulate more than 54 days of unused vacation as of July 1 of any academic year.

11. **Leaves.** Administrator shall be entitled to leaves of absence as provided by law or Board Policy, as may be amended from time-to-time.

12. **Teaching Assignments.** Subject to Board approval, and presuming that Administrator meets minimum qualifications, Administrator may serve as an instructor in no more than one class per semester for additional compensation, provided that such teaching does not impair Administrator's service in the Position.

13. **Professional Meetings and Activities.** Prior approval by the Chancellor shall be obtained for Administrator to attend any meeting or activity related to Administrator's employment in the Position. The reasonable and necessary expenses of attendance by Administrator at such a meeting or activity shall be paid by District only if approved by the Chancellor and the Board of Trustees.

14. **Evaluation.** Administrator shall be evaluated in writing at any time by Administrator's immediate supervisor, pursuant to Board Policy and procedures, utilizing established goals and objectives, self-assessments, the job description for the Position, and input from other employees.

15. **Retreat Rights.** If Administrator's first date of paid service was prior to July 1, 1990, Administrator's rights to faculty tenure are governed by the laws of the State of California in effect as of June 30, 1990. The retreat rights for Administrator, if hired on or after July 1, 1990, and if Administrator does not have faculty tenure in the District, shall be in accordance

with Section 87458 of the *Education Code*. Administrator has the responsibility to present the necessary transcripts and materials to District pursuant to Board policy and procedures in order to maintain any current faculty service area or acquire faculty service areas.

16. **Return to Tenured Faculty Position.** If Administrator has tenure in the District, and if Administrator has not been dismissed pursuant to Section 20 of this Agreement, then Administrator will be entitled to return to a tenured faculty position upon termination or expiration of this Agreement.

17. **Dismissal or Imposition of Penalties During the Term of this Agreement.** Pursuant to Section 72411.5 of the *Education Code*, if Administrator does not have faculty tenure in the District, then the grounds for dismissal or for imposition of penalties on Administrator during the term of this Agreement shall be dishonesty, insubordination, incompetence, unsatisfactory performance, unprofessional conduct, inability to perform, persistent or serious violation of law or of Board Policy or procedures, or any material and substantial breach of this Agreement. Administrator shall be entitled to due process protections as required by law.

18. **Dismissal or Imposition of Penalties During the Term of this Agreement If Tenured.** Pursuant to Section 72411.5 of the *Education Code*, if Administrator has faculty tenure in the District, then the grounds for dismissal or for imposition of penalties on Administrator during the term of this Agreement shall be in accordance with the statutory provisions applicable to tenured faculty members as set forth in Section 87732 of the *Education Code*. Administrator shall be entitled to due process protections as required by law.

19. **Resignation.** Administrator may resign from District employment at any time during the term of this Agreement upon 90 days prior written notice to the Board of Trustees, or upon a shorter period of time as may be approved by the Board of Trustees.

20. **Buy-Out of Agreement.** Pursuant to Section 53260 of the *Government Code*, except if District terminates this Agreement pursuant to Sections 19 or 20 of this Agreement, the maximum cash settlement that Administrator may receive shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of Administrator multiplied by the number of months left on the unexpired term of this Agreement. However, if the unexpired term of this Agreement is greater than 18 months, the maximum cash settlement shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of Administrator multiplied by 18. Any cash settlement shall not include any other non-cash items except health benefits which may be continued for the same duration of time as covered in the settlement or until Administrator finds other employment, whichever comes first. If the unexpired term is greater than 18 months, then the maximum time for continued health benefits paid for by District shall be 18 months.

21. **Medical Examination.** Upon request of the Board of Trustees or the Chancellor, Administrator agrees to undergo a comprehensive physical and/or psychiatric examination to determine if Administrator is able, with or without reasonable accommodation, to perform the essential functions of the Position. The costs of any such examination shall be paid for by District. A confidential written report regarding any such examination shall be filed with the Board of Trustees or the Chancellor indicating whether Administrator is able, with or without reasonable accommodation, to perform the essential functions of the Position.

22. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is ruled to be contrary to law, all other provisions of this Agreement shall continue to remain in full force and effect.

23. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties. There are no terms, conditions, or oral understandings not contained in this Agreement.

24. **Amendment.** This Agreement may be modified or superseded only by a written amendment executed by both Parties.

25. **Mandatory Mediation and Arbitration.** Except as otherwise prohibited by law, the Parties agree that any dispute, claim, or controversy arising out of the Parties' employment relationship, including, but not limited to, alleged violations of federal, state, or local statutes, including those prohibiting harassment and discrimination, and any other claims, including alleged violations of any provisions of the *Education Code*, which cannot be resolved through informal and confidential discussions, shall be submitted to mediation, and if mediation is unsuccessful, to binding arbitration before a neutral Arbitrator. The mediator and any necessary Arbitrator shall be selected through Judicial Arbitration & Mediation Services/Endispute (JAMS). Attachment "A" to this Agreement sets forth the procedures to be utilized and is hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement as if fully set forth within. The Parties agree that they have carefully read Attachment "A," knowingly agree to all of its contents, and knowingly agree to the covenant to mediate and arbitrate all employment disputes contained in Attachment "A".

26. **Ratification.** The Parties agree that this Agreement is not binding or enforceable unless and until it is duly ratified by the Board of Trustees.

EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATOR EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT**

1. **Parties.** The Rancho Santiago Community College District ("District"), on the one hand, and John Finch ("Administrator"), on the other hand, hereby enter into this Educational Administrator Employment Agreement ("Agreement") pursuant to sub-section "a" of Section 72411 of the *Education Code*. STANDARD CLINICAL AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

This standard Clinical Affiliation Agreement (the “Agreement”) is made and entered into between the Rancho Santiago Community College District, a public educational agency (“District”) located at 2323 North Broadway, Santa Ana, California and Companion Hospice (“Clinical Facility”), located at 2041 Orangewood Avenue, Orange, California.

WHEREAS, District and Clinical Facility desire to contribute to community health education;

WHEREAS, District operates Santa Ana College (“College”) and College is a duly accredited educational institution that conducts Nursing/Health Sciences program(s) (the “Program”);

WHEREAS, District has obtained all necessary licenses, consents and/or approvals to conduct the Program from the State of California and any other applicable government agency;

WHEREAS, Clinical Facility operates a duly licensed health care agency at the address listed above and has obtained all necessary licenses, consents, and approvals;

WHEREAS, as part of the Program, students are required to participate in a clinical experience rotation;

WHEREAS, District desires to affiliate with the Clinical Facility in order that students may participate in a clinical experience rotation at the Clinical Facility; and

WHEREAS, District and Clinical Facility desire to enter into this Agreement to memorialize their respective rights, duties, and obligations with respect to the clinical experience rotation of students of the College’s Program.

For purposes of this Agreement, the following definitions shall apply:

“District” shall refer to the Rancho Santiago Community College District, its member Colleges, the District’s Governing Board, and each of their trustees, employees, agents, representatives, successors and assigns;

“College” shall refer to Santa Ana College, and each of its employees, agents, representatives and assigns;

“Clinical Facility” shall refer to Companion Hospice, its parents, subsidiaries, related companies, and each of their officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, successors, and assigns;

The “Program” shall refer to the Clinical training in health science programs; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the following covenants, conditions and agreements, the parties hereto agree as follows:

TERMS

1. Clinical Experience Rotation. Clinical Facility agrees to provide students of the Program who are specified by College with a clinical experience rotation (“Rotation”), in accordance with standards established by governmental agencies and recognized professional accrediting agencies, and subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
2. Development of Curriculum. College shall be fully responsible for the development, planning, and administration of the program, including, without limitation, programming, administration, matriculation, promotion and graduation. College acknowledges and agrees that the Rotation is intended to meet certain educational performance objectives, and College shall provide a copy of such performance objectives to Clinical Facility on or before student placement. Clinical Facility shall be fully responsible for the availability and appropriateness of the learning environment in relation to the program’s written objectives.
3. Exposure to Bloodborne Pathogens. Program students and college faculty will comply with the final regulations issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration governing employee exposure to bloodborne pathogens in the workplace under Section VI(b) of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, which regulations became effective March 6, 1992 (the “Regulations”), including but not limited to responsibility as the employer to provide all program students with (a) information and training about the hazards associated with blood and other potentially infectious materials, (b) information and training about the protective measures to be taken to minimize the risk of occupational exposure to bloodborne pathogens, (c) training in the appropriate actions to take in an emergency involving exposure to blood and other potentially infectious materials, and (d) information as to the reasons the program student should participate in hepatitis B vaccination and post-exposure evaluation and follow-up.
4. Applicable Procedure: Acceptance. College agrees to provide Clinical Facility with a list of the name(s) of students who will be participating in a rotation.
5. Nondiscrimination. The parties agree not to discriminate in the selection, placement or evaluation of any student or faculty member because of race, creed, national origin, religion, sex, marital status, age, handicap, and/or medical condition. The Rancho Santiago Community College District complies with all Federal and state rules and regulations and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender or disability. This holds true for all students who are interested in participating in educational programs and/or extracurricular school activities. Harassment of any employee/student with regard to race, color, national origin, gender or disability is strictly prohibited. Inquiries regarding compliance and/or grievance procedures may be directed to District’s Title IX Officer and/or Section 504/ADA Coordinator.
6. Academic Year. The academic year consists of Fall, and Spring semesters, Summer session and Winter break intersession.

7. Rotation Schedule. The rotation schedule shall be determined by College and Clinical Facility and may be amended from time to time by agreement of the parties. The number of students in each rotation shall be limited to a number mutually agreed upon by both parties, not to exceed the number specified by the accrediting agency(s).
8. Orientation. Clinical Facility and College shall provide an orientation for assigned students participating in each rotation.
9. Compliance with Clinical Facility Rules. Clinical Facility shall make available all applicable governing instruments, policies and procedures, rules and regulations of Clinical Facility to each student participating in a rotation, and student shall comply with these rules.

In providing the students with the clinical rotation that is the subject of this Agreement, Clinical Facility shall comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulations, statutes, policies, procedures, and ordinances and shall be consistent with the professional standards of a health care agency.

10. Confidentiality of Patient Records. Students and faculty understand and agree that Clinical Facility's patient files are confidential.
11. Clinical Coordinator (College). College agrees to designate a coordinator for each program. The coordinator, who may be an academic instructor, shall be responsible for all teaching activities.
12. Clinical Advisor (Clinical Facility). Clinical Facility agrees to designate a clinical advisor or coordinator who shall provide input to the clinical performance and evaluation of student(s), be a resource person for College's faculty and students, and shall communicate with the clinical coordinator designated by College regarding the proposed curriculum and the performance of individual students and shall arrange formal orientation to the facility for the faculty and students.
13. Supervision of Students. The supervision and direction of students while on site at Clinical Facility shall be the responsibility of the Clinical Coordinator (College) or designee as guided by the instructional objectives. No direct, hands-on patient care shall be provided by participating students at Clinical Facility, except in accordance with all applicable laws, Clinical Facility and Medical Staff rules, regulations, policies and procedures. District recognizes the patients' rights to refuse care provided by a student at Clinical Facility.
14. Removal of Students. Clinical Facility retains the right to exclude any student at any time from any clinical area. Any student who is asked to leave by Clinical Facility shall do so promptly and without protest. Clinical Facility shall also have the right, at any time, to request College to remove a student permanently from the rotation. Except as otherwise proved under any approachable policies, procedures, rules, regulations, and/or under any law, any such removal shall not require compliance with any notice, hearing or other procedural requirements.

15. Patient Care. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as conferring any right or duty upon College, its students or faculty members, to control or direct patient care or operations at Clinical Facility. Clinical Facility shall maintain sole responsibility and accountability for patient care and shall provide adequate staffing in number and competency to ensure safe and continuous health care during the term of this Agreement.
16. Student Evaluation. In the case of direct supervision of the students by the Clinical Instructor (College), he/she shall be responsible for student(s) evaluation. Unless otherwise mutually agreed between the Clinical Coordinator (College) and the Clinical Advisor (Clinical Facility), Clinical Facility may be responsible for submitting input to the Clinical Coordinator evaluating and appropriately documenting the performance of each student in the clinical rotation. The appropriate forms shall be provided by the Clinical Coordinator. Nothing herein shall be construed as a guarantee by or obligation of Clinical Facility regarding the performance of any student during the rotation. College shall keep records on the progress and evaluation of each student's clinical experience during a rotation for a period of three (3) years following the end of the specific rotation in which the student is involved.
17. Ongoing Communication. College has the privilege of regularly scheduled meetings with Clinical Facility staff, including both selected unit personnel and administrative level representatives for the purpose of interpreting, discussing, and evaluating College's health care programs at a mutually agreed upon time.
18. Materials. College agrees to provide students with all educational material required during the clinical program.
19. Medical Library. Clinical Facility agrees to provide students with access to the Medical Library during its normal business hours.
20. No Payments or Other Remuneration. College agrees that no fees or monetary payments of any kind shall be exchanged between Clinical Facility, its agents and employees, and College, its agents, employees and students under the terms of this Agreement. Further, neither College, its staff members, nor other representatives, shall attempt to bill or collect from any patient or from any other source fees for services provided to patients by said student.

The only exception shall be when Clinical Facility and College mutually agree to pay a Clinical Advisor a stipend for duties directly related to College's program.
21. No Right to Employment. The parties agree that the students of College shall not be considered employees, agents or volunteers of Clinical Facility, nor shall any student be entitled to any right, compensation, or other benefits normally afforded to employees of Clinical Facility, including but not limited to, Social Security, unemployment and workers' compensation insurance.
22. Insurance Carried by the District. District shall assure coverage of professional liability insurance for each student participating in the Rotation of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate, and said policy shall remain in full force and effect during the term hereof.

District shall provide workers' compensation coverage for students participating in the rotation. These coverage's are in effect while the student is on-site at Clinical Facility.

23. Insurance Carried by Clinical Facility. Clinical Facility shall secure and maintain comprehensive general liability insurance covering personal injury, property damage, and general liability claims in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate with coverage for incidental contracts. A certificate of insurance must be provided that includes thirty (30) days notice of cancellation, modification, or reduction in said insurance. Clinical Facility shall deliver certificate(s) of insurance under Clinical Facility's comprehensive general liability insurance policy on or before the date of execution of this agreement. Upon request, District shall be provided a copy of said policy. Clinical Facility shall carry professional liability insurance for itself and each of its employee(s), partners, and/or representatives providing professional services at Clinical Facility, except for District's students and College faculty, in the amount of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in the aggregate. Clinical Facility shall provide District with thirty (30) days written notice prior to cancellation, or reduction in said insurance. Upon request, District shall be provided a copy of said policy.

Clinical Facility shall provide workers' compensation coverage for each of its employees.

24. Student Health Records. Any student participating in a rotation shall, at the request of Clinical Facility, provide a current statement from his or her physician that the student is in good health and capable of participating in the rotation. Clinical Facility, upon request, may require that any student returning from an extended absence caused by illness or injury submit to a physical examination or present a statement from a physician indicating that the student is capable of resuming clinical activities. Any such physical examination shall be the financial responsibility of the student.

Any student participating in a rotation shall provide verification of annual T.B. screening, immune status for rubeola, rubella, and chicken pox, hepatitis B (or signed waiver for hepatitis B).

25. Student Medical Care. To the extent that any first aid or emergency care is required in connection with an injury or illness incurred by a student during performance of his/her clinical training during a rotation, the student shall be treated by Clinical Facility as appropriate.
26. Confidentiality of Student Record. Clinical Facility shall keep confidential and shall not disclose to any person or entity (i) student application; (ii) student health records or reports; and/or (iii) any student records as defined in California Education Code Section 76210 and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. paragraph 1232(g), concerning any student participating in the rotation, unless disclosure is authorized by (i) the student in writing, or (ii) disclosure is ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction.

Clinical Facility shall adopt and enforce whatever policies and procedures are necessary to protect the confidentiality of student records as defined herein.

27. Verification. College warrants and represents that it has obtained all necessary approvals and consents from any and all agencies to enable Clinical Facility to offer the rotation to College's students participating in the Program. If requested by Clinical Facility, College will provide Clinical Facility with verification that the Program is duly licensed, duly accredited and/or certified, as applicable, by appropriate agencies. District covenants and agrees that at all times during the term hereof it shall retain such licensure, accreditation and/or certification, and its Program and faculty members shall continue to meet any and all federal, state and local requirements.
28. Indemnification. All parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or non-performance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or intentional acts of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.
29. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and constructed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
30. Assignment. Neither party hereto may assign this Agreement or delegate its duties hereunder without the prior written consent of the other party which can and may be withheld by either party in its sole and absolute discretion.
31. Effective Date Termination. This Agreement shall become effective on September 13, 2011 and shall remain in effect until September 12, 2013 unless sooner terminated by either party in accordance with this section. Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause by giving ninety (90) days prior written notice to the other party of its intention to terminate. In the event a rotation is in progress, any written notice to terminate with or without cause shall become effective at the expiration of the rotation. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event the Program is discontinued by College during its Term, this Agreement shall immediately terminate without further action by the parties hereto.
32. Notices. Any notices to be given hereunder by either party to the other may be effectuated only in writing and delivered either by personal deliver, or by U. S. mail. Mailed notices shall be addressed to the persons at the addresses set forth below, but each party may change the address by written notice in accordance with this paragraph. Notices delivered personally will be deemed communicated as of actual receipt; mailed notices will be deemed communicated as of ten (10) days after mailing.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who have completed coursework at Santa Ana College leading to the Associate Degree and/or Certificate for spring 2011.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College awarded 809 Associate Degrees at the conclusion of the spring 2011 semester, 624 Associate in Arts and 185 Associate in Science. This is up 36 degrees from spring 2010 in which 773 Associate Degrees were conferred. The area that showed significant increase was Liberal Arts. The area that showed the most significant decrease was Paralegal.

Santa Ana College awarded 639 Certificates of Achievement/Accomplishment at the conclusion of the spring 2011 semester. This is up 17 certificates from spring 2010 in which 622 Certificates of Achievement/Accomplishment were conferred. The area with the most significant increase in certificates was the IGETC General Education. This significant increase may be due to the fact that the State Chancellors Office has authorized SAC to issue IGETC certificates.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who successfully completed coursework at Santiago Canyon College leading to an associate degree, certificate of achievement, and/or certificate for spring 2011. Also attached are the statistical tables showing degrees, certificates of achievement, and certificates awarded by major.

ANALYSIS

Santiago Canyon College awarded 400 associate degrees in spring 2011, as compared to 356 in spring 2010. The most significant change was seen in the area of Liberal Arts. With the phasing out of Liberal Arts and Liberal Arts: University Transfer Studies degrees, the numbers in those programs decreased. In the same regard, the numbers in Liberal Arts: Arts, Humanities and Communication increased by 74, Liberal Arts: Mathematics and Sciences increased by 25, and Liberal Arts: Social and Behavioral Sciences increased by 13. Combining all of the Liberal Arts programs, the total number of degrees increased by 33 as compared to spring 2010. Other significant increases were seen in Business Management, History, Political Science, Public Works: Management, Sociology, Water Utility Science: Wastewater/ Environmental Sanitation, and Water Treatment. The most significant decreases were seen in Philosophy and Psychology. Other decreases were seen in Biological Science, Business Administration, Chemistry, Computer Science, Science, Social Science and Water Utility Science: Water Distribution.

Santiago Canyon College awarded 425 certificates of achievement in spring 2011, as compared to 409 in spring 2010. The most significant increases were seen in Accounting, Apprenticeship Surveying: Chainman, CSU and IGETC General Education Breadth, Gemology, Public Works: Management, Real Estate, Sign Language and Water Utility Sciences. Notable decreases were seen in Apprenticeship Electricity: Power Lineman, Cosmetology, and Survey Mapping Sciences: Land Surveying.

A total of 26 certificates were awarded in spring 2011, as compared to 18 in spring 2010. Increases were seen in General Accounting, Human Resource Management and Public Works: Green-Sustainable Building Code. Notable decreases were seen in Cosmetology: Cosmetician.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees ratify the recipients of the associate degrees, certificates of achievement, and certificates for the spring 2011 as presented.

BACKGROUND

HMC Architects has been providing architectural and planning services for the district. HMC is currently assisting the district with updating all district Facilities Master Plans. In the process of assessing facilities conditions for Dunlap Hall at Santa Ana College, it was determined that the classroom building required safety and access improvements. Specifically, the existing concrete guardrails that surround the building on each floor walkway need to be replaced. In addition, for the size of the building and its occupancy rating, an additional elevator is required to comply with ADA access requirements. Based on these necessary building improvements, the Division of State Architect (DSA) will require that all restrooms facilities in the building be upgraded to current access code standards. The DSA may require additional building upgrades, such as seismic, energy efficiency and fire life safety that is not currently included in this scope of work.

ANALYSIS

The HMC Architectural proposal for the project is based on the estimated cost of construction for the renovation. At this time, the estimated construction cost for the Dunlap Hall renovation and upgrades is approximately \$4,500,000. Based on this estimated construction cost, HMC Architects proposes a fee of \$448,000 plus reimbursable expenses.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement with HMC Architects to provide architectural and engineering services as presented.

HMC Architects is pleased to present our Proposal/Agreement to provide safety and access improvements for Dunlap Hall at Santa Ana College. We understand that the following Architectural, Mechanical, Plumbing, and Electrical Design Services will be provided for the replacement of existing concrete guardrails, replacement of the stair handrails, the addition of a new gurney-size elevator, toilet room remodels, and additional Accessibility and Fire-Life Safety upgrades as may be required by code. Structural Engineering for this work will be provided under a separate agreement between the Structural Engineer and the District and incorporated into this project.

The Programming and Schematic Design phases will identify costs, design alternatives, and scope options for the District to establish a specific scope of work and budget and the Design fee for the remaining phases will be adjusted to reflect the approved scope at that time.

A. Scope of Work:

1. Provide Architectural Services to prepare Design options with design studies of new railing configurations, new elevator tower, and toilet room improvements. Up to three (3) options are anticipated for review with the College. Upon selection of a preferred option, drawings of the new design will be prepared showing the new features.
2. The work will be primarily in the elevator, toilet rooms, exterior walks, and stairs including door thresholds and very little work is anticipated inside classrooms and offices.
3. Provide an Assessment of the emergency egress lighting system, fire alarm system, and the capacity of the existing emergency power generator, with a discussion of options for upgrades or replacement.
4. Provide Architectural, Mechanical, Plumbing, and Electrical Services to prepare Construction Documents and Specifications for the selected design option to be submitted to DSA for review and approval. All representation with DSA in order to obtain the required approvals will be provided.
5. Cost Estimates will be provided during the Schematic Design phase in order to compare design options and prior to Bidding to confirm the project budget.

6. Representation during Bidding and Negotiation of the construction contract.
7. Construction Administration for the construction period, assumed to be three (3) months in duration.
8. The construction cost is preliminarily budgeted at \$4,500,000 and the total project cost is preliminarily budgeted at \$6,000,000. The budget will be reevaluated and adjusted along with the Design fee at the end of Schematic Design upon District review and approval of the initial findings, costs, and Design alternatives.

B. Assumptions/Exclusions:

1. All Structural Engineering Design such as the repair of the existing slabs and connections of the new railing, and the elevator tower structure is not included in the scope of this proposal. HMC will coordinate our work with the Structural Engineer retained by RSCCD.
2. DSA plan check fees are to be provided by the District.
3. Soils testing will be provided by the District.
4. DSA may require additional remodel and upgrade work not specified in this proposal such as new toilet facilities outside the existing toilet rooms in Dunlap Hall, parking lot modifications, and site ramps which may require additional fee. Additional work will be presented to the District for approval prior to being executed.
5. While this work will improve the safety and performance of the building it does not bring it to full compliance with current building codes for such items as seismic safety, energy efficiency, and life safety. The District should consider these options.

C. Compensation:

Fee for the Scope of Work listed above shall be a fixed fee of Four Hundred and Forty-eight Thousand Dollars (\$448,000), fee breakdown and approximate duration as follows.

The fee remaining after the Schematic Design phase will be adjusted to reflect any change in project scope upon mutual agreement of the District and HMC.

D. Additional Services:

If Additional Services are required beyond the original Scope of Work, such as services described in Attachment "A", HMC will bill on an hourly basis per Attachment "B", HMC Hourly Rate Schedule, with prior written approval from the District.

E. Reimbursable Expenses:

Reimbursable expenses including costs related to printing, plotting, and delivery charges in the interest of the project are in addition to compensation for Basic and Additional Services. These expenses shall be billed by the Architect to the Owner at one and one tenth (1.10) times the expense incurred by the Architect and Architect's Consultants.

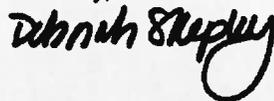

ADDITIONAL SERVICES

The Additional Services described in this Attachment are not included in Basic Services and they shall be paid for by the Owner as provided in this Agreement, in addition to the compensation for Basic Services. Additional Services may only be provided if authorized or confirmed in writing by the Owner and Architect.

Project Representation Beyond Basic Services:

1. **Revisions:** Making revisions in Drawings, Specifications, Project Manual or other documents when such revisions are:
 - a. Inconsistent with approvals or instructions previously given by the Owner;
 - b. Required by the enactment, revised interpretation, jurisdictional differences in interpretation, or revision of codes, laws or regulations subsequent to the preparation of such documents, or additional costs caused by delays resulting from such.
2. **Project Changes:** Providing services required because of changes in the Project including, but not limited to, size, quality, complexity, the Owner's schedule, or the method of bidding or negotiating and contracting for construction.
3. **Change Orders:** Preparing Drawings, Specifications and other documentation, analysis and supporting data, evaluating Contractor's proposals, and providing other services in connection with Change Orders and directives.
4. **Default:** Providing services made necessary by the default or termination of the Contractor, by defects or deficiencies in the Work of the Contractor, or by failure of performance of either the Owner, Contractor or others performing services or providing work on the Project.
5. **Contractor's Submittals:** Reviewing a Contractor's submittal out of sequence from the submittal schedule agreed to by the Architect.
6. **Contractor's RFI:** Responding to the Contractor's requests for information where such information is available to the Contractor from a careful study and comparison of the Contract Documents, field conditions, Contractor-prepared coordination drawings, or prior Project correspondence or documentation.
7. **Claims:** Providing services in connection with claims submitted by Contractor or others.
8. **Hearings, Proceedings:** Providing services in connection with the preparation for, or attendance at, public hearings or other meetings, or legal proceedings, except where the Architect is a party thereto.

Contingent Additional Services

1. **Existing or Other Facilities:** Providing services to investigate facilities or existing conditions or to make measured drawings thereof.
2. **Detailed Estimates:** Providing detailed estimates of Construction Cost.
3. **Providing Other Consultants:** Providing services of consultants, if any other than those specified as Basic Services under this Agreement.
4. **Post Completion/Extended Construction:** Providing services after the original completion date not due to the fault of the Architect/Engineer or after issuance to the Owner of the final Certificate for Payment, or thirty (30) days after the date of Substantial Completion of the Work, whichever is earlier.
5. **Project Hold/Resumption:** If the Project is placed on hold by the Owner for more than 90 days due to circumstances beyond the direct control of the Architect, the schedule shall be adjusted and the Architect's compensation shall be equitably adjusted to provide for expenses incurred in the interruption and resumption of the Architect's services.
6. **Other Additional Services:** Providing any other services not otherwise included in this Agreement.

OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Retainer

An initial payment of zero (-0-) shall be made upon execution of this Agreement and credited to the fee earned at final payment.

Invoicing

The Architect shall invoice its time and reimbursable expenses monthly, and invoices are due and payable upon receipt. Amounts unpaid thirty (30) days after the receipt of the invoice will be subject to a service charge of eighteen percent (18%) per annum, pursuant to Civil Code §3320. Should the Owner fail to pay current invoices for more than sixty (60) days, the Architect may stop work on the Project until payment is received or terminate this Agreement with the Owner. The Architect shall not be held liable for any damages or losses that may result from such suspension or termination of services according to the provisions set forth in this proposal.

The Owner agrees to return disputed invoices within fifteen (15) days of that invoice with a clear description of the nature of the dispute.

Legal Costs

In the event that legal proceedings between the parties are necessary to enforce the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of its litigation costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees.

Project Suspension/Resumption

If the Project is suspended by the Owner for more than thirty (30) consecutive days, the Architect shall be compensated for services performed prior to notice of such suspension. When the Project is resumed, the Architect's compensation shall be equitably adjusted to provide for expenses incurred in the interruption and resumption of the Architect's services. If the project is suspended by the Owner for more than ninety (90) consecutive days, the Architect may terminate the Agreement, by giving not less than seven (7) days written notice.

Termination

Either the Owner or Architect may, for any reason, terminate this Agreement upon not less than seven (7) days written notice to the other party. In the event of termination, the Architect shall be compensated for services performed prior to termination, together with Reimbursable Expenses then due. Termination Expenses are in addition to compensation for Basic and Additional Services and shall be computed as five percent (5%) of the Basic Services and Additional Service Fees.

Owner's Responsibility

The Owner shall provide full information, including a program which sets forth the Owner's objectives, schedule, constraints, and budget, with reasonable contingencies and criteria. The Owner shall also furnish any reports, tests, surveys, permits, inspection or other documentation of information or consultants reasonably requested by the Architect. All of foregoing shall be furnished at the Owner's expense, and the Architect shall be entitled to rely upon the accuracy and completeness thereof.

Ownership of Documents

The Owner acknowledges that the Architect's Drawings, Specifications, Other Documents, Three Dimensional Computer Models and other design models are instruments of professional services. Nevertheless, the Drawings, Specifications, Other Documents, Three Dimensional Computer Models and other design models prepared under this Agreement shall become the property of the Owner upon completion of this Project and upon payment of all amounts due the Architect. The Architect, however,

shall be deemed the author of these documents and shall retain all common law, statutory, and other reserved rights, including the copyright. Should the Owner or any other person, firm or legal entity use, reuse or modify the Architects' Drawings, Specifications, Other Documents, Three Dimensional Computer Models and other design models prepared under this Agreement, for other than the Owner's use and occupancy of the completed Project, the Owner agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold the Architect harmless from and against any and all claims, liabilities, suits, demands, losses, costs, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and all legal expenses and fees incurred on appeal, and all interest thereon, accruing or resulting to any and all persons, firms or any other legal entity, arising out of such use, reuse or modification of the Architect's Drawings, Specifications, Other Documents, Three Dimensional Computer Models or other design models, except where the Architect is found to be solely liable for such damages or losses by a court or forum of competent jurisdiction.

Electronic Files

When requested by Owner, the Architect may transfer documents in electronic file formats to the Owner. The creation of the computer files may be considered an additional service and the Architect shall be compensated on an hourly basis with prior approval of the Owner. By accepting these files/disks and the above stipulations, the Owner agrees to indemnify the Architect, its agents and all consultants against all claims, resulting from the use of these files and the information they contain, by the Owner or their own Consultants, Contractor, Subcontractors, suppliers and all others who receive these files or data. In no event shall the Architect be liable for any loss or profit or any consequential damages as a result of the Clients use or reuse of the electronic files. Owner understands and agrees the Architect relies on various forms of data transmission by an uninterrupted delivery of electrical and telephone service as a means of conducting Architect's business, including the Internet, and that the Internet may be used for intentional and malicious purposes, including transmission of electronic applications commonly referred to as computer "viruses" or "worms". While the Architect endeavors to eliminate the propagation of such applications through its systems and network, the Architect has no control over the actions of third party internet service providers or users of the Internet or similar systems. Consequently, the Owner agrees to waive all claims against the Architect for the propagation of virus applications that may cause damage of any kind to the Owner unless the Architect was the creator of the virus.

Software and Data Exchange Protocols

The Owner and Architect shall, at the earliest practical moment, meet and delineate the types of software to be used on the Project and establish protocols, standards and tolerances as may be required for the proper execution of the Work. The Owner and Architect shall work together to establish the permitted uses for all digital information, including the Model, to be exchanged on the Project. Such determination shall be set forth in the BIM Addendum, or other similar document, that shall be incorporated by reference into all agreements for services or construction of the Project.

Indemnification

The Architect agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to indemnify and hold the Owner harmless from any damage, liability or cost (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of defense) made against the Owner that are ultimately determined by the Court to be caused by and only to the extent of the Architect's negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct in the performance of professional services under this Agreement and the Architect's Consultants or anyone for whom the Architect is legally liable.

The Owner agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to indemnify and hold the Architect harmless from any damage, liability or cost (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of defense) to the extent caused by the Owner's negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct and those of the Owner's contractors, subcontractors, agents, or consultants for anyone for whom the Owner is legally liable, and arising from the Project that is the subject of this Proposal. In the event claims, losses, damages, or expenses are caused by the joint or concurrent negligence of Architect and Owner, they shall be borne by each party in proportion to its negligence. The Architect is not obligated to indemnify the Owner in any manner whatsoever for the Owner's own negligence.

Limitation of Liability

In recognition of the relative risks and benefits of the project to both the Owner and the Architect, the risks have been allocated such that the Owner agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to limit the liability of the Architect and his or her subconsultants to the Owner and to all construction contractors and subcontractors on the project for any and all claims, losses, costs, damages of any nature whatsoever or claims expenses from any cause or causes, so that the total aggregate liability of the Architect and his or her subconsultants to all those named shall not exceed the Architect's total fee for services rendered on this project. Such claims and causes include, but are not limited to negligence, professional errors or omissions, strict liability, breach of contract or warranty.

Insurance

During the term of this Agreement, the Architect agrees to provide evidence of insurance coverage of five million dollars (\$5M). In addition, the Architect agrees to attempt to maintain continuous professional liability coverage for the period of design and construction of this project if such coverage is reasonably available at commercially affordable premiums. The Architect further agrees that the applicable subconsultants will be required to maintain a minimum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) Errors and Omissions coverage. For the purposes of this Agreement "reasonably available" and "commercially affordable" shall mean that more than half the Architect's practicing in this state in this discipline are able to obtain such coverage. Nothing contained in the Agreement or otherwise is intended to create a fiduciary relationship between the parties.

Mediation

In an effort to resolve any conflicts that arise during the design or construction of the Project or following the completion of the Project, the Owner and the Architect agree that all disputes between them arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be submitted to nonbinding mediation unless the parties mutually agree otherwise.

The Owner and the Architect further agree to include a similar mediation provision in all agreements with independent contractors and consultant retained for the Project and require all independent contractors and consultants also to include a similar mediation provision in all agreements with subcontractors, subconsultants, suppliers or fabricators so retained, thereby providing for mediation as the primary method for dispute resolution between the parties to those agreements.

Assignment

Neither party to this Agreement shall transfer, sublet or assign any rights under or interest in this Agreement (including but not limited to monies that are due or monies that may be due) without the prior written consent of the other party.

Hazardous Materials

It is acknowledged by both parties that the Architect's scope of services does not include any services related to asbestos or hazardous or toxic materials. In the event the Architect or any other party encounters asbestos or hazardous or toxic materials or toxic mold at the jobsite, or should it become known in any way that such materials at the jobsite, or any adjacent areas that may affect the performance of the Architect's services, the Architect may, at the Architect's option and without liability for consequential or any other damages, suspend performance of services on the project until the Owner retains appropriate specialist consultant(s) or contractor(s) to identify, abate, and/or remove the asbestos or hazardous or toxic materials, and warrant the jobsite is in full compliance with the applicable laws and regulations.

Consequential Damages

The Architect and the Owner waive consequential damages for claims, disputes or other matters in question arising out of or relating to this Agreement. This mutual waiver is applicable, without limitation, to all consequential damages due to either party's termination.

Third Party Contracts

The Owner shall, upon request of the Architect, supply a copy of the executed Agreement with the Owner's Construction Manager or Project Management Firm, relating to services provided under this Agreement.

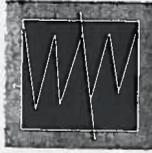

BACKGROUND:

Santa Ana College is prepared to bid several projects with a scope of work that includes the closing of Martha Lane and Fifteenth Street with cul-de-sacs, realignment of College Avenue, new landscaping in and around College Avenue, installation of an enhanced entrance at College Avenue and Seventeenth Street and a new synthetic soccer field.

These projects are scheduled to take approximately 17 months to complete and require the services of a construction management firm to provide general oversight and represent the District with the general contractor.

ANALYSIS:

A Request For Proposals (RFP) was sent to three (3) construction management firms that had a history of providing well respected services to the District. The firms included Bernards, C. W. Driver and Seville Construction Services. Two (2) of the firms responded to the RFP and both firms were interviewed by a committee including representatives of the District’s Facility Planning, District Construction and Support Services Department, a representative from Santa Ana College (Paul Foster) and a consultant with Facility Planning and Program Services (Bob Partridge).

As a result of the interview process, there was unanimous agreement that Bernards and their personnel proposal for this project would best serve Santa Ana College. Due diligence and reference checks were performed for both Bernards and Seville. Again, Bernards was the stronger firm based on these reference checks. Bernards is currently working on Santa Ana College construction projects and is mobilized with an office trailer on campus.

Financially, the proposed cost of services is as follows:

During the course of construction certain changes to the scope of work for this contract were required in order to complete the project. The specific changes, reasons for the changes and cost impacts are noted in the attached Resolution 11-38 as well as Exhibit A.

Resolution 11-38 and Change Order #8 as outlined, increases the contract by \$34,837.54. The cause of the contract's increase above the 10% cap was the need to have the contractor complete the final connections to the floor drains that had been covered up due to Angeles Contracting, Inc. (ACI) over pouring the concrete floor. It should be noted that J.M. Farnan Company, Inc. original cost submittal was \$59,485.00 but was reduced to \$22,300.00, saving the District \$37,185.00. These charges will be back-charged to ACI.

The revised contract amount is \$1,484,789.93. The costs indicated in the change order are considered fair, reasonable and within industry standards by the architect, construction manager and staff. Total combined change orders for the project are 12.895% of construction cost. Pursuant to Administrative Regulation 3504, staff has approved this change order.

The California Regional Water Quality Control Board requires a compliant Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) to be implemented and monitored throughout the construction of the various projects at Santiago Canyon College. The California Regional Water Quality Control Board has required that the District engage the services of a qualified SWPPP practitioner to monitor the project.

ANALYSIS:

To assist in meeting those requirements RBF Consulting will provide Qualified SWPPP Practitioner (QSP) services to the College. RBF Consulting will provide monitoring of the (SWPPP) and conduct weekly inspections, pre-storm event, during and post storm event inspections and quarterly non-stormwater inspections and document these per requirements indentified in the Permit. They will prepare rain event action plans and conduct storm event sampling to show compliance with Numeric Action Levels for pH and turbidity. RBF will identify and explain required corrective actions to ensure that the project is in compliance with the Permit. A proposal for the complete scope of work is attached. The cost is \$81,000.00 work as described and \$1,800.00 for reimbursable expenses. The total amount for the scope of work is \$82,800.00.00.

Scope of Services

1. Document and maintain precipitation forecast information from the National Weather Service Forecast Office per requirements of the Permit.

Deliverable: Daily NOAA weather forecast printout. Forecast will be printed daily at the RBF Irvine office, and placed in the field SWPPP during each weekly inspection at a minimum. RBF will also track rainfall at the site using either an on-site rain gauge or a local weather station.

2. Develop Rain Event Action Plan (REAP) in accordance with the Permit. The REAP is to be modified and documented per requirements of the Permit.

Deliverable: Using the data collected in the daily NOAA forecast, RBF will prepare a Rain Event Action Plan 48 hours prior to each likely storm event (defined as 50% or greater probability of rain). To increase efficiency, the REAP will be developed along with the pre-storm inspection (addressed in item 4 below). All REAP-required actions will be communicated to Seville Construction Services. RBF will provide the information in a timely manner so the REAP can be implemented 24 hours prior to the likely storm event, as required by the Permit. Based on typical precipitation patterns in the area, the estimate is based on the possibility of twelve storm events per wet season. If fewer rain events occur, cost savings will result.

3. Conduct weekly inspections, pre-storm event, during and post storm event inspections and quarterly non-stormwater inspections, and document these per requirements identified in the Permit. RBF will identify and explain required corrective actions to ensure that the project is in compliance with the Permit. QSP will have a closing conference with representatives before leaving the project.

Deliverable: RBF will conduct routine (weekly), storm event triggered (pre, during, post storm) inspections, and quarterly non-stormwater inspections. All inspection forms will be provided electronically via email, and all completed forms will be filed in the field SWPPP. Inspection findings will be accompanied by recommendations for BMP modifications or improved housekeeping measures, and will be clearly communicated both in the inspection paperwork and in the post inspection conference. As required by the permit, RBF will ensure all BMP deficiencies are addressed within 72 hours, and corrections are documented on the inspection form.

4. Conduct storm event sampling to show compliance with Numeric Action Levels for pH and turbidity.

Deliverable: RBF will conduct all required sampling to meet the project's Risk Level 2 requirements. RBF will provide two people and all sampling equipment (pH and turbidity field meters). Sampling will include pH and turbidity monitoring at each site discharge point, on each day of discharge. Additionally, where non-stormwater discharges are noted leaving the site, these will be sampled for pH and turbidity as required by the Permit. As required, RBF can assist with entering monitoring data to SMARTS. Where possible, inspections and sampling will be combined to increase efficiency.

BACKGROUND

The district has used an outside vendor, Judicial Data Systems (JDS), to process, manage and collect fines resulting from parking citations issued at SAC and SCC for more than 23 years. Outsourcing this function has been the most cost effective way because the seasonal nature of this activity requires more staff at peak times of the year and fewer staff during periods when classes are not in session. The fees paid to JDS are less than the cost of doing this with in-house staff. Additionally, the district lacked the space required for records storage. During a recent review of contracts, a comparison was done with other vendors who provide the service to see if there is one that can save the district money.

ANALYSIS

A comparison to JDS was done using the Phoenix Group, a parking citation collection and management company that is located within the district and is a major vendor for municipalities, colleges and universities throughout the state. The basic rate charged per citation by both JDS and The Phoenix Group is about the same, for example:

<u>Phoenix Group</u>	<u>JDS</u>
Citation issued - \$20.00	Citation issued - \$20.00
Surcharges - \$12.50	Surcharges - \$12.50
Processing Costs - \$1.25	Processing Costs - \$1.15
Income to RSCCD - \$6.25	Income to RSCCD - \$6.35

Both companies charge the same surcharges mandated by the courts and the state for each parking citation that is processed.

However, the services provided by the Phoenix Group are far superior to those we currently receive from JDS. The Phoenix Group offers 24 hour access to an on-line payment service, so that violators may pay quickly and conveniently, giving the district access to fine revenue earlier. The Phoenix Group provides a more aggressive collection service to collect fines after DMV holds are ignored. They also collect fines for parking citations issued to vehicles registered in other states.

The Phoenix Group has a parking citation management program that is accessible on-line which provides the district instantaneously a variety of reports and data to track individual citations, to track citations issued by individual officers, to manage the overall parking enforcement program

and to manage the parking citation contesting/appeals program. JDS does not have this capacity and we currently must wait for several days to get limited data from them. JDS processes parking citation contests/appeals strictly by mail.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the service contract for parking citation collections and management services with the Phoenix Group as presented.

PHX will provide ongoing citation processing in accordance with the following terms and conditions:

1.0 PROCESSING SERVICES PROVIDED

PHX shall receive from AGENCY and process parking citations issued to California and out-of-state vehicles. PHX will provide AGENCY with a citation processing management system and access to the database using the Internet and Wincite.net.

1.1 Citation Referral and Reconciliation: AGENCY will forward citations to PHX daily or weekly via electronic communication or hard copy. Statistics reporting will provide detail of the information received by issue date. AGENCY will also include payment information as well as cancellations, dismissals, voids, corrections and/or other relevant information pertaining to the citation(s) status. PHX will update AGENCY on a monthly basis regarding status of payment updates. AGENCY may also update to the database remotely.

1.2 Registered Owner Information: PHX will be responsible for maintaining on-line communications with the California Department of Motor Vehicles ("DMV"). This communication is required as part of this agreement to request registered owner information. Further, PHX will be responsible for communicating and purchasing registration information with out of state DMV offices. If PHX is unable to obtain the necessary information, the citation may be returned to AGENCY for research and follow up.

1.3 Delinquent Notices: PHX will generate and mail the notices for citations that have been referred to PHX by AGENCY. The mailed notice will include:

- A. Citation Number;
- B. Date and Time of issuance;
- C. Violation and Description;
- D. Amount of fine/fee due;
- E. How to pay the citation; and
- F. Return address for payment.

1.4 Notices: Notices are sent to the owner that DMV has on record at the time the citation is written.

2.0 PAYMENT PROCESSING

All payments processed by PHX will be based on the directions and instructions provided by AGENCY. Details of the process may change as needed and will be directed by AGENCY. Payment processing and deposits will be made within 24-48 hours of receipt of payment. The monies will be deposited into an account controlled by AGENCY. PHX will make deposits on behalf of AGENCY for payments received by PHX. All payments collected by AGENCY will be entered remotely or reported to PHX by AGENCY.

2.1 Revenue Reporting: PHX will forward revenue reports to AGENCY to balance the deposits for the month. The reports will list all citations paid by citation number and all deposits made by day.

2.2 Changes to Payment Processing Procedures

AGENCY retains the right to change the banking procedure. Changes to the procedures will be negotiated with PHX to the extent that the banking procedures remain within the scope of services provided by PHX. Changes to the process will be finalized in writing between AGENCY and PHX.

2.3 Credit Card Payments (Optional)

PHX will provide the option for the public to pay citations by credit card on the telephone or on the Internet. The violator may use the following credit cards: Discover, MasterCard, Visa or American Express. The system will provide real time access to the citation data, including the balance due. The secure site will verify the credit card, approve the payment and update the citation record in real time. The violator is charged a convenience fee of \$3.95 that is retained by PHX for processing and merchant fees. The violator is instructed on how much to pay for the citation and how much they are charged as a convenient fee and alternative methods for payment. NO additional costs are passed on to the AGENCY.

2.4 Credit Card Charge Back: The process includes the following:

- 1) Charge back notification received by PHX;
- 2) PHX locates the citation(s) that were paid on the transaction being disputed;
- 3) PHX reverses the payment of the citation(s) and reopens the citation(s) immediately;
- 4) PHX enters notes regarding the credit card payment information including, but not limited to:
 - Original Transaction ID(s);
 - Chargeback ID; and
 - Any pertinent correspondence regarding the charge back.
- 5) A letter of dispute describing the charge is sent to the credit card company;
- 6) If the dispute is found in favor of the credit card holder, then the charge back is accepted and a notice of unpaid fees are sent to the registered owner;
- 6) Charge back paperwork is then filed by PHX for later retrieval if necessary; and
- 7) Charge backs are reflected in the monthly reporting.

2.5 Custom Website

PHX will establish a website link to our website for inquiry and payment. This will appear to the violator that they are working directly with AGENCY. We can also allow the payment screen to simulate AGENCY's web page.

The credit card option will be set up and maintained by PHX with no additional costs charged to AGENCY. The services include:

- a. Setting up a custom header and footer page based on graphics approved by AGENCY;
- b. All merchant fees; and
- c. Internet security and website fees.

3.0 ONLINE INQUIRY

The citation data is accessible by citation number, vehicle license number, name or VIN number.

PHX's online inquiry system will provide the following:

- A. Electronic facsimile of the original citation;
- B. All citation information, including vehicle identification number ("VIN");
- C. Current status of the citation, DMV inquiry, holds, and release information;
- D. Delinquent notice information, due date, mailing date;
- E. Administrative review, hearing court appeals, and disposition information;
- F. Payment information, including all date, amounts and payment codes; and
- G. Registered owner information.

3.1 Equipment Requirements:

AGENCY will provide a standard personal computer that will run Microsoft Internet Explorer 6.0 or greater and Windows 2000, Windows XP Pro or greater. PHX will provide Wincite.net to AGENCY for citation data and reporting access. Any licensing required to operate Microsoft products will be the responsibility of AGENCY.

4.0 REMOTE DATA ENTRY

4.1 Remote Data Entry: Remote data entry will be provided through the Internet, using Internet Explorer and Wincite.net. Each operator would be set up with a unique password and security level. Individual function levels will include view only, edit, add and dismiss/void capabilities.

4.2 User Accounts: Accounts may be established by AGENCY and/or PHX. Access is limited to employees of AGENCY only. This limitation specifically excludes contractors and/or consultants. Exceptions to the limitation must be approved in writing by PHX.

5.0 REPORTING

PHX will supply AGENCY with electronic monthly reporting. The reports will be supplied to AGENCY in a PDF format available for access using Adobe Reader with the option to export the report to Microsoft Excel. The reports will include at least the following:

- A. Officer Summary Report;
- B. Officer Summary Y-T-D Monthly Recap;
- C. Void/Dismiss Report;
- D. Habitual Offender Hot Sheet Report;
- E. Habitual Offender Detail Report;
- F. DMV Monthly Reports;
- G. Out of State Revenue Detail Report;
- H. Revenue Collection Detail Report;
- I. Daily Deposit Report; and
- J. Revenue Distribution (Surcharge) Report.

The production/management reports will be reviewed with AGENCY to establish the monthly reports required to provide adequate information and detail. The monthly production report schedule may change as needed. Reporting information may also be provided to AGENCY in Excel or other method as mutually agreed to by both parties.

6.0 SURCHARGES It is the responsibility of AGENCY to outline the surcharges that require monthly reporting to PHX. PHX will provide the monthly surcharge disbursement report to AGENCY as part of the monthly reports as identified in Section 5. AGENCY will make all disbursements to the County.

7.0 OWNERSHIP OF SOFTWARE

AGENCY acknowledges that the software and software programs used by AGENCY were developed by PHX and PHX is the sole property owner. AGENCY obtains no right or interest in the software by virtue of this agreement.

8.0 FEES

In consideration of the services provided, AGENCY agrees to pay the following fees per citation:

1. Cost per citation (Handwritten)	\$0.80	Cites Issued
2. Payment Processing	\$0.20	Payment processing is included in this proposal.
3. Delinquent Notices	\$0.85	A delinquent notice is only charged for citations that reach the delinquent period and a delinquent notice is mailed, or second notices as required.

5. Out of State citations	35%	Out of State processing includes any costs charged by the state for the registered owner. The percentage is only for citations that are collected.

Item – 5. out of state processing includes any costs charged by the state. The percentage is only for citations that are collected.

Item – 6. During the term of agreement, special letters may be included as directed by AGENCY. Special letters are custom letters that follow up processing. An example would be letters that inform the violator of habitual violations or disposition letters mailed for each review and hearing conclusion. PHX will not implement processing special letters without the consent of AGENCY.

8.1 Minimum Fee: PHX will charge a monthly minimum fee of \$150.00 each month. If the cost of citations issued exceeds \$150.00 in actual billing charges, the minimum fee will be waived.

8.2 Postal Increases: In the event of a postal increase, PHX will request the adjustment of fees to offset the postal increase only; such requests will be in writing. Any other increases must be approved in writing.

8.3 Electronic Archives: PHX will charge \$50.00 for each electronic copy as requested by AGENCY, which contains archived data as specified in Section 9.0.

9.0 DATA RETENTION POLICY

9.1 Computer Data Files: Data will be removed/archived from the system every July. Data archived from the system will be electronically retained by PHX. It will be retained from 24 months from the date of archival. AGENCY has the option to receive a copy of the electronic data by request. Related costs are defined in Section 8.0 Fees.

Criteria for removal/archival of data will be:

Closed citations: Any citation date older than 18 months and has been closed for a period of one year.

Open citations: Any citations open that are not on DMV hold and older than 24 months. Regardless of the age of open citations that are on file with the DMV with a hold on the registration will remain on the system until DMV clears the citation.

9.2 Hard Copy Data: Hard copy files will be returned to AGENCY twice a year which will contain citations more than six months old. For example, citation hard copies from January-June will be returned to AGENCY the next January. These files will consist of the original citations and payment receipts. PHX will provide computer generated citation data for citations on the system provided they have not been archived to electronic copy.

10.0 TERM AND RENEWALS:

Except as otherwise stated these terms and conditions shall be in effect between both parties, which shall commence on 09/01/2011 to 06/30/2013, provided however, the Agreement may be extended thereafter for subsequent one-year periods. In conjunction with any extension, PHX may give of price adjustments. All extensions and increases shall be approved in writing by the AGENCY.

10.1 Ownership of Data: All citations, electronic and handwritten, reports, electronic media and any other documents, including copies and reproductions assembled or prepared by PHX employees, agents or officers in connection with this agreement shall be the property of AGENCY and shall be delivered to AGENCY upon either the completion of this agreement or the termination of this agreement.

10.2 Exclusivity: AGENCY agrees to utilize only the services of PHX during the term of this agreement for the processing of citations. AGENCY also agrees during the term of agreement to not directly or indirectly assist a competitor of PHX in the performance of the services provided by PHX under this agreement, and not to divulge the trade secrets or property of PHX to any unauthorized person or entity. This Non-Disclosure obligation shall survive the termination of this agreement

10.3 Books and Records: PHX will maintain adequate books and records for parking citations forwarded to PHX for processing. Upon two weeks prior notice, such books or records, related processing data and AGENCY bank records shall be available for inspection or audit by AGENCY at PHX's location during regular working hours.

11.0 LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

Except for a breach of a party's indemnification or confidentiality obligations, neither party shall be liable to the other party or any third party for any incidental, special or consequential damages arising out of this agreement except where a party acted with gross negligence or willful misconduct.

12.0 INSURANCE

PHX shall procure and maintain for the duration of this agreement the following insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages of property, which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Contract by PHX, his agents, representatives, employees, or subcontractors:

- A. General Liability: \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each occurrence.
- B. Workers' Compensation as required by the Labor Code of the State of California.

13.0 CONFIDENTIAL/FILE SECURITY

Reasonable security provisions will be provided by PHX to insure the access to AGENCY computer records and files will only be available to AGENCY. PHX cannot guarantee against loss or alteration of computer records, but will take reasonable precautions to prevent such occurrences. PHX will hold all AGENCY data in strict confidence and shall not provide any data to any other party unless directed by AGENCY in writing or as ordered by any lawful agency.

14.0 SECTION HEADINGS

Section heading appearing in this agreement are inserted for convenience and reference only and shall not be construed to be interpretations of text.

15.0 MISCELLANEOUS

15.1 Jurisdiction: This agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the state of California.

15.2 Waiver: The waiver of any breach of any provision of this agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or other provisions of this agreement.

15.3 Enforceability: If any provision of this agreement shall not be enforceable, the remainder of this agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

15.4 Validity: All provision of this agreement shall be binding upon both parties.

15.5 Entire Agreement: This agreement contains the entire understanding between PHX and AGENCY with respect to citation processing, and upon the commencement date, supercedes and replaces all prior agreements, negotiations, proposals or representations regarding warranty or services.

15.6 Independent Contractor: PHX agrees that it is an independent contractor and that its officers and employees are not employees of AGENCY, nor are they entitled to any benefits as AGENCY employees as a result of the execution of this agreement.

16. COMMENCEMENT OF WORK

Work shall not commence under this agreement until a fully executed agreement has been received by PHX and PHX has been given approval to proceed. Any work performed by PHX prior to the date of approval shall be considered as having been performed at PHX's own risk.

17. CANCELLATION

AGENCY and PHX reserves the right to cancel this agreement at any time upon sixty (60) days written notice to the other party. At such time, PHX agrees to provide AGENCY with all AGENCY data plus an electronic file of all AGENCY data.

BACKGROUND

On October 13, 2008 the Board of Trustees approved the Foundation for California Community Colleges Microsoft Campus Agreement for licensing Microsoft software. This agreement was a three year contract expiring on September 30, 2011. The intention is to renew this agreement for another three year term. Prior to the Microsoft Campus Master Licensing Agreement, all districts purchasing any computers were required to buy individual Microsoft products licenses for each computer.

ANALYSIS

The Microsoft Campus Agreement is a licensing program that provides California Community Colleges the opportunity to license Microsoft product for an additional savings based on the school's employee FTE count.

The Microsoft Select Agreement complements the Campus Agreement, allowing the community colleges to purchase perpetual licenses with or without Software Assurance (upgrade insurance) for desktop or server platforms as needed. The cost of Software Assurance is prorated based on the number of full and partial years left in the agreement term, and is coterminous with the agreement.

This Microsoft suite of software has been the District standard for over ten years. The District has participated in the FCCC purchase program since inception. Annual renewal costs are calculated using current employee FTE levels reported by the State Chancellor's Office and the quantity of servers currently in production.

With over 5,000 workstations and server platforms in the District's technology assets portfolio, the cost per platform is under \$60 for all required software. This per unit cost represents a significant savings not available outside of the FCCC program.

This agreement is for a three year term commencing October 1, 2011.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve RSCCD's contract renewal under the Microsoft Campus Agreement with the FCCC and Academic Select/Participation Agreements as presented.

BACKGROUND

The Santa Ana College Diesel program has been in a partnership with the Air Resources Board (ARB) for the past 5+ years. This partnership has been most beneficial for the Diesel program/students. The ARB has sent a letter (attached) which details the wish for our program to donate two Transport Refrigeration Units (TRU's) that are no longer used by SAC Diesel Technology to Heart of Compassion.

Heart of Compassion, a non-profit food bank located in Montebello, California, has sent a letter (attached), indicating their need to replace their existing trailer refrigeration and truck mounted refrigeration units in order that their organization can continue with their goal of "fighting hunger and feeding hope". RYPOS (the filter manufacturer) will donate the particulate filters (valued at approximately \$35,000) needed for the upgrade. The Diesel program students will assist with upgrading the donated units so that they are compliant with state standards. This will give our students a great learning opportunity. So, this donation is beneficial in many ways.

ANALYSIS

The Board of Trustees has requested that surplus items be made available for donation to non-profit organizations and school districts. Education Code 81452 does allow the District to donate equipment having no monetary value.

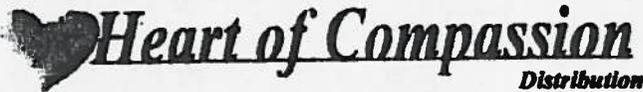

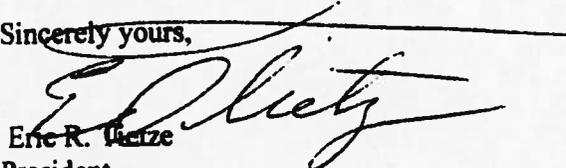

**GRANT SUB-AGREEMENT BETWEEN

This Grant Sub-Agreement (hereinafter "**Agreement**") is entered into between Rancho Santiago Community College District (hereinafter "**RSCCD**") and the Peralta Community College District (hereinafter "**SUBCONTRACTOR**").

WHEREAS, RSCCD was awarded a "Entrepreneurship Career Pathways Project" grant, (hereinafter "**Grant**"), Grant #09-172-041, from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, Economic and Workforce Development Career Technical Education Division, to disseminate funds to community colleges for them to continue to implement the "Young Entrepreneurs Project" (hereinafter "**Project**"), to replace misconceptions of vocational education and blue-collar jobs with increased awareness of and aspirations to self-employment as a legitimate lifetime career path providing reliable living wages.

WHEREAS, **SUBCONTRACTOR** has agreed to participate in the purpose of the Grant, and

WHEREAS, **RSCCD** has the right to enter into agreements with outside entities for various services with the approval of the Board of Trustees,

NOW, THEREFORE the **RSCCD** and **SUBCONTRACTOR** do covenant and agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

1. **Statement of Work**

Continue to provide Young Entrepreneurship Project (YEP) services within **SUBCONTRACTOR**'s service territory. The purpose of the YEP is to bring business ownership concepts to youth ages 14-27 while increasing awareness of and aspirations to self-employment as a legitimate career path.

2. **Period of Performance**

The period of performance for this Agreement shall be from March 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011.

3. **Total Cost**

The total cost to RSCCD for performance of this Agreement shall not exceed \$60,000, which amount shall be provided to **SUBCONTRACTOR** promptly upon execution of this Agreement and approval by RSCCD's Board.

4. **Reporting**

SUBCONTRACTOR is responsible for completion and submission of Quarterly Progress Reports, according to the following schedule: October 15th and January 15th. The Final Narrative Summary Reports are due by April 15th.

5. **Expenditure of Grant Funds.**

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all Grant requirements and that it is responsible

for the appropriate expenditure of all Grant funds received and for any misappropriation or disallowment of Grant funds.

6. Record Keeping

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to maintain project records for possible audit for a minimum of three (3) years after final payment or until any audit findings have been resolved, unless a longer period of records retention is stipulated.

7. Audit

SUBCONTRACTOR agrees that RSCCD, the Chancellor's Office, the Bureau of State Audits, any other appropriate state or federal oversight agency, or their designated representative(s), shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to the performance of this Agreement. SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, SUBCONTRACTOR agrees to include a similar right of RSCCD, the Chancellor's Office, the Bureau of State Audits, any other appropriate state or federal oversight agency, or their designated representative(s) to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to performance of this Agreement.

8. Mutual Indemnification

Both parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of activities or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees.

9. Subcontracting.

SUBCONTRACTOR has informed RSCCD of its intent to subcontract its performance of the services described in Section 1 and certain related obligations to the Alameda County Small Business Development Center administered by Humboldt State University, and RSCCD consents to such subcontracting.

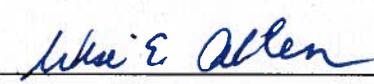

WHEREAS, RTI International has a *GEAR UP Implementation Award* contract from the U. S. Department of Education (Contract #ED-04-CO-0036/0001) and has sub-contracted with RSCCD (subcontract #28-312-0209234) to implement a project to rigorously study the impact of the Saturday Academy of Mathematics (SAM) designed to support the learning of key Pre-Algebra and Algebra concepts by middle school GEAR UP students;

WHEREAS, **UCI** has agreed to participate in the purpose of this grant; and

WHEREAS, **RSCCD** has the right to enter into agreements with outside entities for various services with the approval of the Board of Trustees;

NOW, THEREFORE the **RSCCD** and **UCI** do covenant and agree as follows:

TERM

3. This Agreement is based on the Santa Ana College’s approved project proposal included as *Exhibit A* to this Agreement. **UCI** agrees to comply with all applicable provisions, to perform all of its proposed work, and to provide all of its proposed services set forth in this Agreement and the aforementioned project proposal (*Exhibit A*) in a professional, timely and diligent manner.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

4. **UCI** shall monitor its program for compliance with the provisions of this Agreement, the subcontract between RTI International and RSCCD (subcontract #28-312-0209234) included in this agreement as *Exhibit A*, and all applicable laws, regulations (such as specific regulations that pertain to GEAR UP projects: Program Provisions 20 U.S.C. 1070a-21 – 1070a-28; 34 CFR Parts 74, 75, 77 79, 80, 81, 82, 84, 85, 86, 97, 98 and 99; 34 CFR Part 694; OMB Circular A-21), and its institutional policies and procedures.

REPORTS

5. **UCI** shall submit such reports, data and information at such times as **RSCCD** may require, and in the form **RSCCD** may require, regarding the performance of **UCI's** services, or **UCI's** activities, costs or other data.

6. Upon the effective date of this Agreement, **RSCCD** shall make payments to **UCI** in accordance with the following:

ACCESS AND RECORDS

7. (a) Access. **RSCCD**, the U.S. Department of Education, and the United States Government and/or their representatives, shall have access, for purposes of monitoring auditing, and examining, to **UCI's** activities, books, documents and papers (including computer records) and to records of **UCI's** subcontractors, consultants, contracted employees, bookkeepers, accountants, employees and participants related to this Agreement. Such agencies or representatives shall have the right to make excerpts, transcripts and photocopies of such records and to schedule on-site monitoring during normal business hours at their discretion. Monitoring activities also may include, but are not limited to, questioning employees and participants and entering any premises or onto any site in which any of the services or activities funded hereunder are conducted or in which any of the records of **UCI** are kept. All accounting records and evidence pertaining to all costs of **UCI** and all documents related to this Agreement shall be kept available at **UCI's** office or place of business for the duration of this Agreement and thereafter for three (3) years after completion of an audit. Records which relate to (1) complaints, claims, administrative proceedings or litigation arising out of the performance of this Agreement, or (2) costs and expenses of this Agreement to which **RSCCD** or any other government agency takes exception, shall be retained beyond the three (3) year period until final resolution or disposition of such appeals, litigation, claims, or exceptions.

INDEMNIFICATION

8. (a) **UCI** shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend **RSCCD**, its Board of Trustees, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, loss, liability, injury death, suits or judgments arising out of or alleged to arise out of or in consequence of **UCI's** performance of this Agreement, or any act or omission of **UCI**, its officers, agents or employees, including, but not limited to, and without waiving the generality of the foregoing, any audit disallowances or sums expended by **UCI** in violation of federal, State or **RSCCD** requirements or of this Agreement, or any negligent or intentional acts or omissions of **UCI**, its officers, agents or employees which injure or damage any participants or other third parties, including **RSCCD** personnel representatives. **UCI** shall forthwith remit all sums due **RSCCD**, along with the legal rate of interest pursuant to this paragraph.

(b) **RSCCD** shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend **UCI**, its Board of Regents, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, loss, liability, injury death, suits or judgments arising out of or alleged to arise out of or in consequence of **RSCCD's** performance of this Agreement, or any act or omission of **RSCCD**, its officers, agents or employees, including, but not limited to, and without waiving the generality of the foregoing, any audit disallowances or sums expended by **RSCCD** in violation of federal, State or **UCI** requirements or of this Agreement, or any negligent or intentional acts or omissions of **RSCCD**, its officers, agents or employees which injure or damage any participants or other third parties, including **UCI** personnel representatives. **RSCCD** shall forthwith remit all sums due **UCI**, along with the legal rate of interest pursuant to this paragraph.

SCR 5. Key Personnel

A. **Lilia Tanakeyowma** is considered essential to the work being performed under this Subcontract. By mutual agreement, the list of key personnel may be amended from time to time during the course of this Subcontract to either add or delete key personnel as appropriate.

- B. During the first ninety (90) calendar days of performance, Subcontractor shall make no substitutions of key personnel unless the substitution is necessitated by illness, death, or termination of employment. Subcontractor shall notify the RTI Subcontract Administrator within ten (10) calendar days after the occurrence of any of these events and provide the information required by Paragraph C below. After the initial ninety (90) calendar day period, Subcontractor shall submit the information required by Paragraph C to the RTI Subcontract Administrator at least ten (10) calendar days prior to making any permanent substitutions.
- C. Prior to diverting the above-named personnel to other programs, Subcontractor shall submit a justification (including the reason for the requested substitution and resumes of the proposed replacement key personnel) in sufficient detail to permit evaluation of the impact of the requested substitution on the program. Proposed substitutes should have comparable qualifications to those of the persons being replaced. The RTI Subcontract Administrator will notify Subcontractor of RTI's decision about the substitutions within twenty (20) calendar days after receipt of all required information.

SCR 6. Institutional Review Board (IRB)

Institutional Review Board approval must be obtained before any contact with human subjects. All research involving human subjects, or data from or about human subjects, must be conducted in accordance with applicable federal regulations (45 CFR 46 and 21 CFR 50 and 56) and the protocol approved by the IRB. Research activities include contacting Human Subjects, conducting the survey and the collecting and storing of any Human Subject data resulting from this survey. Upon notice of IRB approval, RTI will provide notice to the Subcontractor to commence work. Once this notice is provided to Subcontractor, the Subcontractor may commence with the research activities.

SCR 7. Department of Education Security Requirements (Flow-down Provision)

The Subcontractor and its lower-tier subcontractors and consultants shall comply with the Department of Education Security Requirements as set forth herein:

- b. The Privacy Act of 1974 (P.L. 93-579, U.S.C. 552a)

- d. The U.S. Department of Education Departmental Directive OM:5:101, "Contractor Employee Personnel Security Screenings."

All Subcontractor employees must undergo a personnel security screening if they will be employed for thirty (30) days or more, in accordance with Department of Education Directive OM:5-101, "Contractor Employee Personnel Screenings." The type of screening and the timing of the screening will depend upon the nature of the contractor position, the type of data to be accessed, and the type of information technology (IT) system access required. Personnel security screenings will be commensurate with the risk and magnitude of harm the individual could cause.

FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH CONTRACTOR PERSONNEL SECURITY REQUIREMENTS MAY RESULT IN THE TERMINATION OF THIS SUBCONTRACT FOR DEFAULT.

SCR 8. Withholding of Contract Payments (Department of Education Flow-down Provision)

Notwithstanding any other payment provisions of the Subcontract, failure of the Subcontractor to submit required forms, responses or reports when due; failure to perform or deliver required work, supplies, or services; or, failure to meet any of the requirements of the Subcontract, to include all requirements as specified in the Department of Education Security Requirements SCR Above, will result in the withholding of payments under this Subcontract in such amounts as the RTI Subcontract Administrator deems appropriate, unless the failure arises out of causes beyond the control, and without the fault of negligence, of the Subcontractor, as defined by the clause entitled "Excusable Delays or Default", as applicable. The RTI Subcontract Administrator will promptly notify the Subcontractor of its intention to withhold payment of any invoice or voucher submitted. Payment will be withheld until the failure is cured, a new delivery schedule is agreed upon, or payment is made as part of the termination settlement.

SCR 9. Removal From Project Access (Department of Education Flow-down Provision)

When Subcontractor employees are removed from positions, for any reason, the Subcontractor shall:

- a. Revoke all access authorizations
- b. Retrieve all specific keys and badges
- c. Change the combinations on all locks to which the employee had access
- d. Review the employee's obligations to the organization
- e. Notify appropriate Department of Education, thru RTI, security officials of the removal action.

For all access terminations, the Subcontractor shall:

- a. Follow the Checklist for Employee termination
- b. Assure that the departing employee either completes all assigned tasks or briefs the replacement on the requirements and status of ongoing tasks
- c. Determine the employee's access termination date
- d. Immediately notify the assigned ADP Systems Manager(s) if access termination is for cause and request an immediate revocation of access
- e. Complete the Manager's Checklist for Employee Termination and forward the checklist to the RTI Project Manager
- f. Review with the employee their obligation to protect related data
- g. Assure that the employee completes the Access Termination Statement.

The RTI Project Manager shall:

- a. Notify Department of Education of the access termination on the employee
- b. Notify the assigned ADP Systems Managers of the access termination date.

Appendix B: Standard Terms and Conditions

ARTICLE 1. Privity

This Subcontract is funded in whole or in part with funds from the United States Government. Neither the Government nor any of its departments, agencies, or employees is or will be a party to this Subcontract or any lower-tier subcontract. No privity between the Government Client and Subcontractor is established by this Subcontract. All communications regarding this Subcontract must be directed to RTI and not to RTI's Government Client.

ARTICLE 2. Independent Contractor

The relationship of Subcontractor to RTI is that of an independent contractor, and nothing in this Subcontract shall be construed as creating any other relationship. Accordingly, Subcontractor shall comply with all laws and assume all risks incident to its status as an independent contractor. This includes, but is not limited to, responsibility for all applicable federal and state income taxes, associated payroll and business taxes, licenses and fees, and such insurance as is necessary for Subcontractor's protection in connection with work performed under this Agreement. Neither Subcontractor nor anyone employed by it shall be, represent, act, purport to act, or be deemed to be an agent, representative, employee, or servant of RTI.

ARTICLE 3. Statement of Work/Budget

Subcontractor shall furnish the necessary personnel, materials, services, equipment and facilities, and all other items necessary to accomplish all tasks specified in Appendix D, *Statement of Work/Budget*, which is hereby incorporated and made a part of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 4. Period of Performance

Subcontractor shall strictly adhere to the period of performance set forth in the Appendix A, Special Contract Requirements. Any changes to the period of performance shall only be authorized by RTI through the issuance of a written and properly executed Subcontract modification. In the event of any anticipated or actual delay in performance, Subcontractor shall: (i) promptly notify RTI in writing (within 5 days) of the reasons for the delay and the actions being taken to overcome or minimize the delay; (ii) provide RTI with a written recovery schedule; and (iii) if requested by RTI, expedite performance or delivery to avoid or minimize delay to the maximum extent possible, unless Subcontractor is excused from prompt performance as provided in the "Excusable Delays" article of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 5. Consultants/Lower-Tier Subcontracts

- A. PRIOR WRITTEN approval of the RTI Subcontract Administrator is required for obtaining services of consultants and lower-tier subcontractors. Costs for consultants and lower-tier subcontracts who have not received PRIOR WRITTEN approval in accordance with this Article will not be reimbursed. Inclusion in the Subcontractor's budget or proposal does not constitute request or approval of consultants or lower-tier Subcontractors.
- B. When requesting the use of consultants or a lower-tier subcontractor, the Subcontractor shall furnish information concerning the need for such services, the reasonableness of the fees or costs, a copy of the proposed consulting agreement/subcontract, and any additional information required to make a determination of acceptability. Cost-plus-a-percentage-of-cost subcontracts or purchase orders are prohibited.

ARTICLE 6. Assignment, Delegation and Subcontracting

- A. Subcontractor shall not assign any of its rights or interests in this Subcontract without RTI's prior written consent. Subcontractor shall not delegate any of its duties or obligations under this Subcontract. Subcontractor may not assign its right to monies due or to become due. No assignment, delegation or subcontracting by Subcontractor, with or without RTI's consent, shall relieve Subcontractor of any of its obligations under this Subcontract or prejudice any of RTI's rights against Subcontractor whether arising before or after the date of any assignment. This Article does not limit Subcontractor's ability to purchase standard commercial supplies or raw materials.
- B. RTI shall be entitled to assign this Subcontract to any of its subsidiaries or other affiliates (including by operation of law, judicial process or otherwise) or any successor to RTI's business or operations without prior notice to or consent from Subcontractor. RTI shall further be entitled to assign this Subcontract to its Prime Sponsor of the agreement under which this Subcontract is issued without prior notice to or consent from Subcontractor. Any other assignment by RTI shall require Subcontractor consent.

ARTICLE 7. Technical Direction

- A. The RTI Technical Monitor/Project Manager identified in Appendix A, Special Contract Requirements, does not have the authority to direct the Subcontractor to make changes in scope, period(s) of performance, place(s) of performance, cost, funding, or any other express Provisions of this Subcontract. All matters affecting the terms of this Subcontract and the administration thereof shall be referred to the RTI Subcontract Administrator. Any changes to the provisions of this Subcontract must be made by written modification in accordance with the Subcontract Changes and Modifications Provision of this Subcontract.
- B. When, in the opinion of Subcontractor, technical direction calls for effort outside the scope of the Statement of Work, Subcontractor shall so notify the RTI Subcontract Administrator and the originator of the technical direction in writing in accordance with the Changes and Modifications Article of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 8. Inspection and Acceptance

Acceptance of the work set forth in this Subcontract will be made by RTI's Technical Representative or his or hers authorized representative. RTI and the Government have the right to inspect and evaluate the work performed or being performed under this Subcontract, and the premises where the work is being performed, at all reasonable times and in a manner that will not unduly delay the work. If either RTI or the Government performs inspection or evaluation on the premises of Subcontractor or its lower tier subcontractors, the Subcontractor shall furnish and requires its subcontractors to furnish all reasonable facilities and assistance for the safe and convenient operation of these duties.

ARTICLE 9. Changes and Modifications

- A. The RTI Subcontract Administrator may, without notice to sureties and in writing, direct changes within the general scope of this Subcontract in any of the following: (i) technical requirements and descriptions, specifications, statement of work, drawings or designs; (ii) shipment or packing methods; (iii) place of delivery, inspection or acceptance; (iv) reasonable adjustments in quantities or delivery schedules or both; (v) amount of RTI-furnished property; and, if this Subcontract includes services; (vi) description of services to be performed; (vii) time of performance (i.e., hours of the day, days of the week, etc.); and (viii) place of performance. Subcontractor shall comply immediately with such direction.
- B. If such change increases or decreases the cost or time required to perform this Subcontract, the parties shall negotiate an equitable adjustment in the price or schedule, or both, to reflect the increase or decrease. RTI will modify this Subcontract in writing accordingly. Unless authorized agreed in writing, Subcontractor must assert any claim for adjustment to the RTI Subcontract Administrator in writing within 25 days and deliver a fully supported proposal to the RTI Subcontract Administrator within 30 days after Subcontractor's receipt of such direction. RTI may, at its sole discretion, consider any claim regardless of when asserted. If Subcontractor's proposal includes the cost of property made obsolete or excess by the change, RTI may direct the disposition of the property. RTI may examine Subcontractor's pertinent books and records to verify the amount of Subcontractor's claim. Failure of the parties to agree upon any adjustment shall not excuse Subcontractor from performing in accordance with RTI's direction.
- C. If Subcontractor considers that RTI's conduct constitutes a change, Subcontractor shall notify the RTI Subcontract Administrator immediately (within 5 work days) in writing as to the nature of such conduct and its effect upon Subcontractor's performance. Pending direction from RTI's Subcontract Administrator, Subcontractor shall take no action to implement any such change.
- D. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this article, the cost of this Subcontract and, if this contract is incrementally funded, the funds allotted for the performance thereof shall not be increased or deemed to be increased except by specific written modification of this Subcontract indicating the new Subcontract cost and the new amount of funding allotted to this Subcontract. Until such modification is made, Subcontractor shall not be obligated to continue performance or incur costs beyond the point established in the "Limitation of Cost" and "Limitation of Funds" articles of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 10. Deliverables and Technical Reports

- A. Deliverable requirements are stipulated in Appendix D, *Statement of Work/Budget*. All required deliverables shall be addressed to the RTI Project Manager.
- B. Notwithstanding any other payment provision of this Subcontract, failure of Subcontractor to submit required reports when due, or failure to perform or deliver required work, supplies, or services to the reasonable satisfaction of RTI's

Project Manager, will result in the withholding of payment under the Subcontract unless such failure arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of Subcontractor.

ARTICLE 11. Submission and Payment of Invoices

- A. Subcontractor will submit invoices in accordance with the Milestone Payment Schedule included herein. A properly prepared invoice will be paid within 30 days of receipt.
- B. Invoices and payment instructions are set forth in Appendix E of the Subcontract.

ARTICLE 12. Representations and Certifications

Prior to the execution of this subcontract, Subcontractor shall provide current, accurate, and complete representations and certifications. This may be completed through one of the following alternatives:

- Completion through the U.S. Governments Online Representations and Certifications database (ORCA) at <http://orca.bpn.gov>;
- Representations and Certifications submitted during the initial proposal with RTI in response to the U.S. Government RFP; or
- Completion of the Representations and Certifications provided by RTI (*document will be provided upon request*).

ARTICLE 13. Final Payment and Closeout

Subcontractor's final invoice and release and assignment shall be submitted to RTI within 90 days following completion of the period of performance of this Subcontract. In the event that quick closeout is requested by RTI, Subcontractor shall comply with FAR Part 42.708 to complete Subcontract closeout. Payment of the **final invoice** will be withheld pending:

- Completion and acceptance by RTI of all work performed under Statement of Work
- Completion of Subcontractor's Release and Assignment Form, including patent/invention report, and property report; and
- Submission of all required Administrative and Technical Reports
- Clear, visible, and proper marking of "**final invoice**" on the actual final invoice

ARTICLE 14. Travel

To the extent travel is not restricted by the Subcontract, costs incurred for lodging, meals and incidental expenses shall be considered to be reasonable, allowable, and allocable under this Subcontract only to the extent that they do not exceed on a daily basis the maximum per diem rates in effect on the day of travel as set forth in the current version of the Federal Travel Regulations (FTR).

ARTICLE 15. Taxes

Unless the Subcontract specifies otherwise, Subcontractor is liable for and shall pay, all taxes, impositions, charges and exactions imposed on or measured by this Subcontract except for applicable sales and use taxes that are separately stated on Subcontractor's invoice. Prices shall not include any taxes, impositions, charges or exactions for which Subcontractor has furnished a valid exemption certificate or other evidence of exemption.

ARTICLE 16. Record Retention and Access

Subcontractor shall maintain books, records, documents, program and individual service records and other evidence of its accounting and billing procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature incurred in the performance of this contract. These records shall be subject at all reasonable times to monitoring, inspection, review or audit by authorized employees or agents of RTI or the Government. Subcontractor shall retain all such records concerning this contract for a period of three (3) years after the completion of the Subcontract. If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration date of this three-year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims or audit findings involving the records have been resolved.

ARTICLE 17. Confidential Information

- A. During the term of this Subcontract, Subcontractor and its employees may receive or have access to data and information that is confidential and proprietary to RTI or its Client. All such data and information ("Confidential

Information") made available to, disclosed to, or otherwise made known to Subcontractor as a result of services under this Subcontract shall be considered confidential and shall be considered the sole property of RTI and/or RTI's Client. Confidential Information may be used by Subcontractor or its employees only for purposes of performing the obligations hereunder. Subcontractor shall not reveal, publish or otherwise disclose Confidential Information to any third party without the prior written consent of the disclosing party.

- B. The foregoing obligations shall not apply to Confidential Information which:
- is or becomes generally available to the public other than as a result of a disclosure by Subcontractor;
 - becomes available to Subcontractor on a non-confidential basis from a third party source which is not prohibited from disclosing such information by a legal, contractual or fiduciary agreement to a third party;
 - Subcontractor develops independently without use of the disclosing party's Confidential Information, as demonstrated by written records and evidence;
 - was in Subcontractor's possession or known to it prior to its receipt from the disclosing party; or
 - is required by law to be disclosed, provided Subcontractor notifies the disclosing party promptly and gives the disclosing party an opportunity to seek an appropriate protective order.
- C. These obligations of confidentiality and non-disclosure shall remain in effect for a period of five (5) years after the termination of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 18. Organizational Conflicts of Interest

- A. Subcontractor warrants that, to the best of the Subcontractor's knowledge and belief, there are no relevant facts or circumstances which could give rise to an organizational conflict of interest or that the Subcontractor has disclosed all such relevant information.
- B. Subcontractor agrees that if an actual or potential organizational conflict of interest is discovered after award, the Subcontractor will make a full disclosure in writing to the RTI Subcontract Administrator. This disclosure shall include a description of activities that the Subcontractor has taken or proposes to take, after consultation with the RTI Subcontract Administrator, to avoid, mitigate, or neutralize the actual or potential conflict.
- C. The RTI Subcontract Administrator may terminate this Subcontract for convenience, in whole or in part, if it deems such termination necessary to avoid an organizational conflict of interest. If the Subcontractor was aware of a potential organizational conflict of interest prior to award, or discovered an actual or potential conflict after award and did not disclose or misrepresented relevant information to the RTI Subcontract Administrator, RTI may terminate the contract for default, and/or forward the relevant information to the Government Contracting Officer, who may debar the Subcontractor from Government contracting, and/or pursue such other remedies as may be permitted by law or this Subcontract.
- D. Subcontractor further agrees to insert provisions which shall conform substantially to the language of this Section, including this paragraph (d), in any lower-tier subcontract or consultant agreement hereunder.

ARTICLE 19. Right to Publish/Release of Information

- A. Subcontractor agrees that it will not publish, have published or otherwise disseminate any information of whatever nature resulting from the work being performed under this Agreement without providing RTI 60 days to review prior to publishing, and as applicable, all such publications shall also comply with Articles 20 and 21 as set forth herein.
- B. Subcontractor and RTI mutually agree not to use the other party's name or make reference to the other party or any of its employees in publications, news releases, advertising, speeches, technical papers, photographs, sales promotions, or publicity purposes of any form related to this work or data developed hereunder, unless such materials have received prior written approval of the other party. Approvals shall not be unreasonably withheld. Unless specifically restricted in the Subcontract, use of either party's name may be made in internal documents, annual reports, and data bases which are available to the public and which identify the existence of the research project by title, principal investigator, sponsor, period of funding, amount of award and abstract of the project.
- C. Subcontractor shall not use or duplicate any proprietary information including trade secrets belonging to or supplied by RTI, except as authorized by RTI in the performance of services or work under this Agreement.
- D. Any program, document, data or information supplied by Subcontractor to Client through RTI may be used, copied or disclosed by Client as necessary in the normal course of its business, notwithstanding any copyright of Subcontractor in such materials and notwithstanding any notices or legends appearing thereon.

ARTICLE 20. Publication and Audio-Visual Production (Department of Education Flow-down Provision)

Except as provided herein, neither the development nor production of any publication or audiovisual product is authorized. In the event that development or production of any publication or audiovisual product subsequently becomes a Subcontract requirement (expressed or implied), the Subcontractor shall obtain written approval from the RTI Subcontract Administrator. Until the Subcontractor obtains such RTI Subcontract Administrator approval, no costs for development or production of the publication or audiovisual product shall be allowable. The following items are excepted from the approval requirements of the clause: 1. Up to 50 copies of progress and final reports. The Subcontractor shall insure that any publication or audiovisual product developed or produced under this Subcontract is compatible with the Department of Education's responsibilities under the Sections 504 and 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. 794 and 794d, as amended, to ensure the accessibility of its programs and activities to individuals with disabilities. The Subcontractor shall not distribute or release to the public any publication or audiovisual product developed or produced under this Subcontract without written authorization of the Department of Education and the Research Triangle Institute. To obtain this authorization, the Subcontractor shall submit 3 copies of the publication or audiovisual product to the RTI Subcontract Administrator for submission to the Department of Education. Since the Department of Education must obtain internal public affairs or other clearances, the Subcontractor shall plan at least **60** days to obtain authorization from RTI.

ARTICLE 21. Publication and Publicity (Department of Education Flow-down Provision)

- A. Unless otherwise specified in this subcontract, the subcontractor is encouraged to publish and otherwise promote the results of its work under this subcontract. A copy of each article or work submitted by the subcontractor for publication shall be promptly sent to the Contracting Officer's Technical Representative, via the RTI Subcontract Administrator. The subcontractor shall also inform the representative when the article or work is published and furnish a copy in the published form.
- B. The subcontractor shall acknowledge the support of the Department of Education in publicizing the work under this contract in any medium. This acknowledgment shall read substantially as follows: "This project has been funded at least in part with Federal funds from the U.S. Department of Education under contract number *ED04C00036/0002*, Task Order #18. The content of this publication does not necessarily reflect the views or policies of the U.S. Department of Education or RTI International, nor does mention of trade names, commercial products, or organizations imply endorsement by the U.S. Government."

ARTICLE 22. Indemnification

- A. Subcontractor shall indemnify and hold RTI harmless from any loss, damage, liability, claims, demands, suits, or judgments including any reasonable attorney's fees, and costs, as a result of any damage of injury to RTI or its employees, or agents, or properties, or for any injury to third persons or their property which is directly or indirectly caused by the negligence willful misconduct, or violation of statutory duties of Subcontractor, or its employees or agents, in the course of performance of any work specified in this Subcontract.
- B. RTI shall promptly notify Subcontractor of any claim which is covered by this provision and shall authorize representatives to settle or defend such claim or suit and to represent the other party in such litigation.

ARTICLE 23. Infringement Indemnity

In addition to any other warranty by Subcontractor against infringement, statutory or otherwise, Subcontractor shall defend at its expense, any suit against RTI or RTI's Client based on a claim that any item furnished by Subcontractor under this Subcontract or the normal use or sale thereof infringes any U.S. Letters patent or copyright, and shall pay costs and damages finally awarded in any such suit, provided that Subcontractor is notified in writing of the suit and given authority, information, and assistance at Subcontractor's expense for the defense of same. If the use or sale of said item is enjoined as a result of such suit, Subcontractor, at no expense to RTI, shall obtain for RTI and RTI's Client the right to use and sell said item or shall substitute an equivalent item reasonably acceptable to RTI and extend this patent indemnity thereto.

ARTICLE 24. Governing Law

This Subcontract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of North Carolina. No consideration shall be given to North Carolina's conflict of laws rules. This Subcontract excludes the application of the 1980 United Nations Convention on Contracts for the International Sale of Goods.

ARTICLE 25. Compliance with Laws

Subcontractor shall comply with all applicable statutes and government rules, regulations and orders, including those pertaining to United States Export Controls.

ARTICLE 26. Excusable Delays

FAR 52.249-14, "Excusable Delays," is incorporated by reference. "Contractor" means Subcontractor and "Contracting Officer" means RTI.

ARTICLE 27. Stop Work Order

In the event that RTI must initiate a "Stop Work" order under this Subcontract, the notification will be made in accordance with the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) clause entitled, "Stop Work Order".

ARTICLE 28. Labor Disputes

Whenever Subcontractor has knowledge that any actual or potential labor dispute is delaying or threatens to delay the timely performance of this Subcontract, Subcontractor shall immediately (within 5 calendar days) give notice thereof, including all relevant information, to RTI.

ARTICLE 29. Disputes

- A. Disputes under RTI's Prime Contract. RTI's Prime Contract includes a mandatory disputes clause (the "Disputes Clause") which governs the resolution of questions of law or fact relating to RTI's Prime Contract. All of Subcontractor claims, controversies or disputes concerning matters which pertain to disputes cognizable under the Disputes Clause of RTI's Prime Contract shall be governed by the provisions of this Paragraph and Subcontractor shall provide RTI with a timely and detailed written notice of any such claims or controversies. Any Final Decision of the Government Contracting Officer under RTI's Prime Contract relating to the Subcontract or the Subcontractor's performance hereunder shall be conclusive and binding upon the Subcontractor unless appealed and reversed as provided below. RTI shall notify the Subcontractor of any such Final Decision within ten (10) calendar days of RTI receipt thereof.
- B. In the event RTI elects to appeal any such Final Decision, pursuant to the Disputes Clause of RTI's Prime Contract, the Subcontractor shall provide RTI with reasonable assistance in the prosecution of such appeal including, but not limited to, reasonable access to the Subcontractor's personnel and non-privileged documents. The Subcontractor further agrees to reimburse RTI for any and all reasonable costs associated with an appeal arising out of or relating to the Subcontract, taken on behalf of the Subcontractor. However, if the Subcontractor notifies RTI in writing that such an appeal should not be taken on the Subcontractor's behalf, RTI shall have the right to continue such an appeal on behalf of RTI and the Subcontractor with the Subcontractor providing reasonable assistance in the prosecution of such an appeal as described herein.
- C. In the event RTI elects not to appeal any such Final Decision pursuant to the Disputes Clause of RTI's Prime Contract, RTI shall so notify the Subcontractor in writing within fourteen (14) calendar days of RTI's receipt of such Final Decision. If within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of RTI's notice of a decision not to appeal any such Final Decision, the Subcontractor requests RTI, in writing, to appeal the Government Contracting Officer's Final Decision, RTI shall do so at the sole expense of the Subcontractor provided such an appeal would not be in violation of any civil or criminal statute. If RTI appeals any such Final Decision, whether at its election or at the Subcontractor's request, a final judgment in any such appeal, if binding upon RTI under RTI's Prime Contract, shall in turn be binding upon the Subcontractor and RTI under the Subcontract. Further, the Subcontractor shall be solely responsible for providing any and all certifications required, including, but not limited to any certifications required by the Contract Disputes Act of 1978, 41 U.S.C. §§ 601-613, to the extent applicable, and any and all information requested by RTI to support any certifications required for appeals pursuant to the Disputes Clause of RTI's Prime Contract.
- D. As used herein, the term "appeal" shall include any and all proceedings taken by RTI before a Government agency, and, if applicable, a Board of Contract Appeals, and any federal court. The Subcontractor shall be conclusively bound by any decision of any such dispute resolution forum or tribunal designated in the Prime Contract. Pending completion of contract or final disposition of a dispute pursuant to this Paragraph which releases Subcontractor from performance, the Subcontractor shall, at all times, proceed diligently with the performance of the Subcontract.
- E. Subcontract Dispute Resolution under the Subcontract. In the event a question, claim or dispute between the parties is not cognizable under this Article, Disputes under the Prime Contract, such question, claim or dispute shall

be settled by mutual agreement between the parties. If an agreement is not reached within a reasonable time, the parties may settle such disputes by arbitration in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association in the City of Raleigh, North Carolina. Pending completion of the Subcontract or final disposition of a dispute pursuant to this Paragraph which releases Subcontractor from performance, the Subcontractor shall, at all times, proceed diligently with the performance of the Subcontract.

ARTICLE 30. Litigation

- A. Subcontractor shall provide written notice to RTI of any litigation that relates to the services directly or indirectly financed under this contract or that has the potential to impair the ability of the Subcontractor to fulfill the terms and conditions of this Subcontract, including but not limited to financial, legal or any other situation which may prevent the Subcontractor from meeting its obligations on the Subcontract.
- B. Subcontractor shall provide written notice to RTI of any final decision by any tribunal, state or federal agency, or court which is adverse to the Subcontractor which results in a settlement, compromise, claim, or agreement of any kind for any action or proceeding brought against the contractor or its employee or agent under the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, and any other provisions of federal or state law concerning equal employment opportunities or nondiscriminatory practices.

ARTICLE 31. Termination/Cancellation

- A. If Subcontractor shall be adjudged bankrupt, or becomes insolvent or file for voluntary bankruptcy or be subjected to involuntary bankruptcy proceedings, or enter receivership proceedings, or make an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or if Subcontractor should persistently or repeatedly refuse or should fail, except in cases for which extension of time is provided, to supply enough properly skilled workmen or proper materials, or if Subcontractor should fail to make prompt payment to subcontractors for material or labor, or otherwise is guilty of a violation on any provision of this Subcontract, including delivery delays beyond fifteen (15) days after specified delivery date, or as otherwise specified in the Subcontract, then RTI, without prejudice to any of the other rights or remedies expressly provided by law, may cancel this Subcontract, or any part hereof, by written notice to Subcontractor and shall have the right thereafter to take possession of all materials, equipment and the like, the cost of which has been reimbursed by RTI to Subcontractor, in such cases of termination, RTI shall be relieved of all further obligations hereunder. In the event that RTI incurs any additional costs as a result of the default by Subcontractor, RTI shall have the right to hold Subcontractor accountable for any such additional costs or damages incurred by RTI.
- B. If RTI, shall be adjudged bankrupt, or become insolvent or file for voluntary bankruptcy or be subjected to involuntary bankruptcy proceedings, or enter receivership proceedings, or make an assignment for the benefit of creditors, then Subcontractor, without prejudice to any of the other rights or remedies expressly provided by law, may cancel this Subcontract, or any part hereof, by written notice to RTI and shall have the right there to retain possession of all materials, equipment and the like, the cost of which has not been reimbursed by RTI to Subcontractor, in such cases of termination, Subcontractor shall be relieved of all further obligations hereunder.
- C. RTI at its own option may, upon written notice to Subcontractor, cancel this Subcontract in whole or in part, at any time, whether or not Subcontractor is in default of any of its obligations hereunder. Upon such cancellation, Subcontractor agrees to waive any claim for damages, including loss of anticipated profits on account hereof. However, RTI agrees that Subcontractor shall be paid an amount which when added to all installments previously paid will equal the sum of all costs properly incurred up to the date of cancellation, plus earned profit on such incurred costs, and any reasonable cost incurred as a result of such cancellation as agreed to between RTI and Subcontractor. In no event shall such payments be greater than the original Subcontract price or available funding whichever is less. All earned profit shall bear the same relationship to such incurred costs as the profit increment of the purchase price bears to the cost increment of such purchase price.
- D. RTI reserves the right to verify the amounts of any cost and profit increments claimed by Subcontractor, through an audit of Subcontractor's records.

ARTICLE 32. Insurance

- A. Upon execution of the Subcontract, Subcontractor certifies that it maintains and also that it shall require any lower-tier Subcontractor to maintain throughout this Subcontract the following insurance at, or in excess of, the limits detailed below.

- Worker's compensation and employer's liability insurance as required by the state or province where the work is performed.
- Comprehensive automobile and vehicle liability insurance covering claims for injuries to members of the public and/or damages to property of others arising from use of motor vehicles, including on-site and off-site operations, and owned, non-owned, or hired vehicles, with \$1,000,000 combined single limits.
- Commercial general liability insurance covering claims for injuries to members of the public or damage to property of others arising out of any negligent act or omission of the Subcontractor or of any of its employees, agents, or lower-tier subcontractors, with \$1,000,000 combined single limits.

B. Subcontractor's insurance policy shall name as an additional insured:

"RTI International and its subsidiaries, affiliates, officers, directors, and employees"

C. Subcontractor shall provide to RTI, upon Subcontract execution, a certificate of insurance depicting the insurance requirements set forth in this Article.

ARTICLE 33. Assumption of Liability; Waiver and Release

In consideration of the mutual covenants, terms and conditions contained in this Subcontract, it is understood and agreed that Subcontractor hereby assumes full responsibility for any and all claims, causes of action, demands, liabilities, fines, penalties, losses, damages, costs and expenses of whatsoever nature, including attorneys' fees, resulting from but not limited to, death, bodily injury, and damage to property and the environment, arising out of or connected with any act or omission of the Subcontractor and/or performance of services pursuant to this Subcontract by Subcontractor, its agents, subcontractors, employees or assigns, and hereby releases and discharges RTI from any responsibility whatsoever for any such claims, demands, losses or expense, unless caused by or resulting from a material breach of this Subcontract by RTI which is not cured within a reasonable period of time following actual receipt by RTI of written notice describing the nature of such breach.

ARTICLE 34. Standards of Ethics and Business Conduct

- A. RTI has established very high ethical standards for our employees. RTI considers adherence to the RTI Code of Conduct as well as strict observance of all U.S. and non U.S. laws and regulations to be not only a legal requirements but more than that, an ethical obligation for all. While performing as an RTI Subcontractor, you are expected to adopt and comply with these same standards. As a result, this Subcontract incorporates by reference, with the same force and effect as if it was given in full text, RTI's "Code of Conduct." The applicable standards can be accessed on the RTI website at <http://www.rti.org/pubs/CodeConduct.pdf>. Upon request, the Subcontract Administrator can provide paper copies of these standards.
- B. If Subcontractor has a good faith reason to believe that any violation of the Code of Conduct has been committed by an employee(s) of either RTI or Subcontractor or anyone affiliated with Subcontractor, Subcontractor shall report such violation to RTI by calling the RTI's Ethics Helpline toll-free at 1-877-212-7220 or sending an e-mail to Ethics@rti.org.

ARTICLE 35. Executive Order on Terrorism Financing

Subcontractor is reminded that U.S. Executive Orders and U.S. law prohibits transactions with, and the provisions of resources and support to, individuals and organizations associated with terrorism. It is the legal responsibility of Subcontractor to ensure compliance with these Executive Orders and laws. This provision must be included in all subcontracts/subawards issued under this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 36. Export Controls

- A. Subcontractor agrees to comply with all U.S. export control laws and regulations, specifically including but not limited to, the requirements of the Arms Export Control Act, 22 U.S.C. 2751-2794, including the International Traffic in Arms Regulation (ITAR), 22 C.F.R. 120 et seq.; and the Export Administration Act, 50 U.S.C. app. 2401-2420, including the Export Administration Regulations, 15 C.F.R. 730-774; including the requirement for obtaining any export license or agreement, if applicable. Without limiting the foregoing, Subcontractor agrees that it will not transfer any export controlled item, data, or services, to include transfer to foreign persons employed by or associated with, or under contract to Subcontractor or Subcontractor's lower-tier subcontractors, without the authority of an export license, agreement, or applicable exemption or exception.

- B. Subcontractor agrees to notify RTI if any deliverable under this Subcontract is restricted by export control laws or regulations.
- C. Subcontractor shall immediately notify the RTI Subcontract Administrator if Subcontractor is, or becomes listed in any Denied Parties List or if Subcontractor's export privileges are otherwise denied, suspended or revoked in whole or in part by any U.S. Government entity or agency.
- D. If Subcontractor is engaged in the business of either exporting or manufacturing (whether exporting or not) defense articles or furnishing defense services, Subcontractor represents that it is registered with the Office of Defense Trade Controls, as required by the ITAR, and it maintains an effective export/import compliance program in accordance with the ITAR.
- E. Where Subcontractor is a signatory under a RTI export license or export agreement, Subcontractor shall provide prompt notification to the RTI Subcontract Administrator in the event of changed circumstances including but not limited to, ineligibility, a violation or potential violation of the ITAR, and the initiation or existence of a U.S. Government investigation, that could affect Subcontractor's performance under the Subcontract.
- F. Subcontractor shall be responsible for all losses, costs, claims, causes of action, damages, liabilities and expense, including attorney's fees, all expense of litigation and/or settlement, and court costs, arising from any act or omission of Subcontractor, its officers, employees, agents, or subcontractors at any tier, in the performance of any of its obligations under this Article.
- G. If the technical data required to perform this Subcontract is subject to ITAR, Subcontractor shall comply with the following:
 - (i) The technical data shall be used only to manufacture the work required by this Subcontract; and
 - (ii) The data shall not be disclosed to any other person except lower-tier subcontractors within the same country; and;
 - (iii) Any rights in the data may not be acquired by any foreign person; and
 - (iv) Subcontractor, including lower-tier subcontractors, shall return, or at RTI's direction, destroy all of the technical data exported to Subcontractor pursuant to this Subcontract upon fulfillment of its terms; and
 - (v) Unless otherwise directed by RTI, Subcontractor shall deliver the work only to RTI or to an agency of the U.S. Government
 - (vi) Subcontractor shall include the terms of this paragraph (g) in all lower-tier subcontracts issued when technical data is provided to the lower-tier subcontractor.

ARTICLE 37. Foreign Corrupt Practices Act

Subcontractor acknowledges and understands that it must comply fully with the anti-bribery provisions of the U.S. Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, as amended ("FCPA"). Specifically, Subcontractor understands and agrees that it shall be unlawful for the Subcontractor and/or any officer, director, employee or agent of the Subcontractor to make any kind of offer, payment, promise to pay, or authorization of the payment of any money, or offer, gift, promise to give, or authorization of the giving of anything of value to either:

- (a) any foreign official (or foreign political party) for purposes of either influencing any act or decision of such foreign official in his official capacity, or inducing such foreign official to do or omit to do any act in violation of the lawful duty of such official, or securing any improper advantage, or inducing such foreign official to use his influence with a foreign government, or instrumentality thereof, to affect or influence any act or decision of such government or instrumentality in order to assist such person in obtaining or retaining business for or with, or directing business to any person; or
- (b) to any person, while knowing that all or a portion of such money or thing of value will be offered, given, or promised, directly or indirectly, to any foreign official (or foreign political party), or to any candidate for foreign political office, for any of the prohibited purposes described above.

Further, Subcontractor acknowledges that "foreign official" means any officer or employee of a foreign government or any department, agency or instrumentality thereof, or of a public international organization, or any person acting in an official capacity for or on behalf of any such government or department, agency, or instrumentality, or for or on behalf of any such public international organization, including employees of government-owned companies in South Africa.

ARTICLE 38. Debarment and Suspension

In accepting this Subcontract, the Subcontractor certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any Federal department or agency. Any change in the debarred or suspended status of the Subcontractor during the life of this Subcontract must be reported immediately to RTI. The Subcontractor agrees to incorporate the Debarment and Suspension certification into any lower-tier subcontract that they may enter into as a part of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 39. Utilization of Small Business Concerns

Subcontractor agrees to actively seek out and provide the maximum practicable opportunities for small businesses, small disadvantaged businesses, women-owned small businesses, minority business enterprises, historically black colleges and universities and minority institutions, Historically Underutilized Business Zone small business concerns and U.S. Veteran and Service-Disabled Veteran Owned small business concerns to participate in the subcontracts Subcontractor awards to the fullest extent consistent with the efficient performance of this Subcontract.

ARTICLE 40. Validity and Waiver

The invalidity in whole or in part of any provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity of other provisions. A waiver of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any subsequent breach of that provision or a breach of any other provision of this Agreement. The failure of RTI to enforce at any time or from time to time any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver thereof.

ARTICLE 41. Government Federal Acquisition Regulation Clauses and Supplements

Subcontractor shall perform the Services in accordance with the attached Federal Acquisition Regulations ("FAR")(48 CFR Chapter I) and FAR Supplementary Regulations. Subcontractor's attention is specifically directed to the list of applicable FAR clauses set forth in Appendix C. These clauses are attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

ARTICLE 42. Electronic Contracting

The parties agree that if this Subcontract is transmitted electronically neither party shall contest the validity of this Subcontract, or any Acknowledgement thereof, on the basis that this Subcontract or Acknowledgement contains an electronic signature.

ARTICLE 43. Survivability

A. If this Subcontract expires, is completed, or is terminated, Subcontractor shall not be relieved of those obligations contained in the following Articles:

- Independent Contractor
- Governing Law
- Indemnification
- Infringement Indemnity
- Confidential Information
- Right to Publish/Release of Information
- Insurance
- Export Controls
- Electronic Contracting

A. Those U.S. Government Federal Acquisition Regulation and Agency Supplementary Regulation(s) provisions that by their nature should survive.

ARTICLE 44. Order of Precedence

Any inconsistency in this Subcontract shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

1. Terms and Conditions of this Subcontract, including the appendices hereto

2. Incorporated FAR and Agency clauses, Appendix C
3. Subcontractor's proposal, if incorporated herein.

ARTICLE 45. Entire Agreement

Both parties acknowledge that they have read this Subcontract, understand it, and agree to be bound by its terms and further agree that it is the entire agreement between the parties hereto which supercedes all prior agreements, written or oral, relating to the subject matter hereof. No modification or waiver of any provision shall be binding unless in writing signed by the party against whom such modification or waiver is sought to be enforced.

Appendix C: Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) Clauses

If this Subcontract involves funds from a Federal government contract, or funds from a subcontract at any tier relating to a Federal government contract, the following clauses from the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) are incorporated into the Subcontract by reference where applicable and form a part of the terms and conditions of the Subcontract. The full text of the FAR clauses may be found at <http://www.arnet.gov/far/>. Subcontractor agrees to flow down all applicable FAR and supplementary clauses to lower-tier subcontractors.

Where necessary to make the language of the FAR clauses applicable to the Subcontract, the term "Contractor" shall mean "Subcontractor," the term "Contract" shall mean the "Subcontract," the terms "Government," "Contracting Officer," and equivalent terms and phrases shall mean "Research Triangle Institute or RTI International Subcontract Administrator."

The following instances are exceptions to the general rules as provided in (a) above:

1. Where it is clear, by the context of the provision itself or the conditions under which it is being applied, that the reference is intended to refer to the Government, its officers or agents, or the prime contractor specifically;
2. Where an explicit provision of this Agreement states a contrary intent;
3. Where access to proprietary financial information or other proprietary data is required; or
4. Where interpretation in accordance with the rules stated above would place the prime contractor in a position of violating the equivalent or related provisions of the Prime Contract whereas construction of the terms without modification would not.

References in any provision incorporated by reference herein to the "Disputes" clause shall be construed as references to the "Disputes" provision contained elsewhere herein. No provision herein shall be taken to imply any direct access on the part of the Subcontractor to the Disputes process as defined in the terms of the Prime Contract.

1. 306-2 ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR CONTROL OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY (JAN 1989)

(A) The contractor shall request written authorization from the contracting officer before acquiring any contractually necessary property to which the Government will have title. The request shall include complete descriptions of all individual items which will exceed \$1,000 in cost, including:

- (a) a brief statement of function;
- (b) manufacturer and manufacturer's brand name, model or part number;
- (c) vendor and its proposed price;

(B) Management of government property in the possession of the contractor shall be in accordance with FAR Part 45. The contractor shall provide an annual report of total property acquisition cost, as required by FAR 45.505-14.

4. 307-17 ORGANIZATIONAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST (ED 307-17) (Aug 2007)

(A) The contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant, has certified that, to the best of their knowledge and belief, there are no relevant facts or circumstances which could give rise to an organizational or personal conflict of interest, (see FAR Subpart 9.5 for organizational conflicts of interest), (or apparent conflict of interest) for the organization or any of its staff, and that the contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant has disclosed all such relevant information if such a conflict of interest appears to exist to a reasonable person with knowledge of the relevant facts (or if such a person would question the impartiality of the contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant). Conflicts may arise in the following situations:

1. Unequal access to information - a potential contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant has access to non-public information through its performance on a government contract.
2. Biased ground rules - a potential contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant has worked, in one government contract, or program, on the basic structure or ground rules of another government contract,
3. Impaired objectivity - a potential contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant, or member of their immediate family (spouse, parent or child) has financial or other interests that would impair, or give the appearance of impairing, impartial judgment in the evaluation of government programs, in offering advice or recommendations to the government, or in providing technical assistance or other services to recipients of Federal funds as part of its contractual responsibility.

"Impaired objectivity" includes but is not limited to the following situations that would cause a reasonable person with knowledge of the relevant facts to question a person's objectivity:

- financial interests or reasonably foreseeable financial interests in or in connection with products, property, or services that may be purchased by an educational agency, a person, organization, or institution in the course of implementing any program administered by the Department;
- significant connections to teaching methodologies that might require or encourage the use of specific products, property or services; or
- significant identification with pedagogical or philosophical viewpoints that might require or encourage the use of a specific curriculum, specific products, property or services, Contractors must provide the disclosure described above on any actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest) of interest regardless of their opinion that such a conflict or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest) would not impair their objectivity.

In a case in which an actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest) is disclosed, the Department will take appropriate actions to eliminate or address the actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest), including but not limited to mitigating or neutralizing the conflict, when appropriate, through such means as ensuring a balance of views, disclosure with the appropriate disclaimers, or by restricting or modifying the work to be performed to avoid or reduce the conflict. In this clause, the term "potential conflict" means reasonably foreseeable conflict of interest.

(B) The contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant agrees that if "impaired objectivity, or an actual or potential conflict of interest (or apparent conflict of interest) is discovered after the award is made, it will make a full disclosure in writing to the Contracting Officer. This disclosure shall include a description of actions that the Contractor has taken or proposes to take, after consultation with the Contracting Officer, to avoid, mitigate, or neutralize the actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest).

(C) Remedies - The Government may terminate this contract for convenience, in whole or in part, if it deems such termination necessary to avoid the appearance of a conflict of interest. If the Contractor was aware of a potential conflict of interest prior to award or discovered an actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest) after award and did not disclose or misrepresented relevant information to the Contracting Officer, the Government may terminate the contract for default, or pursue such other remedies as may be permitted by law or this contract. These remedies include imprisonment for up to five years for violation of Title 18, U.S. Code, § 1001 and fines of up to \$5000 for violation of Title 31, U.S. Code, § 3802. Further remedies include suspension or debarment from contracting with the federal government. The Contractor may also be required to reimburse the Department for costs

the Department incurs arising from activities related to conflicts of interest. An example of such costs would be those incurred in processing Freedom of Information Act requests related to a conflict of interest.

(D) In cases where remedies short of termination have been applied, the contractor, subcontractor, employee or consultant agrees to eliminate the organizational conflict of interest, or mitigate it to the satisfaction of the Contracting Officer.

(E) The Contractor further agrees to insert in any subcontract or consultant agreement hereunder, provisions which shall conform substantially to the language of this clause, including specific mention of potential remedies and this paragraph (E)."

5. 307-3 DUAL COMPENSATION (MARCH 1985)

If a project staff member, subcontractor, or consultant is involved in two or more projects, at least one of which is supported by Federal funds, he/she may not be compensated for more than 100 percent of his/her time during any part of the period of dual involvement. That is, an individual is prohibited from receiving double payment for any given period of work.

6. 308-2 RESEARCH ACTIVITIES INVOLVING HUMAN SUBJECTS (March 1999)

(a) Any research activities under this contract involving human subjects are governed by Department of Education (ED) regulations for the protection of human subjects in research, Title 34, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 97. Part 97 requires the contractor, subcontractors and any other entities involved in covered research activities to establish and maintain procedures for the protection of human subjects. The definitions in 34 CFR 97.102 applies to this clause. As used in this clause, "covered research" means research involving human subjects that is not exempt under 34 CFR 97.101(b) and 34 CFR 97.401(b). The requirements at Part 97 apply to all entities involved in covered research under this contract. The requirements of this clause apply to the Contractor, regardless of which entity performs the covered research. The contractor shall comply with Part 97 and shall ensure that each entity involved in covered research activities complies with Part 97.

(b) The Contractor agrees that the rights and welfare of human subjects involved in research under this contract shall be protected in accordance with 34 CFR Part 97 and with the Contractor's current Assurance of Compliance on file with ED or the Office for Protection from Research Risks, Department of Health and Human Services.

(c) Under no condition shall the Contractor conduct, or allow to be conducted, any covered research activity involving human subjects prior to the Department's receipt of the Certification that the research has been reviewed and approved by the Institutional Review Board (IRB) [34 CFR 97.103(f)]. No covered research involving human subjects shall be initiated under this contract until the Contractor has provided the Contracting Officer (or the Contracting Officer's designee) a properly completed Certification form certifying IRB review and approval of the research activity, and the Contracting Officer or designee has received the Certification. This restriction applies to the activities of each participating entity.

(d) In accordance with 34 CFR 97.109(e), an IRB must conduct continuing reviews of covered research activities at intervals appropriate to the degree of risk, but no less than once a year. Covered research activities that are expected to last one year or more are therefore subject to review by an IRB at least once a year.

(1) For each covered activity under this contract that requires continuing review, the contractor shall submit an annual written representation to the Contracting Officer (or the Contracting Officer's designee) stating whether covered research activities have been reviewed and approved by an IRB within the previous 12 months. The contractor may use Optional Form 310 for this representation. For multi-institutional projects, the contractor shall provide this information on its behalf and on behalf of any other entity engaged in covered research activities for which continuing IRB reviews are required.

(2) If the IRB disapproves, suspends, terminates or requires modification of any covered research activities under this contract, the Contractor shall immediately notify the Contracting Officer in writing of the IRB's action. (e) The Contractor shall bear full responsibility for performing as safely as is feasible all activities under this contract involving the use of human subjects and for complying with all applicable regulations and requirements concerning human subjects. No one (neither the Contractor, nor any subcontractor, agent or employee of the Contractor, nor any other person or organization, institution, or group of any kind whatsoever) involved in the performance of such activities shall be deemed to constitute an agent or employee of the Department of Education or of the Federal Government with respect to such activities. The Contractor agrees to discharge its obligations, duties, and

undertakings and the work pursuant thereto, whether requiring professional judgment or otherwise, as an independent Contractor without imputing liability on the part of the Government for the acts of the Contractor and its employees.

(f) Upon discovery of any noncompliance with any of the requirements or standards stated in paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) above, the Contractor shall immediately correct the deficiency. If at any time during performance of this contract, the Contracting Officer determines, in consultation with the Protection of Human Subjects Coordinator, Office of the Chief Financial and Chief Information Officer, or the sponsoring office, that the Contractor is not in compliance with any of the requirements or standards stated in paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) above, the Contracting Officer may immediately suspend, in whole or in part, work and further payments under this contract until the Contractor corrects such noncompliance. Notice of the suspension may be communicated by telephone and confirmed in writing.

(g) The Government may terminate this contract, in full or in part, for failure to fully comply with any regulation or requirement related to human subjects involved in research. Such termination may be in lieu of or in addition to suspension of work or payment. Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the Government's right to terminate the contract for failure to fully comply with such requirements.

7. 317-1 ACCOMMODATION/ACCESSIBILITY FOR THE DISABLED (OCTOBER 1999)

The acquisition and management of Federal Information Processing (FIP) resources shall be conducted in a manner that ensures access to computer and telecommunications products and services by all individuals, both federal employees and the public sector, including individuals with disabilities. The acquisition, management and utilization of FIP resources are subject to the computer accommodation and information accessibility for individuals with disabilities contained in Section 508 of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998, P.L. 105-220; Telecommunications Act of 1996, P.L. 104-104 February 1996, 110 Stat. 56; and in the Telecommunications Accessibility Enhancement Act, P.L. 100-542 October 1988. FIP resources required under this contract include computer accommodation and information accessibility where the goal is to ensure full access, integration, and continuity of support to all individuals, including individuals with disabilities. "Computer accommodation" means the acquisition or modification of FIP resources to minimize the functional limitations of individuals with disabilities so as to promote productivity and provide access to work-related or public information resources. "Individuals with disabilities" are individuals with limitations of vision, hearing, speech and/or mobility. The contractor shall ensure that FIP resources are equally provided to all individuals, including individuals with disabilities.

8. 52.224-1 PRIVACY ACT NOTIFICATION (APR 1984)

The Contractor will be required to design, develop, or operate a system of records on individuals, to accomplish an agency function subject to the Privacy Act of 1974, Public Law 93-579, December 31, 1974 (5 U.S.C. 552a) and applicable agency regulations. Violation of the Act may involve the imposition of criminal penalties.

9. 52.224-2 PRIVACY ACT (APR 1984)

(a) The Contractor agrees to--

(1) Comply with the Privacy Act of 1974 (the Act) and the agency rules and regulations issued under the Act in the design, development, or operation of any system of records on individuals to accomplish an agency function when the contract specifically identifies--

- (i) The systems of records; and
- (ii) The design, development, or operation work that the contractor is to perform;

(2) Include the Privacy Act notification contained in this contract in every solicitation and resulting subcontract and in every subcontract awarded without a solicitation, when the work statement in the proposed subcontract requires the redesign, development, or operation of a system of records on individuals that is subject to the Act; and

(3) Include this clause, including this subparagraph (3), in all subcontracts awarded under this contract which requires the design, development, or operation of such a system of records.

(b) In the event of violations of the Act, a civil action may be brought against the agency involved when the violation concerns the design, development, or operation of a system of records on individuals to accomplish an agency function, and criminal penalties may be imposed upon the officers or employees of the agency when the violation concerns the operation of a system of records on individuals to accomplish an agency function. For purposes of the

Act, when the contract is for the operation of a system of records on individuals to accomplish an agency function, the Contractor is considered to be an employee of the agency.

(c)(1) "Operation of a system of records," as used in this clause, means performance of any of the activities associated with maintaining the system of records, including the collection, use, and dissemination of records.

(2) "Record," as used in this clause, means any item, collection, or grouping of information about an individual that is maintained by an agency, including, but not limited to, education, financial transactions, medical history, and criminal or employment history and that contains the person's name, or the identifying number, symbol, or other identifying particular assigned to the individual, such as a fingerprint or voiceprint or a photograph.

(3) "System of records on individuals," as used in this clause, means a group of any records under the control of any agency from which information is retrieved by the name of the individual or by some identifying number, symbol, or other identifying particular assigned to the individual.

10. 52.239-1 PRIVACY OR SECURITY SAFEGUARDS (AUG 1996)

(a) The Contractor shall not publish or disclose in any manner, without the Contracting Officer's written consent, the details of any safeguards either designed or developed by the Contractor under this contract or otherwise provided by the Government.

(b) To the extent required to carry out a program of inspection to safeguard against threats and hazards to the security, integrity, and confidentiality of Government data, the Contractor shall afford the Government access to the Contractor's facilities, installations, technical capabilities, operations, documentation, records, and databases.

(c) If new or unanticipated threats or hazards are discovered by either the Government or the Contractor, or if existing safeguards have ceased to function, the discoverer shall immediately bring the situation to the attention of the other party.

Appendix D: Statement of Work/Budget

Santa Ana GEAR UP Proposal Narrative

1. Study Objectives / Research Questions

The Continuous Improvement Evaluation Planning Award fits with Santa Ana GEAR UP's desire to more rigorously study the impact of an expansion to a long-standing instructional strategy – the Saturday Academy of Mathematics (SAM) - designed to support the learning of key Pre-Algebra and Algebra concepts by middle school GEAR UP students. The current SAM program goals include preparing middle school students achieving at grade level ("proficient level"), as measured by their scores in the California Standards Test (CST), for higher level mathematics courses in high school, particularly Geometry in 9th grade, and teaching students and their parents about the requirements for college. Additionally, teachers who participate as SAM teachers receive professional development designed to support pedagogy that increases student engagement in the SAM classroom as well as their regular classrooms. Follow-up studies of SAM Pre-Algebra academy graduates display high rates of enrollment in Algebra in 8th grade, and follow-up studies of SAM Algebra academy graduates demonstrate high rates of enrollment in Geometry in 9th grade. This implementation award will allow us the opportunity to expand this successful model to serve students who are performing below grade-level and scoring "basic" and "below basic" in the CST. Upon receipt of this implementation award, the University of California, Irvine Math Project faculty will revise the existing SAM curriculum to meet the needs of these at-risk students in order to ensure their success in Math after their participation in this supplemental intervention program. Ultimately, the goal of this research project is to explore factors that lead to the success of the program with rigorous evidence of the success of the strategy in preparing students for college-level mathematics in high school. The goal of the intervention and evaluation will be to determine if the redesigned SAM academies (1)

increase the success of at-risk students in higher level mathematics, (2) increase the capacity of middle school Math teachers to impact the teaching/learning process of students falling below grade level in Math, and (3) increase the capacity of principals to evaluate the teaching of higher level math in middle school.

Study Objectives:

1. Engage low performing students in the SAM academies at both GEAR UP intermediate schools to improve their achievement in Math.
2. Collect project-specific measures of mathematics learning during the academies from students in the matched comparison group as well as the academies.
3. Provide professional development to teachers to increase student engagement in learning mathematics in GEAR UP middle school in accordance with the strategy used in SAM to meet the needs of students who are struggling to be at grade-level in mathematics.
4. Provide tools to school administrators to assess the use of successful student engagement strategies in the Math classrooms.

This Santa Ana GEAR UP intervention addresses the second funding priority - successful completion of grade appropriate math. The Saturday Academy of Math is intended to support achievement in mathematics through successful completion of Pre-Algebra and Algebra coursework in middle school.

Research Questions:

The following research questions are aligned with the goals of the intervention and evaluation:

1. Does participation in the 7th grade Pre-Algebra Academy increase achievement by 20% or more for students who began well below grade level on 6th grade standards-based mathematics?
2. Does participation in the 8th grade Algebra Academy significantly increase achievement by 20% or more for students who began well below grade level on 7th grade standards-based mathematics?
3. Do teachers participating in the academies implement the professional development they receive through the intervention in their regular classrooms?

Intervention

The planned intervention fits into the category of revised use of a current strategy. The Saturday Academy of Mathematics (SAM) is an academic enrichment program offered during the academic year. SAM was developed as a collaborative effort between the University of California Irvine's Center for Educational Partnerships, Santa Ana GEAR UP, the Irvine Mathematics Project and participating Santa Ana Unified secondary schools. The program works with middle school students and is designed to accelerate the students' understanding of algebraic concepts through a challenging hands-on curriculum that is paired with a more individualized instruction. UC Irvine undergraduate students work alongside trained teachers to assist the instruction and serve as a coach to the students. SAM sessions are held on eight consecutive Saturday from 8 to noon at the school sites. SAM offers two academies throughout the school year. The SAM Algebra Academy works with students who are currently enrolled in 8th grade Algebra and received a satisfactory grade ("C" or better) in their previous math course and scored "proficient" (at grade level) in the CST. The SAM Pre-Algebra Academy works with

7th graders who are enrolled in Pre-Algebra and also demonstrated satisfactory completion in their prior math course and in the CST.

To ultimately increase the academic achievement of a greater number of students, the Santa Ana GEAR UP is proposing to redesign the existing SAM curriculum to address the need of those students performing below grade level - scoring "basic" or "below basic" in the California Standards Test (CST). A second proposed change to the existing model is to include 8 hours of professional development for administrators at each participating school on evaluating use of the SAM student engagement strategies in the regular classrooms at the schools during the academic year. And a third proposed change includes the engagement of parents in raising awareness to the importance of academic success in early college preparation.

Retrospective data from previous years of delivery of the academies to GEAR UP schools in the district has been collected; however project-specific learning outcomes have only been collected from participants in the academies. School outcomes, such as enrollment in higher level mathematics courses, have been collected from non-participants although these students may not be similar to the participants in the academies. Thus, the data that will be analyzed for the project will be collected during the intervention from both SAM academy students and matched students who do not participate in the academies.

The proposed intervention will be conducted at two GEAR UP middle schools, Carr Intermediate and McFadden Intermediate and will serve both 7th and 8th grade students. GEAR UP is currently in its first year of implementation at these two schools. At present, GEAR UP serves 7th graders as the first cohort. Next academic year (2010-2011), GEAR UP will continue serving these students as they move to the 8th grade and will add a new cohort of 7th graders.

As the table below shows, during spring 2011 7th grade students who are below grade level on their 6th grade end of year mathematics CST and enrolled in a Pre-Algebra class will be eligible for the Pre-Algebra Academy. During fall 2011, 8th grade students who are below grade level on their 7th grade end of year mathematics CST and currently enrolled in Algebra will be eligible for the Algebra Academy.

The target population for the academies includes students who are enrolled in the appropriate course (Pre-Algebra or Algebra) yet entered the course well below grade level based on the end-of-year standards-based mathematics test (CST) administered the previous spring. The strategies taught in the academies are aimed at helping Pre-Algebra students master the more difficult concepts that are covered during the second semester of instruction. For Algebra students, the

strategies are aimed at mastering key concepts during the first semester of Algebra, which will help them succeed during the second semester. The number of openings for the program per school will be limited to 75 students for each academy, pre-Algebra or Algebra - 25 students per SAM class held each semester for a total enrollment across the two schools of 150 students. The assignment method will use the participation eligibility variable (below grade level on the previous year's end of course standards based mathematics achievement test) and course enrollment. Previous grades and demographic variables will be used to individually match control students to the academy students.

The academies will be held over 8 consecutive Saturdays, and include 32 hours of instruction. Students will attend at their school site in classrooms of approximately 25 students. Teachers at the school site will be recruited to teach the academies and attend twelve hours of intensive training on the curriculum. Undergraduate students from UCI will be recruited to assist the teachers with the group-work that occurs during the academies - two undergraduate students per classroom. These undergraduate students will be carefully selected to ensure their interest and capacity in working with intermediate school students and participate in training on the SAM curriculum and strategies for engaging students. The academies in the intervention will begin in spring 2011 with pre-Algebra students in 7th grade. In fall 2011, the Algebra academies will begin, and the second cohort - 8th graders - will be offered the opportunity to participate.

This intervention addresses the second priority of increasing achievement in mathematics. Final grades in Pre-Algebra and Algebra courses will be collected as part of the evaluation, in addition to end of year mathematics achievement scores, subsequent enrollment in higher level mathematics, and subsequent achievement in those courses for students participating in 2011.

The Professional Development follows the research of Elmore (2002), Gándara, Maxwell-Jolly, and Driscoll (2005), Darling-Hammond (1999), and O'Shea (2005) by having the following goals:

- Increase teacher subject matter content knowledge in math, in particular their own grade level standards, by making the teachers active learners in lessons that will use constructivist strategies (Bransford, Brown, and Cocking, 2000) to address issues such as: early misconceptions, investigating, collecting data, finding patterns, and discussing results
- Increase teacher pedagogical content knowledge, especially how to engage all learners, specifically English Learners, by using manipulatives and scaffolding strategies (Echevarria, Vogt, & Short, 2000; McGrath, 2007)
- Increase teachers' own self-efficacy in implementing rigorous, standards-based lessons that incorporate problem-solving, higher order questions, the probing of student ideas and comments, and the promotion of student use of academic language (Lemke, 1990)

Each day of professional development will consist of approximately 75% hands-on lessons that the teachers will be using in their classrooms. The teachers will participate in as students to deepen their understanding of the content and gain practical wisdom in how to conduct the lesson. Effective teaching strategies will be woven into activities and overtly modeled throughout the content. A post-lesson discussion will allow teachers to analyze the lesson in terms of how to use it with students, why to use it with students and what to do during the lessons to ensure students are reaching the objectives. Resource books containing engaging, hands-on lessons will be purchased for the teachers, and the lessons will be modeled throughout the professional development.

Training for the principals will go beyond the instructional strategies for the SAM classes, which can then be used in the regular math classes. Principals will focus on how to assess the evidence of student engagement they observe when they go into the classroom. UCI faculty trainers will provide principals with a Peer Observation Protocol (PCOP) developed in a previous NSF grant (see appendix C). The tool allows the observer to record, in 5 minute intervals, what role the teacher and students are taking in terms of who is doing the talking, reading and writing, group size, cognitive level of the lesson, and teaching strategies used. The reverse side of this protocol contains questions to ask the teacher to begin a self-analysis of the lesson. Principals will be guided in the conversation to have with the teacher after his or her observation. Each observation will be followed up by a conversation allowing the teacher to see what worked and what did not, using student evidence.

2. Evaluation Methodology and Analysis Plan

The impact of SAM on the preparation and advancement of students to higher level mathematics courses in 8th and 9th grade will be studied using a non-equivalent groups design with assignment known through the use of a cut-score to place students into eligibility pools. The design will include a pretest of end of year grade level ability to determine eligibility, a pretest to determine the level of mathematics skill and knowledge students have at the beginning of the academy, a posttest of the same level of mathematics skills and knowledge immediately after the academy, and a final posttest of grade-level standards-based mathematics knowledge at the end of the academic year. The design is diagrammed as follows where O_1 is the project-specific measure and O_2 is the end of year measure:

Distributions on SAM academy pre- and posttests for Pre-Algebra and Algebra have been collected for years from the populations at the GEAR UP schools and expected means and standard deviations for these populations and gains observed after the academies are estimated to be similar as the new SAM academy test will have the same number of items (20) and the same overall level of difficulty. Furthermore, distributions on the standards-based mathematics test administered to 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students for the 2007-08 and 2008-09 academic years have also been studied to estimate expected means and gains between grade levels without treatment, as well as observed standard deviations for the scaled scores on each of these tests. Actual distributions for below grade level results were used to determine whether sufficient sample sizes.

For reliability purposes, two observations will be taken and averaged for the final comparison between teachers who taught SAM classrooms and teachers who did not teach SAM classrooms.

Assignment to Treatment

Students will be selected based on their scores on the eligibility pretest for each academy and randomized using a random digits table. The first 75 students on the randomized list will be invited to participate in each academy at each school since students vary somewhat on achievement levels at the individual schools. Students who decide not to participate in the academy will be flagged for further study to explore motivation. Once the classrooms have been filled, a matched control sample of the same number of students that are participating in the academy will be created from the students remaining in the eligibility pool. Matching variables will include achievement level on the eligibility pretest and language ability through the previous year's CELDT or language proficiency scores which are both applicable to all students who attended a school in the district the year before the study. Academy students will be ranked from highest to lowest on these matching variables and control students will be matched from the bottom to the top of the lists.

Measures

The primary student outcomes for measuring success will include pre- and post-project-specific learning measures in mathematics based on the curriculum used in the academies and the end of year California Standards Test (CST) mathematics achievement scores. The project specific test consists of 20 multiple choice questions with one correct answer. The pre- and posttest are identical tests. The California Standards Test (CST) in Mathematics scaled scores range from 150 to 600 points (check this), with the target populations at the GEAR UP schools averaging standard deviations of 40 – 50 points around the mean score. For the professional development outcomes, teacher and principal evaluations using classroom observations will be collected during at least two observation periods for each participating teacher. Each observation

protocol will be scored on up to 5 important dimensions and the scores from the observation protocols will be averaged to account for the variability in classroom assignments on any one day of observation. The observation protocol that will be used has been piloted and tested by the Irvine Math Project (IMP) at UC Irvine for 7 years. Interrater reliability estimates are available from IMP and were high for elementary classrooms in 2009. Agreement between principal observers and professional development observers will be calculated for each academy as part of the professional development program for administrators.

For the baseline measures, grade-level standards-based mathematics achievement test scores for the cohorts in the 2009-10 academic year will be used for both the treatment and control groups. School records will be used to obtain these baseline measures and the end of year standards-based mathematics outcome measures for the study. These measures are routinely collected through the annual GEAR UP evaluation reporting process fully disaggregated by students and classroom if needed. Finally, final course grades and placement in higher level mathematics will also be collected as part of the dissemination of impact on course-taking and preparation for high school mathematics. These data are fully disaggregated by students and by classroom.

Data Collection and Analysis

All outcome measures will be collected from both the intervention and control groups. To capture pre/post test results, whole classrooms will administer the project-specific mathematics test. Scores for students in the academies and the control groups will be selected from the class-wide administration. Incentives to teachers for facilitating this data collection will be provided in the budget, in addition to studies relating the project-specific test results to benchmark exams used by the schools (covered in the evaluation budget). The project-specific achievement data will be collected from the classrooms before and after the academies. School records will be

collected every semester or annually as they are normally available (see Table of Activities and Timeline under the Management section). Discussions with the schools will occur in advance to ensure that the classroom administration can be achieved in the manner planned. The data analysis plan includes comparisons on the outcomes between academy students and control students on levels of learning of mathematics concepts during the academies, final grades in their courses, proficiency on mathematics achievement tests at the end of the year, and course placement the subsequent year. The planned impact of a 20% increase or more on the project-based mathematics tests will be assessed using an analysis of covariance design (ANCOVA), assuming a target increase of 4 points for the treatment group and a standard deviation of 4 points (20 points possible). Depending on the reliability of the project-specific tests that are developed by the Irvine Math Project at UC Irvine, a modification recommended by Trochim (2006), in which the group means are subtracted from the pretest scores in the case of low reliability, will be carried out.

A power analysis assuming the target increase and standard deviation assumptions derived from previous analyses using SAM tests for more advanced students was conducted. The results showed that 32 subjects in each sample would yield a 99% level of power to find a significant difference at $p < .05$ (Kraemer & Thiemann, 1987). For the end of the year Mathematics CST outcomes, the same result was found for the targeted 50 point difference between groups at the end of the year. The expected sample of 150 for each group provides sufficient power to find significances for increases of lesser magnitude for both tests. If population differences are found between the schools, these differences will be controlled for using analysis of covariance (ANCOVA). ANCOVA can be used to include the pretest levels which were used to create the study eligibility pools, in the event that significant attrition occurs

in the academies. Using covariates to account for unexpected differences between the groups will reduce error, and boost power further to find a true significant difference between the group means (Creswell, 1994). With multiple covariates, a factorial design may be used or the effects may be modeled with a multiple regression model. All data management and analysis routines will be conducted with SPSS software (14.0).

3. Plan for Using Study Results

Study results will be used in three ways: (1) to expand the work of our local GEAR UP project to better serve the needs of GEAR UP students at risk of not achieving grade-level proficiency in Math and, therefore, have limited ability to achieve preparation for college, (2) develop a Math intervention that can improve student grade-level proficiency in similar communities throughout the country, and (3) contribute to the literature of what supplemental programs help in increasing math achievement in middle schools.

Our Santa Ana GEAR UP partnership is very interested in learning from the findings if this type of supplemental strategy, which has had significant success with the students working at grade level, could be a viable strategy for helping to improve the academic achievement of students working below grade level. For the first part of the impact plan, dissemination of the results of the study will be shared with the school district to encourage other middle schools to engage students who are not at grade level mathematics in middle school so that they may succeed in high school. We hope the study results will show an impact on the observed tendency of Algebra students to move from grade level competency to less than grade level competency by the end of 8th grade. Students who leave 8th grade not ready for Algebra are destined to repeat Algebra in 9th grade and sometimes beyond. This study will bring attention to addressing these student needs in particular.

For the second part of the impact study, presentations that address the underlying standards in the intervention which are applicable to other states in the union will be made to encourage other GEAR UP projects to consider implementing research-based supplemental strategies that can impact students most in need. Research findings together with technical assistance in establishing this model in other similar communities would be of great benefit to other educational partnerships looking for successful strategies to help raise the performance level of currently low performing students.

For the third part of the impact study, a research article in a refereed journal will be written and submitted to describe the program and the results obtained to a larger scholarly audience. This part of the plan will provide more evidence for GEAR UP as a successful program if the results show the positive impact that is expected from theory and anecdotal evidence provided by professional development providers and program coordinators. It is our aim to achieve a high-quality, rigorous research that will meet the high standards of the U.S. Department of Education's Institute of Education Sciences What Works Clearinghouse.

4. Work Plan

Key personnel in implementing the intervention and evaluation

Lilia Tanakeyowma, Ed.D., GEAR UP Director, Santa Ana College will have the ultimate responsibility in the overall implementation of the proposed intervention and, as Director of Santa Ana GEAR UP will work with both GEAR UP school administrators to ensure identification of math teachers to serve as SAM teachers, monitor participation of math teachers in professional development, and supervise the research study proposed. Dr. Tanakeyowma currently directs two GEAR UP projects under the auspices of the Santa Ana Partnership serving nearly 3,000 students in 2 middle schools and 2 high schools in the Santa Ana Unified School

District. The Santa Ana Partnership includes the Santa Ana Unified School District, California State University Fullerton, the University of California Irvine, the City of Santa Ana and several business and community based organizations serving central Santa Ana, the county seat for Orange County, California. Dr. Tanakeyowma serves as trainer for NCCEP's Capacity Building Workshops and has presented on successful GEAR UP strategies and numerous regional and national venues. She will use this expertise to lead dissemination efforts.

Santana Ruiz, is the Associate Director at the Center for Educational Partnerships at the University of California, Irvine. He is responsible for directing all k-12 academic preparation programs which includes; EAOP, GEAR UP, Upward Bound and American Indian programs. He also serves as the Director of Community College Programs; a regional collaborative strategy between the local community colleges and UCI focused on increasing transfer rates to the UC system. Mr. Ruiz will supervise the involvement of the Irvine Math Project faculty in the re-design of the SAM curriculum and leading the professional development component for the secondary school teachers selected to participate as SAM teachers; will supervise the coordinator who will work with schools to recruit secondary school teachers and recruit and train UCI undergraduate students.

Silvia Swigert, Director of Research and Evaluation, Center for Educational Partnerships, UC Irvine will have primary responsibility for developing and implementing the research study. Silvia Swigert has 13 years of experience working as an evaluator and research analyst in leadership training and educational research organizations and five years as a GEAR UP external evaluator at the Center for Educational Partnerships at the University of California, Irvine. She has a master's degree in Industrial and Organizational Psychology with a special emphasis on psychological and educational measurement. She is presently working towards a Ph.D. in

Education at the University of California, Los Angeles. Silvia currently serves as a Principal Analyst I with the Research and Evaluation unit at the Center for Educational Partnerships at UCI and oversees the evaluation of programs receiving over 7 million annually in federal and state grants. Silvia will lead the research study component of this project.

Viviana Ramos, Center for Educational Partnerships, UC-Irvine, and SAM Coordinator, Since 2005 Viviana has been working as the Saturday Academy in Mathematics (SAM) Program Coordinator through the Early Academic Outreach Program. As SAM Coordinator, Viviana has worked to implement and maintain the SAM curriculum in various school districts including: Santa Ana Unified, Montebello Unified, and Compton Unified. During the 2008-2009 academic year, over 800 students completed the SAM Program in both the middle school and high school level. She continues to work with students, parents, and school administrators in an effort to increase the number of students pursuing education in Santa Ana and Compton. Viviana will have primary responsibility for coordinating SAM at each GEAR UP school site, including supervising the undergraduate UCI students who will provide teaching support, will ensure logistical arrangements at each site, will administer program assessments to the students at the schools, and collect school records for the outcomes of the study, and will work with Padres Promotores to conduct the parent sessions as part of SAM orientation and concluding ceremony.

Development, implementation, and evaluation of this proposed intervention will involve the entire GEAR UP partnership team. Leaders from the Santa Ana Unified School District will be able to mobilize school principals as well as district administrators and research team, promote teacher participation, and coordinate facilities and communication needs. Leaders from UCI will engage the necessary discipline specific faculty to revise the SAM curriculum and will

make this research study a priority for the Research and Evaluation team at the Center for Educational Partnerships. Padres Promotores leaders from Santa Ana College will design 8 hours of parent training for the parents of students participating in SAM that will focus on awareness of academic achievement in early college preparation.

Key project members will meet monthly during the implementation phase of this proposed intervention. After each academy, a mini-conference will be held inviting teachers and principals from GEAR UP and non-GEAR UP schools in the SAUSD to discuss SAM and review the results of the intervention.

- financial interests or reasonably foreseeable financial interests in or in connection with products, property, or services that may be purchased by an educational agency, a person, organization, or institution in the course of implementing any program administered by the Department;
- significant connections to teaching methodologies or approaches that might require or encourage the use of specific products, property or services; or
- significant identification with pedagogical or philosophical viewpoints that might require or encourage the use of a specific curriculum, specific products, property or services, Subcontractor must provide the disclosure described above on any actual or potential conflict of interest (or apparent conflict of interest) regardless of their opinion that such a conflict or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest) would not impair their objectivity.

In a case in which an actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest) is disclosed, the Department will take appropriate actions to eliminate or address the actual or potential conflict, including but not limited to mitigating or neutralizing the conflict, when appropriate, through such means as ensuring a balance of views, disclosure with the appropriate disclaimers, or by restricting or modifying the work to be performed to avoid or reduce the conflict. In this clause, the term "potential conflict" means reasonably foreseeable conflict of interest.

(B) Subcontractor agrees that if impaired objectivity, or an actual or potential conflict of interest (or apparent conflict of interest) is discovered after the award is made, it will make a full disclosure in writing to the Contracting Officer through the RTI Subcontract Administrator. This disclosure shall include a description of actions that the Subcontractor has taken or proposes to take, after consultation with the Contracting Officer, to avoid, mitigate, or neutralize the actual or potential conflict (or apparent conflict of interest).

(C) Remedies - RTI may terminate this Subcontract for convenience, in whole or in part, if it and/or the Department of Education deems such termination necessary to avoid the appearance of a conflict of interest. If Subcontractor was aware of a potential conflict of interest prior to award or discovered an actual or potential conflict after award and did not disclose or misrepresented relevant information to the Contracting Officer through the RTI Subcontract Administrator, RTI may terminate the Subcontract for default, or pursue such other remedies as may be permitted by law or this Subcontract. The remedies that may be pursued by the Department of Education include imprisonment for up to five years for violation of Title 18, U.S. Code, § 1001 and fines of up to \$5000 for violation of Title 31, U.S. Code, § 3802. Further remedies include suspension or debarment from contracting with the federal government. Subcontractor may also be required to reimburse the

Department for costs the Department incurs arising from activities related to conflicts of interest. An example of such costs would be those incurred in processing Freedom of Information Act requests related to a conflict of interest.

- (D) In cases where remedies short of termination have been applied, Subcontractor agrees to eliminate the organizational conflict of interest, or mitigate it to the satisfaction of the Contracting Officer.
- (E) Subcontractor further agrees to insert in any lower-tier subcontract or consultant agreement hereunder, provisions which shall conform substantially to the language of this clause, including specific mention of potential remedies and this paragraph (E).

ATTACHMENT A -CONFLICT OF INTEREST CERTIFICATION

The Subcontractor, Rancho Santiago Community College District, hereby certifies that, to the best of their knowledge and belief, there are no present or currently planned interests (financial, contractual, organizational, or otherwise) relating to the work to be performed under the Subcontract that would create any actual or potential conflict of interest (or apparent conflicts of interest) (including conflicts of interest for immediate family members: spouses, parents, children) that would impinge on its ability to render impartial, technically sound, and objective assistance or advice or result in it being given an unfair competitive advantage. Membership - BP9003

Adopted 08/1/77; Revised

The Board of Trustees of the Rancho Santiago Community College District shall consist of seven members who shall each serve four-year terms. Trustees will reside in certain specified trustee areas, but be elected at large by the voters. Three trustees shall represent Area 1, one trustee Area 2, and three trustees Area 3 (see Board Policy 9004 for a description of trustee area boundaries).

It is the intent of the Board that beginning with the November 2012 election, each trustee will reside in one of seven specified trustee areas, and be elected by the voters residing in that area.

The Board of Trustees may change the methodology utilized for electing Board members in any manner consistent with law.

Any person who meets the criteria contained in law is eligible to be elected or appointed a member of the Board.

An employee of the district may not be sworn into office as an elected or appointed member of the governing board unless he or she resigns as an employee.

No member of the governing board shall, during the term for which he or she is elected, hold an incompatible office.

Trustee Areas - BP9004

Revised 12/10/01; Revised

TRUSTEE AREA ONE - THREE BOARD MEMBERS

Essentially this area includes the largest and western portion of Santa Ana, extending westerly to Euclid Street in Fountain Valley, and generally bounded by Westminster Avenue/17th Street to the north, Halladay to the east, and Sunflower Avenue on the South.

TRUSTEE AREA TWO - ONE BOARD MEMBER

Essentially this area includes the eastern portion of Santa Ana, and takes in small northerly sections of Irvine, Costa Mesa and Newport Beach in the John Wayne Airport area, extending past Jamboree Road to the southeast and south to the San Joaquin (73) Freeway, and is generally bounded to the north by LaVeta Avenue in Orange, Halladay Street and Rousselle Street to the west (north of Warner Avenue), south Bristol Street to the west (south of Warner Avenue), and Lyon Street to the east.

TRUSTEE AREA THREE - THREE BOARD MEMBERS

Essentially this area includes the northern portion of the Rancho Santiago Community College District, Orange, Villa Park, and Anaheim Hills, extending southerly to LaVeta Avenue in Orange and Westminster Avenue in Garden Grove, and westerly to Euclid Street. The eastern area extends along Santiago Canyon Road southerly to the Modjeska Canyon area, easterly to the county line, and to the Santa Ana River which forms the northern district boundary. It is the intent of the Board that the current configuration of three trustee areas will be replaced by a seven trustee area configuration prior to the November 2012 election.

Duties of the Officers - BP9008

Revised

At the annual organizational meeting, the Board shall elect from among its members a President of the Board, Vice President, Clerk.

A. President: It shall be the duty of the president to: ~~The president shall perform such other duties as are imposed by law or by action of the Board.~~

- Preside over all meetings of the Board;
- Represent the district at all official functions;
- Serve as the official spokesperson for the Board;
- Call emergency and special meetings of the Board as required by law;
- Consult with the Chancellor on board meeting agendas;
- Communicate with individual Board members about their responsibilities;
- Participate in the orientation process for new Board members;
- Assure Board compliance with policies on board education, self-evaluation and CEO evaluation;
- Represent the Board at official events or ensure board representation.

B. Vice-President: It shall be the duty of the vice president to serve in the absence of the president of the Board. The vice president shall perform such other duties as required by the president or by actions of the Board.

C. Clerk: It shall be the duty of the clerk to certify or attest to official actions taken by the Board and to monitor the making and maintenance of records as required by law.

D. Secretary: The Chancellor shall serve as Secretary to the Board.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to:

- Prepare the agenda for each meeting, in consultation with the Board president;
- Assure the official posting of the call of each meeting in compliance with law;
- Notify members of the Board of regular, special, emergency and adjourned meetings;
- Supervise the preparation of minutes of meetings for Board consideration and approval;
- Provide back-up data on all items to be under consideration;
- Attend all Board meetings and closed sessions, unless excused, and in such cases to assign a designee;
- Conduct the official correspondence of the Board;
- Certify as legally required all board actions;
- Sign, when authorized by law or by Board action, any documents that would otherwise require the signature of the Secretary or the Clerk of the Board.

The terms of officers shall be for one year.

The Board does not have an official system of rotation of officers; it elects the officers each year from among all its members.
