Mr. Hanna asked the chancellor to research this allegation and receive clarification on the opinion which appears to be an overly restrictive point of view with no apparent effort to determine another way to supplement these programs.

AFFILIATION AGREEMENT

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY ASSISTANT PROGRAM

THIS AFFILIATION AGREEMENT FOR STUDENT TRAINING (the "Agreement") is made and entered into as of September 09, 2014, by and between **White Memorial Medical Center**, a California nonprofit religious corporation ("HOSPITAL"), and **Rancho Santiago Community College district** ("SCHOOL") a California Corporation. SCHOOL and HOSPITAL are sometimes referred to in this Agreement as a "Party" or, collectively, as the "Parties."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, SCHOOL desires that its students ("Students") receive training in Occupational Therapy (the "Program");

WHEREAS, HOSPITAL operates an acute care hospital facility (the "Department") licensed in the State of California; and

WHEREAS, HOSPITAL has agreed to make its facility available to SCHOOL for such purposes.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. RESPONSIBILITIES OF SCHOOL.

(a) **Clinical Program:** SCHOOL shall be responsible for the implementation and operation of the didactic and laboratory component of its Program at HOSPITAL, which Program shall be approved in advance by HOSPITAL. Such responsibilities shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

(i) orientation of Student to the laboratory experience at HOSPITAL if requested;

(ii) provision of classroom theory and practical instruction to Student prior to their clinical assignments at HOSPITAL;

(iii) preparation of Student/patient assignments and rotation plans for each Student and coordination of same with HOSPITAL;

(iv) continuing oral and written communication with HOSPITAL regarding Student performance and evaluation;

(v) performance of such other duties as may from time to time be agreed to between SCHOOL and HOSPITAL.

(vii) **Student(s) Statements:** SCHOOL shall require each Student to sign a Statement of Confidentiality in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B.

All Student, faculty, employees, agents and representatives of SCHOOL participating in the Program at HOSPITAL (the "**Program Participants**") shall be accountable to the HOSPITAL's Administrator.

(b) **Insurance:**

(i) Throughout the term of this Agreement, SCHOOL and HOSPITAL shall maintain, at each party's sole cost and expense, policies of insurance or self-insurance providing coverage for general liability and professional liability in the minimum amount of \$1 million per occurrence, \$3 million annual aggregate, as may be necessary to protect the party and its employees, agents or representatives in the discharge of its or their responsibilities and obligations under this Agreement. In the event students are not required to maintain personal professional liability insurance, SCHOOL shall assume full responsibility for including such students as covered individuals within its policy of insurance or self-insurance. SCHOOL shall provide evidence of all policies of insurance or self-insurance required in the Agreement by certificates provided to the HOSPITAL prior to the effective date of this Agreement.

(c) **Health of Participants:** All Program Participants shall pass a medical examination acceptable to HOSPITAL prior to their participation in the Program at HOSPITAL at least once a year or as otherwise required by California law. SCHOOL and/or the Program Participant shall be responsible for arranging for the Program Participant's medical care and/or treatment, if necessary, including transportation in case of illness or injury while participating in the Program at HOSPITAL. In no event shall HOSPITAL be financially or otherwise responsible for said medical care and treatment.

(d) **Dress Code; Breaks:** SCHOOL shall require the Student to dress in accordance with dress and personal appearance standards approved by SCHOOL. Such standards shall be in accordance with HOSPITAL's standards regarding same. All Program Participants shall remain on the HOSPITAL premises for breaks, including meals. Program Participants shall pay for their own meals at HOSPITAL.

(e) **Performance of Services:** All faculty provided by SCHOOL shall be duly licensed, certified or otherwise qualified to participate in the Program at HOSPITAL. SCHOOL shall have a specially designated staff for the performance of the services specified herein. SCHOOL and all Program Participants shall perform its and their duties and services hereunder in accordance with all relevant local, state, and federal laws and shall comply with the standards and guidelines of all applicable accrediting bodies and the bylaws, rules and regulations of HOSPITAL and any rules and regulations of SCHOOL as may be in effect from time to time. Neither SCHOOL nor any Program Participant shall interfere with or adversely affect the operation of HOSPITAL or the performance of services therein.

(f) **Qualifications of Staff:** Program Participants provided pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall maintain all appropriate licenses and CPR training (ACLS or BLS Certification) as may be required by HOSPITAL or any accrediting organization or regulatory or administrative agency to which HOSPITAL may be subject. COLLEGE agrees to maintain a current profile for each Program Participant consisting of a resume, skills checklist, license, Health screen, TB clearance, CPR certification and reference verification, all other applicable certifications, and a copy of any appropriate liability insurance policy, which profile shall be available to HOSPITAL for review upon reasonable request at a mutually convenient time.

(g) **Surgical N-95 Respirator Mask Fit Testing:** SCHOOL shall conduct Surgical N-95 Respirator Mask Fit Testing according to California law, JCAHO, and Manufacturer regulations for all Students participating in the clinical rotation at HOSPITAL, and a copy of the Surgical N-95 Respirator Mask Fit Testing results shall be sent to HOSPITAL two (2) weeks prior to the clinical rotation start date. SCHOOL shall conduct Surgical N-95 Respirator Mask Fit Testing as required by California law, JCAHO, any accrediting organization, and regulatory or administrative agency to which HOSPITAL may be subject. If student is unable to have the testing completed at the SCHOOL, student will arrange with the HOSPITAL to have the testing conducted on site, pay for the testing and if requested, send a copy of the results to the SCHOOLS for the student's file.

2. **RESPONSIBILITIES OF HOSPITAL.**

(a) HOSPITAL shall accept the Student assigned to the Program by SCHOOL and cooperate in the orientation of all Program Participants to HOSPITAL. HOSPITAL shall provide the opportunities for such Student, who shall be supervised by SCHOOL and HOSPITAL, to observe and assist in various aspects of acute care patient care. HOSPITAL shall coordinate SCHOOL's rotation and assignment schedule with its own schedule and those of other educational institutions. HOSPITAL shall at all times retain ultimate control of the HOSPITAL and responsibility for patient care.

(b) Upon the request of SCHOOL, HOSPITAL shall assist SCHOOL in the evaluation of each Student's performance in the Program. However, SCHOOL shall at all times remain solely responsible for the evaluation of Student.

3. **MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES.** The parties shall cooperate to fulfill the following mutual responsibilities:

(a) Student shall be treated as trainees who have no expectation of receiving compensation or future employment from the HOSPITAL or the SCHOOL.

(b) Any courtesy appointments to faculty or staff by either SCHOOL or HOSPITAL shall be without entitlement of the individual to compensation or benefits for the appointed Party.

4. **WITHDRAWAL OF PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS.**

(a) HOSPITAL may immediately remove from the premises any Student who poses an immediate threat or danger to personnel or to the quality of medical services or for unprofessional behavior.

(b) HOSPITAL may request SCHOOL to withdraw or dismiss a Student or other Program Participant from the Program at HOSPITAL when his or her clinical performance is unsatisfactory to HOSPITAL or his or her behavior, in HOSPITAL's discretion, is disruptive or detrimental to HOSPITAL and/or its patients, or his or her actions are in conflict with HOSPITAL's Code of Conduct. In such event, said Program Participant's participation in the Program shall immediately cease. Subject to the provisions of paragraph 4(a) above, it is understood that only SCHOOL can dismiss the Program Participant from the Program at HOSPITAL.

5. **SCREENING OF STUDENT PERSONNEL**

(a) **Drug Screening:** HOSPITAL will be provided with a drug screen on each referred Student, to incorporate a five panel urine test prior to each confirmation start date at the SCHOOL's and/or the Student's expense. This test must be done no more than two (2) week prior to the start of the affiliation. The five-panel urine test shall consist of screening for: cocaine, heroin, PCP, Marijuana and Methamphetamines. Per HOSPITAL request, all Student may be requested to undergo a blood test, urinalysis, "Breathalyzer" test or other diagnostic test under the following circumstances:

i) Where there is reason to believe in the opinion of the HOSPITAL that a Student: (a) is under the influence of, or impaired by, alcohol or drugs (prescribed or non prescribed) while on HOSPITAL property or during working hours or (b) has come to the HOSPITAL, with a measurable quantity of drugs in blood or urine. Both situations described above include, but are not limited to, circumstances where a Student is involved in a work-related accident/incident involving an employee.

ii) Where there is any unusual occurrence which, in the opinion of the HOSPITAL, could indicate Student use of alcohol or drugs.

iii) On a random or blanket basis where, in the opinion of the HOSPITAL, such testing is appropriate.

Any violation of this policy, including the refusal to submit immediately to a requested search or test, or a positive result on such test(s), may result in immediate termination of clinical rotation.

(b) **Background Screening.** SCHOOL shall conduct the necessary background check(s) to determine the proof of U.S. citizenship, name verification and presence of criminal activity and provide a copy of such background check to HOSPITAL two (2) weeks prior to the start of the Program.

6. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

The Parties hereby acknowledge that they are independent contractors, and neither the SCHOOL nor any of its agents, representatives, Students or employees shall be considered agents, representatives, or employees of HOSPITAL. In no event shall this Agreement be construed as establishing a partnership or joint venture or similar relationship between the parties hereto. SCHOOL shall be liable for its own debts, obligations, acts and omissions, including the payment of all required withholding, social security and other taxes or benefits. No Program Participant shall look to HOSPITAL for any salaries, insurance or other benefits.

7. NON-DISCRIMINATION.

There shall be no discrimination on the basis of race, national origin, religion, creed, sex, age, veteran status, or handicap in either the selection of Student for participation in the Program, or as to any aspect of the clinical training; provided, however, that with respect to handicap, the handicap must not be such as would, even with reasonable accommodation, in and of itself preclude the Student's effective participation in the Program.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY.

SCHOOL and its agents, Students, faculty, representatives and employees agree to keep strictly confidential and hold in trust all confidential information of HOSPITAL and/or its patients and not disclose or reveal any confidential information to any third party without the express prior written consent of HOSPITAL. SCHOOL shall not disclose the terms of this Agreement to any person who is not a party to this Agreement, except as required by law or as authorized by HOSPITAL. Unauthorized disclosure of confidential information or of the terms of this Agreement shall be a material breach of this Agreement and shall provide HOSPITAL with the option of pursuing remedies for breach, or, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, immediately terminating this Agreement upon written notice to SCHOOL.

9. INDEMNIFICATION

All parties to this Agreement shall agree to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other party, its officers, agents, employees, students and volunteers, from and against all loss, cost, and expense arising out of any liability or claim of liability, sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of the activities, or the performance or nonperformance of obligations under this Agreement, of the indemnifying party, or those of any of its officers, agents, employees, students or volunteers. The provisions of this Article do not apply to any damage or losses caused by the negligence or intentional acts of the non-indemnifying party or any of its agents or employees

10. TERM; TERMINATION.

(a) The initial term of this Agreement shall be five (5) years, commencing September 09, 2014 and shall continue until September 08, 2019 (the "Expiration Date").

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, either Party may terminate this Agreement at any time without cause upon at least thirty (30) days prior written notice, provided that all Student currently enrolled in the Program at HOSPITAL at the time of notice of termination shall be given the opportunity to complete their clinical Program at HOSPITAL, such completion not to exceed four (4) months.

11. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

This Agreement and its accompanying Exhibits contain the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersede all prior agreements, oral or written, and all other communications between the parties relating to such subject matter. This Agreement may not be amended or modified except by mutual written agreement. All continuing covenants, duties and obligations herein shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

12. SEVERABILITY.

If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect in accordance with its terms disregarding such unenforceable or invalid provision.

13. CAPTIONS.

The captions contained herein are used solely for convenience and shall not be deemed to define or limit the provisions of this Agreement.

14. NO WAIVER.

Any failure of a Party to enforce that Party's right under any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed or act as a waiver of said Party's subsequent right to enforce any of the provisions contained herein.

15. GOVERNING LAW.

This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

16. COMPLIANCE WITH HIPAA.

SCHOOL, and Students(s) shall not use or disclose any protected health information and individually identifiable health information, as defined in 45 CFR Part 164 (collectively, the "Protected Health Information"), concerning a patient other than as permitted by this Agreement or provisions of the federal privacy regulations (the "Federal Privacy Regulations") and the federal security standards (the "Federal Security Regulations") as contained in 45 CFR Part 164. HIPAA Obligations shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement for any reason.

17. CODE OF CONDUCT.

SCHOOL hereby acknowledges receipt of Hospital's Code of Conduct which is attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A (the "Code"). With respect to SCHOOL's business dealings with Hospital and SCHOOL's performance of the Services described in this Agreement, SCHOOL shall not act in any manner which conflicts with or violates the Code, and shall not cause another person to act in any manner which conflicts with or violates the Code. SCHOOL shall comply with the Code as it relates to SCHOOL's business relationship with Hospital or any Adventist Health affiliates, subsidiaries, employees, agents, servants, officers, directors, contractors and suppliers of every kind.

18. ASSIGNMENT; BINDING EFFECT.

SCHOOL may not assign or transfer any of its rights, duties or obligations under this Agreement, in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of HOSPITAL. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and be binding upon, the parties hereto and their respective successors and permitted assigns.

19. **NOTICES.**

All notices hereunder by either Party to the other shall be in writing, delivered personally, by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, or by overnight courier, and shall be deemed to have been duly given when delivered personally or when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

20. **PARTICIPATION IN FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAMS.** HOSPITAL and SCHOOL hereby represent that neither party is debarred, suspended or otherwise ineligible to participate in any federal or state health care program.

21. **EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT.** This Agreement shall not become effective or in force until all of the below named parties have fully executed this Agreement.

CODE OF CONDUCT

PURPOSE:

To ensure the organization fulfills its ethical responsibility to patients, staff, physicians, third party payers, subcontractors, independent contractors, vendors, consultants, one another and the community. This Code of Conduct was developed to ensure we meet our ethical standards and comply with applicable laws and regulations.

DEFINITION:

WMMC: For the purposes of this Code of Conduct, WMMC refers to the White Memorial Medical Center, which includes all medical center departments, services, and clinics maintained and supported under the Department of Public Health hospital license.

WMMC Staff: For the purposes of this Code of Conduct, WMMC Staff refers to WMMC executives; employees; Graduate Medical Education physician residents; students; volunteers; contractors and subcontractors who provide patient care; contractors and subcontractors who provide billing and coding services; and contractors and subcontractors who develop, manage, and review WMMC Arrangements.

WMMC Medical Staff: For the purposes of this Code of Conduct, WMMC Medical Staff refers to members of the WMMC Medical Staff and WMMC credentialed allied health practitioners.

Board: For the purposes of this Code of Conduct, the Board refers to both the Adventist Health Legal Board and the WMMC Governing Board.

POLICY:

It is the responsibility of every WMMC Staff member, WMMC Medical Staff member and Board member to act in a manner that is consistent with the WMMC's Guiding Principles and this Code of Conduct. Additionally, WMMC Medical Staff are governed by specific conduct rules outlined in their Bylaws.

Introduction:

White Memorial Medical Center is committed to upholding the highest standards of ethical behavior in improving the quality of life and health of our community—We are driven by our Mission, Vision and Guiding Principles.

Our Mission:

As a Seventh-day Adventist medical center, we are a family of caring professionals serving our community with a passion for excellence, a spirit of Christian service and a commitment to medical education.

Our Vision:

WHITE MEMORIAL MEDICAL CENTER, ALONG WITH ITS PHYSICIANS AND COMMUNITY PARTNERS, WILL BECOME AN INTEGRATED HEALTH SYSTEM THAT CARES FOR ITS COMMUNITY AND PEOPLE WHO COME FROM THROUGHOUT THE REGION FOR SPECIALTY CARE. BECAUSE OF OUR SIZE, SCOPE OF SERVICE AND REPUTATION, WE WILL BE AN INDISPENSABLE COMPONENT OF ANY LARGER NETWORK WISHING TO SERVE EASTERN LOS ANGELES.

WHEN IT COMES TO VALUE, WHITE MEMORIAL MEDICAL CENTER WILL PERFORM IN THE TOP QUARTILE OF PROVIDERS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA.

Our Guiding Principles: I will:

1. Take personal responsibility to ensure the safety of patients, co-workers, and all others I come into contact

with while at work.

2. Reach for the highest standards in my work.
3. Be honest in all things.
4. Provide services that my customers say are excellent.
5. Use all resources responsibly and efficiently.
6. Treat others with the same compassion and respect I would want my family to experience.

Our Responsibilities as the Chief Executive Officer, Chief Financial Officer and Senior Leaders:

WMMC Senior Leadership is responsible for maintaining a culture that supports this Code of Conduct. Additionally, all provisions of this Code of Conduct and particularly those provisions relating to ethical conduct, conflicts of interest, compliance with law, and internal reporting of violations of the Code, bind the CEO and Senior Financial Officer. The CEO and Senior Financial Officer also have the responsibility for full, fair, accurate, timely and understandable disclosure in the periodic reports and submissions filed by WMMC with the designated Medicare Administrative Contractor for California, Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), various Federal and State agencies, the Internal Revenue Service, the Office of Statewide Planning Health and Development (OSHPD), and the Joint Commission as well as in other public communications made by the organization. Accordingly, it is the responsibility of the CEO and each senior leader to promptly bring to the attention of the Local Compliance Committee any information that materially affects the disclosures made by WMMC in its public communications. The CEO and Senior Financial Officer also shall bring promptly to the attention of the Local Compliance Committee any information he/she may have concerning significant deficiencies in the design or operation of internal controls which could adversely affect the WMMC's ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data; or any fraud, whether or not material, that involves management or other WMMC Staff who have a significant role in WMMC's financial reporting, disclosures or internal controls.

Our Responsibilities as Leaders:

While all WMMC Staff is obligated to follow our Code of Conduct, we expect our leaders to set an example and be role models. We expect everyone in the organization with supervisory responsibility to exercise that responsibility in a kind, sensitive, thoughtful, and respectful manner. We also expect that leaders will ensure their teams have sufficient information to comply with laws, regulations, and policies, as well as the resources to resolve ethical dilemmas. Leaders must help to support a culture within WMMC that promotes the highest standards of conduct, ethics and compliance. This culture must encourage everyone in the organization to share concerns immediately. We must never sacrifice ethical and complaint behavior in the pursuit of business objectives.

Our Responsibility to Our Patients

Quality of Care and Patient Safety

We are committed to the delivery of safe, effective, efficient, compassionate and satisfying patient care. We treat all patients with warmth, respect and dignity and provide care that is both necessary and appropriate. We ensure that the WMMC Staff and Medical Staff provide appropriate, quality patient care by:

- Individualizing care for each patient with care plans that document the reason(s) for the level of care, goals and objectives, interventions and participation by appropriate professionals, and which are reviewed and revised according to each patient's needs. Clinical decision making is never based on financial class of patients, ability to pay, or referrals.
- Ensuring we never discontinue necessary patient treatment, or provide unnecessary patient care for financial reasons.
- Using adequate numbers of appropriately trained staff to implement each patient's care plan.
- Establishing a system that incorporates the use of best practices or established standards. WMMC uses generally accepted indicators that help us to measure the quality of care provided. Agencies that have developed these indicators include, for example, the Conditions of Participation of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), and the standards and surveys of The Joint Commission,
- Supporting our Medical Staff in monitoring quality, utilization of resources and the appropriateness of care plans.
- Providing WMMC Staff and Medical Staff with adequate resources to do their work.
- Evaluating technological advancements occurring in the marketplace and allocating resources for the purchase of appropriate medical and other related equipment to ensure quality and patient safety and to create an overall culture that makes patient safety paramount.

- Utilizing a comprehensive and effective approach to credentialing, privileging, and peer review for potential and active members of the Medical Staff.
- Sustaining a culture that encourages questions about whether the quality or patient safety commitments set forth in this Code of Conduct are being fully met and that requires individuals to raise concerns through appropriate channels until a concern or question has been addressed and resolved. Additionally, patients, WMMC Staff and physicians with a concern about the safety and quality of care provided at WMMC may report these concerns to The Joint Commission or the WMMC Patient Safety Hotline as follows:

This commitment to quality and patient safety is an obligation of every WMMC Staff and Medical Staff member.

Patient Rights

We ensure appropriate care for all patients. We make no distinction in the availability of services; the admission, transfer or discharge of a patient; or in the care we provide based on age, gender, disability, sexual orientation, race, color, religion, national origin, ability to pay or type of insurance. We recognize and respect the diverse backgrounds and cultures of our patients and make every effort to equip our caregivers with the knowledge and resources to respect each patient's cultural heritage and needs. We are mindful that our community is becoming more diverse. Accordingly, we educate our staff to ensure they are equipped to meet our patient's needs in culturally sensitive manner. We develop and implement policies and procedures to protect patient rights in the delivery of patient care. These policies and procedures are located in administrative or patient care manuals which include patient rights, informed consent, advance directives, grievance management, withholding and withdrawing of life support and pastoral counseling. We support and facilitate patients' rights to access guardianship, advocacy, conservatorship, child and/or adult protective services by providing information as requested and referrals. (See: Abuse/Neglect: Reporting and Identification of Suspected Child Abuse, Elder and/or Dependent Adult Abuse, Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Policy). The Social Work Services Department is responsible for ensuring that the proper protective agencies are notified as required by county, state and federal laws (See: Attachments). Each patient is provided with a written statement of patient rights and a notice of privacy practices. These statements conform to all applicable state and federal laws, including but not limited to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability act of 1996 (hereinafter referred to as HIPAA). These policies are available through WMMC intranet.

Patient Information

We are committed to ensuring confidentiality of records and related information for all patients. Consistent with HIPAA, we do not use, disclose or discuss patient-specific information, including patient financial information, with others unless it is necessary to serve the patient or required by law.

WMMC Staff must never use or disclose confidential information that violates the privacy rights of our patients. In accordance with our privacy and security policies and procedures, which reflect HIPAA requirements, no WMMC Staff or WMMC Medical Staff has a right to any patient information other than that necessary to perform his or her job or responsibilities. Any breach of confidentiality represents a failure to meet the professional and ethical standards expected, and constitutes a violation of this Code of Conduct. A full confidentiality statement is received and accepted by each employee as part of the Employee

Handbook. We also expect our vendors involved in patient care to perform and provide services consistent with the applicable HIPAA laws. We include HIPAA Business Associate language in our agreements with these vendors.

Emergency Treatment

We follow the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (EMTALA) in providing an emergency medical screening examination and necessary stabilization to all patients, regardless of ability to pay. Provided we have the capacity and capability, anyone with an emergency medical condition is treated. In an emergency situation or if the patient is in labor, we will not delay the medical screening and necessary stabilization treatment in order to seek financial and demographic information. We do not admit, discharge, or transfer a patient with an emergency medical condition simply based on their ability or inability to pay or any other discriminatory factor.

A patient with an emergency medical condition is only transferred to another facility at the patient's request or if the patient's medical needs cannot be met at WMMC and appropriate care is knowingly available at another facility. Patients are only transferred in strict compliance with state and federal EMTALA regulatory and statutory requirements.

Our Responsibilities to and with our Physicians

Healthcare services like those owned and operated by WMMC are a collaboration between WMMC Staff and WMMC Medical Staff members. As in any collaboration, each party has important roles and responsibilities. WMMC is committed to providing an excellent work environment for WMMC Medical Staff. WMMC Staff interacts with WMMC Medical Staff members in a respectful and supporting way. We require WMMC Medical Staff members to be familiar with and comply with this Code of Conduct.

a. Interactions with Physicians:

Federal and state laws and regulations govern the relationship between hospitals and physicians who may refer patients to WMMC. The applicable federal laws include the Anti-Kickback Law and the Stark Law. It is important that WMMC Staff who interact with physicians (particularly those WMMC Staff who make payments to physicians for services rendered, provide space or services to physicians, recruit physicians to the community, and/or arrange for physicians to serve in leadership positions in the organization) are aware of the requirements of the laws, regulations, and policies that address relationships between WMMC and physicians. If relationships with physicians are properly structured, but not diligently administered, such failure to administer the arrangements as agreed results in a violation of the law. Any arrangement with a physician must be structured to ensure compliance with legal requirements. Most arrangements must be in writing and approved by the Compliance Department. Failure to meet all requirements of these laws and regulations can result in serious consequences for WMMC.

b. We do not pay for referrals.

We accept patient referral and admissions based solely on the patient's medical needs and our ability to render the needed services. We do not pay or offer to pay anyone—staff, physicians, or other persons or entities- for the referral of patients.

c. We do not accept payments for referrals we make.

No WMMC Staff member or any other person acting on behalf of WMMC, is permitted to solicit or receive anything of value, directly or indirectly, in exchange for the referral of patients. Similarly, when making patient referrals to another healthcare provider, we do not take into account the volume or value of referrals that the provider has made to us.

d. We do not Extend Business Courtesies and/or Tokens of Appreciation to Potential Referral Sources, Outside of the WMMC Policies.

Any entertainment, gift or token of appreciation involving physicians or other persons who are in a position to refer patients to WMMC must be undertaken in accordance with WMMC policies. These policies were developed to be in compliance with federal laws, regulations, and rules regarding these practices. WMMC Staff must consult WMMC policies or our Compliance Department prior to extending any business courtesy or token of appreciation to a potential referral

source.

Our Responsibilities to Ensure Legal and Regulatory Compliance

WMMC provides many types of healthcare services. These services are provided pursuant to appropriate federal, state, and local laws and regulations, and federal conditions of participation. Such laws, regulations, and conditions of participation may include, but are not limited to, subjects such as certificates of need, licenses, permits, accreditations, access to treatment, consent to treatment, medical record-keeping, access to medical records and confidentiality, patients' rights, clinical research, end of life care decision making, medical staff membership and clinical privileges, and Medicare and Medicaid program requirements. The organization is subject to other numerous laws in addition to these healthcare laws, regulations, and the conditions of participation.

WMMC has developed policies and procedures to address many legal, accreditation, certification and regulatory requirements. However, it is impractical to develop policies and procedures that encompass the full body of applicable law, standards, conditions and regulations. Such laws, standards, conditions and regulations not covered in organizational policies and procedures must still be followed. There is a range of expertise within WMMC, including operations counsel and numerous functional experts, who should be consulted for advice concerning human resources, legal regulations and statutes, established standards and applicable conditions of participation.

Anyone aware of violations or suspected violations of laws, regulations, standards and the conditions of participation, or WMMC policies and procedures must report them immediately. There are many individuals to whom WMMC Staff may voice such concerns including supervisors, any member of the WMMC Leadership Team, the Vice President of Human Resources, the Compliance Officer, the Compliance Department, the Adventist Health Compliance Officer or Compliance hotline.

Accreditation and Surveys

From time to time, government agencies and other entities conduct surveys at WMMC. Accreditation or external agency surveys are extremely significant and broader than the scope of this Code of Conduct. In preparation for, during and after surveys, WMMC Staff and WMMC Medical Staff must comply with all accrediting and external agency surveyors in a direct, open and honest manner and with accurate information.

In preparation for, or during a survey or inspection, WMMC Staff must never conceal, destroy, or alter any documents, lie; or make misleading statements to the agency representative. Also, WMMC Staff must never attempt to cause another staff member to fail to provide accurate information or obstruct, mislead, or delay the communication of information or records relating to a possible violation of law. No action should ever be taken, directly or indirectly, to mislead the accrediting or external agency survey teams.

Federal and State False Claims Acts

Federal and State False Claims Acts prohibit any person or entity from, among other things, knowingly presenting, or causing to be presented, a false or fraudulent claim for payment or approval, or knowingly making or using, or causing to be made or used, a false record or statement to get a false or fraudulent claim paid or approved.

The penalties for violating the Federal or State False Claims Act include:

- Civil monetary penalties of up to \$10,000 for each false claim submitted;
- Three times the amount of damages the government sustains because of the false claim; and,
- The costs of the legal action brought to recover for the false claim.

A private citizen may file suit under the Federal and State False Claims Acts on behalf of the government if the citizen has direct and independent knowledge of the submission of a false claim. The government will then decide whether to intervene and take over the case, dismiss or settle the case, or let the private individual pursue the case on his or her own. In either case, the person who initially filed the case may receive a portion of the amount recovered in either litigation or settlement of the claim.

Our Responsibilities in Safeguarding Business and Financial Information

Accuracy, Retention, and Disposal of Documents and Records

Each WMMC Staff member and WMMC Medical Staff member is responsible for the integrity and accuracy of our

organization's documents and records, not only to comply with regulatory and legal requirements, but also to ensure that records are available to support our business practices and actions. No one may alter or falsify information on any record or document. Records must never be destroyed in an effort to deny governmental authorities information that may be relevant to a government investigation.

Medical and business documents and records are retained in accordance with the law and our record retention policy. Medical and business documents include paper documents such as letters and memos, computer-based information such as e-mail or computer files on disk or tape, and any other medium that contains information about the organization or its business activities. It is important to retain and destroy records only according with our policy. WMMC Staff must not tamper with records. No one may remove or destroy records prior to the specified date without first obtaining permission as outlined in the WMMC records management policy.

Coding and Billing for Services

We communicate our billing policies to all our patients prior to, or, at the time of service or admission. We bill our patients for services rendered and provide itemized bills free of charge upon request. Our patient financial services office responds to patient questions in a timely and courteous manner. We perform annual audits to ensure the accuracy of our bills. We make adjustments to correct any over or under billings.

We have implemented policies, procedures and systems to facilitate accurate billing to our government payers, commercial insurance payers, and patients. These policies, procedures, and systems conform to pertinent federal and state laws and regulations. We prohibit any WMMC Staff member from knowingly presenting or causing to be presented claims for payment or approval that are false, fictitious, or fraudulent.

In support of accurate billing, medical records must provide reliable documentation of the services we provided. It is important that all individuals who contribute to the medical record provide accurate information and do not destroy any information considered part of the official medical record. Accurate and timely documentation also depends on the diligence and attention of physicians who treat patients in our facilities. We expect physicians to provide us with complete and accurate information in a timely manner.

Confidential Information:

The term "confidential information" refers to proprietary information about our organization's strategies and operations as well as patient information and third party information. Improper use or disclosure of confidential information could violate legal and ethical obligations. WMMC Staff may use confidential information only to perform their job responsibilities. We do not share this information with others unless the individuals, entities, and/or contractual business relationships have a legitimate need to know. Consistent with HIPAA, we do not use, disclose or discuss patient specific information, including patient financial information, with others unless it is necessary to serve the patient or required by law. Any breach of confidentiality represents a failure to meet the professional and ethical standards expected, and constitutes a violation of this Code of Conduct. A full confidentiality statement is received and accepted by each employee as part of the WMMC Employee Handbook.

Cost Reports

We are required by federal and state laws and regulations to submit certain reports outlining our operating costs and statistics. We comply with federal and state laws, regulations, and guidelines relating to all cost reports. These laws, regulations, and guidelines define what costs are allowable and outline the appropriate methodologies we may use to claim reimbursement for the cost of services provided.

All issues related to the preparation, submission and settlement of cost reports must be performed in accordance with the Adventist Health Cost Reporting Program Policies and Procedures.

Electronic Medical and Security Requirements

All communication systems, including but not limited to computers, electronic mail, Intranet, Internet access, telephones, and voice mail, are the property of the organization and are to be used primarily for business purposes in accordance with electronic communication policies and procedures. Limited reasonable personal use of WMMC communication systems is permitted; however, users should assume these communications are not private. Users of computer and telephone systems should presume no expectation of privacy in anything they create, store, send, or receive on WMMC computer and telephone systems, and WMMC reserves the right to monitor and/or access communication usage and content consistent with our

policies and procedures.

WMMC Staff who abuse our communication systems or use them excessively for non-business purposes may lose these privileges and be subject to disciplinary action.

WMMC Staff and WMMC Medical Staff must comply with WMMC's information security policies and standards governing the use of our information systems. User IDs and passwords are assigned to an individual. WMMC Staff and WMMC Medical Staff are not permitted to share or disclose any password that is used to access WMMC's systems or information.

Financial Reporting and Records

WMMC maintains a high standard of accuracy and completeness in documenting, managing, and reporting financial information. This information serves as a basis for managing our business and is important in meeting our obligations to patients, staff, suppliers, and others. It is also necessary for compliance with tax and financial reporting requirements.

All financial information must reflect actual transactions and conform to generally-accepted accounting principles. All funds of assets must be properly recorded. WMMC maintains a system of internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that all transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and are recorded in a proper manner to maintain accountability of the assets.

Intellectual Property Rights and Obligations

Any work of authorship, inventions, or other creation created by a staff member during the scope of his or her employment with WMMC shall be considered the property of WMMC, including any patent, trademark, copyright, trade secret or other intellectual property right.

Our Responsibilities to Our WMMC Staff

Conflict of Interest

A conflict of interest may occur if a WMMC Staff's outside activities, personal financial interest, or other private interest interfere or appear to interfere with his or her ability to make objective decisions in the course of his or her job responsibilities. Conflicts of interest also arise when a WMMC Staff member or a member of his or her family receives improper benefits as a result of his or her position in WMMC. WMMC Staff are obligated to ensure they remain free of conflicts of interest in the performance of their responsibilities at WMMC. Clinical decisions are made without regard to compensation or personal financial benefit to WMMC leaders, managers, clinical staff, or licensed independent practitioners. You are encouraged to raise any questions involving this policy with the Vice President for Human Resources or the Compliance Department before becoming engaged in outside activities or relationships that may give rise to an actual or perceived conflict.

If WMMC Staff do become involved in a transaction where personal interests conflict with WMMC's interests, they are required to disclose that conflict to a supervisor, the Human Resources Department or the Compliance Department. WMMC Board members, executives, and directors are required to sign a Conflict of Interest Statement in accordance with the WMMC Conflict of Interest Policy.

No waiver of this conflict of interest provision may be granted unless approved in advance by the Compliance Committee.

Controlled Substances/ Drug and Alcohol Free Workplace

The dangers of drug and/or alcohol abuse are numerous, including the risks of loss of life, physical damage to people and property, a decline in morale and productivity, and deterioration in the quality of goods and services produced. Our policy is to maintain a drug/alcohol-free workplace. Thus, the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance or alcohol is prohibited in our workplace. All WMMC Staff must report for work free of the influence of alcohol and illegal drugs. Any WMMC Staff member who reports to work under the influence of any illegal drug or alcohol, has an illegal drug in his or her system, or who uses, possesses, or sells illegal drugs while on WMMC work time or property may be terminated immediately. We may use drug testing as a means of enforcing this policy.

Some of our staff routinely have access to prescription drugs, controlled substances, and other medical supplies. Many of these substances are governed and monitored by specific regulatory organizations and must be administered by physician order only. Prescription and controlled medications and supplies must be handled properly and only by authorized individuals to minimize

risks to WMMC and to patients. Any WMMC Staff member or WMMC Medical Staff member who becomes aware of inadequate security of drugs or controlled substances or the diversion of drugs from the organization must report it immediately.

As a condition of continued employment, WMMC Staff are expected and required to abide by this policy and to notify their department manager of any criminal drug/alcohol statute conviction against them no later than 5 calendar days after such conviction. A conviction means a finding of guilt, including a plea of nolo contendere or imposition of a sentence or both by any judicial body charged with the responsibility to determine violations of the federal or state criminal drug/ alcohol statutes.

Diversity and Equal Employment Opportunity

WMMC actively promotes diversity in its workforce at all levels of the organization. We are committed to providing an inclusive work environment where everyone is treated with fairness, dignity, and respect. We are accountable to each other for the manner in which we treat one another and for the manner in which people around us are treated. We are committed to recruiting and retaining a diverse staff that is reflective of the patients and community we serve. We regard laws, regulations and policies relating to diversity as a minimum standard. We strive to create and maintain a setting in which we celebrate cultural and other differences and consider them strengths.

WMMC maintains an equal opportunity workforce and no one shall unlawfully discriminate against any individual with regard to race, color, religion, gender, national origin, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity or veteran status with respect to any offer, or term or condition, of employment. We make reasonable accommodations to the known physical and mental limitation of qualified individuals with disabilities.

Harassment and Disruptive Behavior

WMMC seeks to provide a work environment that is free of all forms of discriminatory harassment, including sexual harassment and disruptive behavior. Prohibited forms of discriminatory harassment include, but are not limited to, oral, physical or visual harassment.

WMMC considers unwelcomed sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, remarks or jokes of a sexual nature, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature to constitute sexual harassment when:

- I. submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment;
- II. employment decisions concerning an individual are based on whether the person submitted to or rejected the harassing action; and/or
- III. such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment—even where it leads to no tangible or economic job consequences.

We strongly disapprove of discriminatory harassment in any form. We do not tolerate harassment by anyone based on the cultural backgrounds of those who work with us. Degrading or humiliating jokes, slurs, intimidations, or other harassing conduct is not acceptable in our workplace. Sexual harassment is considered to be sex discrimination in violation of applicable state and federal law subjecting the harassing employee to legal liability.

WMMC Staff who observe or experience any form of alleged discrimination, discriminatory harassment or violence should be reported to either a department head or the Human Resources department. The law protects WMMC Staff from any retaliation for reporting or participating in the investigation of discrimination or discriminatory harassment. A prompt and thorough investigation of the alleged incident will be conducted. To the extent possible, the investigation and any subsequent action will proceed in an atmosphere of confidentiality. We will take all appropriate steps to enforce this policy, including termination or other disciplinary action, against persons who have violated this policy. WMMC Staff who have submitted a complaint of discrimination or discriminatory harassment addressed under this policy should immediately make a further complaint if the discrimination or discriminatory harassment resumes.

Health and Safety

WMMC complies with all workplace health and safety rules and regulations. Our policies and practices are designed to protect our staff from potential workplace hazards. WMMC Staff need to be familiar with these policies and how they apply to their specific job responsibilities. Each staff member should seek advice from his or her supervisor, or the hospital's Safety Officer, whenever he/she has a question or concern. It is important that each staff member immediately advise a supervisor or the Safety Officer of any serious workplace injury or any situation presenting a danger of injury. Immediate notification allows for

timely corrective actions.

Environmental Compliance

It is WMMC policy to comply with all environmental laws and regulations as they relate to WMMC's operations. We act to preserve our natural resources to the full extent reasonably possible. WMMC complies with all environmental laws and operates its facilities with the necessary permits, approvals, and controls. We diligently employ the proper procedures to provide a good environment of care and to prevent pollution.

In helping WMMC comply with these laws and regulations, all WMMC Staff must understand how job duties may impact the environment. Staff must adhere to all requirements for the proper handling of hazardous material, and immediately alert supervisors to any situation regarding the discharge of a hazardous substance, improper disposal of hazardous and medical waste, or any situation that may be potential damaging to the environment.

Hiring of Former and Current Government and Medicare Administrative Contractor Employees

The recruitment and employment of former or current U.S. government employees may be impacted by regulations concerning conflicts of interest. Hiring employees directly from a Medicare Administrative Contractor requires certain regulatory notifications. Staff should consult with the Human Resources Department or the Compliance Department regarding such recruitment and hiring.

Ineligible Persons

We do not contract with, employ, or bill for services rendered by any individual or entity: (1) that is excluded or ineligible to participate in federal healthcare programs; (2) that was suspended or debarred from federal government contracts and not reinstated in a federal healthcare program after a period of exclusion, suspension, debarment, or ineligibility; or (3) has been convicted of a criminal offense that falls within the scope of 42 U.S.C. 1320a-7(a), but has not yet been excluded, debarred, suspended or otherwise declared ineligible (each, an "Ineligible Person"). Upon hire we search the Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Inspector General, Exclusive Parties List System (EPLS) and General Services Administration's lists for such Ineligible Persons.

All WMMC Staff and WMMC Medical Staff must disclose to WMMC any debarment, exclusion, suspension or other event that makes that person an Ineligible Person within twenty-four (24) hours of becoming aware of such event. WMMC will remove known Ineligible Persons from responsibility for, or involvement with, WMMC's business operations related to Federal health care programs and will remove them from any position for which their compensation or the items or services furnished, ordered, or prescribed by such individual are paid by a Federal health care program or with Federal funds at least until such time as such individual is reinstated into participation in the Federal health care programs.

If WMMC has actual notice that a WMMC Staff or WMMC Medical Staff member is charged with a criminal offense that falls within the scope of 42 USC § 1320a-7(a), (b)(1)-(3), or if proposed for exclusion during such individual's employment or contract term or during the term of such individual's medical staff privileges, WMMC will take all appropriate actions to ensure that the responsibilities of such individual have not and shall not adversely affect the quality of care rendered to any patient or any claims submitted to a Federal health care program.

Insider Information/Confidential Information

In the course of employment with the White Memorial, WMMC Staff may become aware of non-public information about WMMC that is material to the WMMC's business strategy and operations. Non-public, material information may include, among other things, plans for mergers, marketing strategy, financial results, or other business dealings. WMMC Staff may not discuss this type of information with anyone outside the organization. Within the organization, WMMC Staff should discuss this information on a strictly "need to know" basis and only with other WMMC Staff who require this information to perform their jobs.

License and Certification Renewals

WMMC Staff, individuals retained as independent contractors, and privileged practitioners in positions which require professional licenses, certifications, or other credentials are responsible for maintaining current credentials and shall comply at all times with federal and state requirements applicable to their respective disciplines.

WMMC does not allow any WMMC Staff member, independent contractor or privileged practitioner to work without a valid, current license or credential. Each WMMC Staff member must have evidence of current and valid license, certification, registration, accreditation or credential as required by their position description.

Copyright and Intellectual Property

WMMC respects the ownership rights of those creating physical, digital, and intellectual property. Copyright infringement is using copyrighted property without the owner's permission. This unauthorized use is also called piracy. Examples could include using unlicensed software, distributing many copies of non-public books or articles, and using business models (intellectual property) without consent or credit. WMMC Staff will not utilize copyrighted physical, digital, and intellectual property without the prior written permission of the owner.

Personal Use of WMMC Resources

Credit cards, desks, and other items provided by WMMC continue to remain organizational property, must be maintained in accordance with WMMC's policies, and used only for business purposes. WMMC reserves the right to monitor and inspect all organizational property, without notice, and without the WMMC Staff member present. WMMC may monitor and inspect organizational property even if a password or personal code has been assigned. Prior authorization must be obtained prior to the removal of any organizational property from the premises. All organizational property must be returned immediately upon request or termination in the same condition as when originally provided. Personal items brought onto the organization's property also are subject to inspection, without notice, and without the WMMC Staff member present.

Relationships among WMMC Staff

In the normal day-to-day functions of an organization like WMMC, there are issues that arise from how people in the organization relate to one another. It is impossible to foresee all of these issues, and many do not require explicit treatment in this Code of Conduct. While we wish to avoid any strict rules, no one should ever feel compelled to give a gift to anyone for a birthday, holiday or other celebration, and any gifts offered or received should be appropriate to the circumstances. A lavish gift to anyone in a supervisory role would clearly violate organization policy. Similarly, if WMMC agrees to support a charitable organization, no WMMC Staff member should feel compelled to contribute to the charitable organization, nor should there be any workplace consequences of such non-participation.

For reasons of supervision, safety, security and morale, family members will not be employed under the direct supervision of one another nor will they be placed in the same department, division or facility if the work involves potential conflicts of interest. For these reasons, as well as to avoid misunderstandings, complaints of favoritism or possible claims of sex discrimination or sexual harassment, managers and supervisors are prohibited from establishing, maintaining, or attempting to establish or maintain a romantic or sexual relationship with any subordinate employee within their chain of command. The term "family members" includes a WMMC Staff member's parents, children (natural, adopted or under legal guardianship), spouse, brothers, sisters, grandparents, grandchildren, cousins, aunts, uncles, in-laws and step-relationships with all the preceding relationships. An exception to this policy is allowed only with the approval of the Vice President of Human Resources.

If co-employees become related, or if a supervisor and a subordinate attempt to or establish or maintain a romantic or sexual relationship, it should be reported promptly to the immediate supervisor of the manager or supervisor who is related or involved in the relationship. If co-employees become related, we will make reasonable efforts to assign job duties so as to minimize problems of supervision, safety, security or morale.

Relationships with Subcontractors and Suppliers

WMMC has a Code of Conduct and Business Relationship Statement that outlines its commitment to ethical and compliant behavior and its expectations of the same by its contractors. We treat our vendors fairly and maintain impartiality in our relationships. We do not allow our friendships with our vendors or others with whom we may do business in the future to affect our business decisions.

Charitable gifts or contributions from vendors are not required, and have no bearing upon their actual or potential business relationship with us. To the extent permitted under applicable laws, subsidies to underwrite the costs of medical education or professional meetings are permitted, in that they benefit patient care and community health.

WMMC Staff must manage consulting, subcontractor, and supplier relationships in a fair and reasonable manner, free from conflicts of interest and consistent with all applicable laws. WMMC promotes competitive procurement to the maximum extent practicable. WMMC's selection of consultants, subcontractors, suppliers, and vendors will be made on the basis of objective

criteria including quality, technical excellence, price, delivery, adherence to schedules, service, and maintenance of adequate sources of supply. Our purchasing decisions will be made on the supplier's ability to meet our needs, and not on personal relationships and friendships. WMMC employs the highest ethical standards in business practices in source selection, negotiation, determination of contract awards, and the administration of all purchasing activities. WMMC complies with contractual obligations not to disclose vendor confidential information unless permitted under the contract or otherwise authorized by the vendor.

It is critical to avoid the appearance of impropriety when giving gifts to individuals who do business or are seeking to do business with WMMC. WMMC will never use gifts or other incentives to improperly influence relationships or business outcomes.

Our Responsibilities while Developing Business and Marketing Services

WMMC operates in a highly competitive environment. WMMC's business development and marketing activities must conform to the highest standards of integrity and fairness reflected in this Code of Conduct. WMMC requires compliance with antitrust and other laws governing competitive activities.

Antitrust and Unfair Competition

WMMC restricts communication with competitors. Generally, WMMC Staff are not to discuss with competitors non-public "competitively sensitive topics." Because the antitrust laws are so complex and their application can depend upon the conditions in local markets, it is not practical to adopt written policies to govern all situations. WMMC Staff should consult with their supervisors or the Compliance Department for guidance concerning competitive activities, laws and policies relating to their areas of responsibility.

Marketing and Advertising

Consistent with laws and regulations that governs such activities, WMMC uses marketing and advertising to educate the public, provide information to the community, increase awareness of services provided by WMMC, and for recruitment purposes. WMMC strives to present only truthful, fully informative, and non-deceptive information in these materials and announcements. WMMC will not distort the truth about services or products provided by the hospital, nor will we attack or disparage another provider, whether by name or implication, in any marketing or advertising efforts. We may feature our outstanding services or offer factual evidence of quality of care, but will not claim superiority where it cannot be substantiated.

Our Responsibilities in our Relationships with other Companies

This part of the Code of Conduct should not be considered in any way as an encouragement to make, solicit, or receive any type of entrapment or gift.

Receiving Business Courtesies

We do not expect any gifts from our vendors beyond good service. However, WMMC recognizes that there will be times when a current or potential business associate, including a potential referral source, extends an invitation to a WMMC Staff member to attend a social event, in order to further develop or provide appreciation of a current business relationship. All gifts, entertainment and business meals provided or received must be reasonable and small enough that they do not influence our decisions. We never offer or accept anything of value in exchange for referrals or other business. We let our vendors, physicians, customers and others know that our core values limit what we can receive or give. We want our services and business relationships to stand on their own.

What is a gift? It is anything of value – including traditional marketing items like t-shirts or logoed items - if the recipient receives it for free. We should recognize there is a difference between a simple pen and an expensive electronic device from a vendor.

What constitutes entertainment? This includes an invitation to events, sports activities or games or concerts where the recipient is not expected to pay for a ticket or participation fee. We should recognize there is a difference between attending a community-supported or non-profit gala and front-row seats at an expensive event.

What constitutes a business meal? This is any meal where the primary purpose of the meeting is to discuss WMMC business or quality initiatives.

If you question a gift or participation in an entertainment event, contact the Compliance Department.

Extending Business Courtesies to Non-Referral Sources

1. **Meals and Entertainment.** – There may be times when a WMMC Staff member wishes to extend to a current or potential business associate (other than someone who may be in a position to make a patient referral) an invitation to attend a social event (e.g., reception, meal, sporting event) to further or develop a business relationship. The purpose of the entertainment must never be to induce any favorable business action. During these events, topics of a business nature must be discussed and the host must be present.
2. **Sponsoring Business Events** - WMMC sponsors events for legitimate business purposes (e.g., hospital board meetings or retreats). These events may include WMMC paid meals, entertainment, transportation and lodging. However, all elements of these events, including these courtesy elements, must be consistent with the corporate policy on business events.
3. **Gifts** - It is critical to avoid the appearance of impropriety when giving gifts to individuals who do business or are seeking to do business with WMMC. We will never use gifts or other incentives to improperly influence relationships or business outcomes. In order to avoid embarrassment, an effort should be made to ensure that any gift we extend meets the business conduct standards of the recipient's organization. U.S. federal and state governments have strict rules and laws regarding gifts, means and other business courtesies for their employees. WMMC does not provide any gifts, entertainment or anything else of value to any employee of the Executive Branch of the Federal Government or its fiscal intermediaries, except for minor refreshments in connection with business discussion.

Our Responsibilities in our Relationships with Government Agencies and Officials

WMMC and its representatives comply with all federal, state, and local laws governing participation in government relations and political activities. As a general policy, WMMC funds or resources will not contribute directly to individual political campaigns, political parties or other organizations that intend to use the funds primarily for political campaign objectives.

At times, WMMC may ask WMMC Staff to make personal contact with government officials or to write letters to present our positions on specific issues. In addition, it is part of the role of some WMMC management to interface on a regular basis with government officials. If a WMMC Staff member is making these communications on behalf of the organization, he/she must be certain to be familiar with any regulatory constraints and observe them. At no time may WMMC Staff speak on behalf of WMMC without first being given consent by the CEO or his/her designee. Avenues of communication may include traditional ways such as telephone and letters along with newer ways such as social media. Guidance is always available from the Compliance Department as necessary.

How We Ensure Compliance with our Code of Conduct

Program Structure

The Compliance Program is intended to demonstrate in the clearest possible terms our absolute commitment to the highest standards of conduct, ethics, and compliance. The elements of the program include setting standards, communicating those standards, providing mechanisms for reporting concerns, monitoring and auditing, program effectiveness, and maintaining an organizational structure that continues to support the Compliance Program. These elements are supported at all levels of WMMC. Providing direction, guidance and oversight are the Corporate Compliance Committee, senior leadership; and the Local Compliance Committee.

The WMMC Compliance Officer and the Compliance Department are responsible for the day-to-day direction, coordination and any applicable revisions or updates of the Code of Conduct and the Compliance Program. This includes developing resources (including policies and procedures, training programs, and communication tools), distributing standards, providing support (including operating the Compliance hotline, conducting program assessment, and providing advice), ensuring compliance with training requirements and otherwise administering the program.

In support of the WMMC Compliance Officer, WMMC Senior Leaders have expertise in various areas of compliance and are called upon to lead policy and training development efforts, conduct monitoring and auditing as appropriate, and provide advice. Additionally, the Vice President of Human Resources, the hospital Risk Manager, and the Accreditation Coordinator are all important resources that may be accessed to address issues arising out of this Code of Conduct.

WMMC's Compliance Officer is responsible for ensuring the functioning of the Local Compliance Committee.

Setting Standards

WMMC sets standards through this Code of Conduct, along with our associated policies and procedures and the annual or periodic (for applicable positions) compliance program training. It is the responsibility of each individual to be aware of these policies and procedures, how they pertain to his or her work, and to follow these policies and procedures.

Training and Communication

Comprehensive training and education has been developed to ensure that WMMC Staff are aware of the standards that apply to them. Code of Conduct training is conducted at the time an individual joins WMMC and annually for all WMMC Staff. Compliance training in areas of compliance risk (e.g., billing, coding, cost reports) is required of certain individuals. WMMC and Adventist Health policies outline the training requirements.

For WMMC employees, all training is recorded within our compliance education system. System administrators and the Compliance Officer can track employee compliance with their training requirements and report such information as necessary. Non-employees will receive training as required by applicable requirements or regulations.

Personal Obligation to Report

WMMC is committed to ethical and legal conduct that is compliant with all relevant laws and regulations, and to correcting wrongdoing wherever it may occur at WMMC. Each WMMC Staff has an individual responsibility to report any activity by any staff, physician, subcontractor, or vendor that appears to violate applicable law, rules, regulations, accreditation standards, standards of medical practice, federal healthcare conditions of participation, or this Code of Conduct.

If any WMMC Staff member, WMMC Medical Staff member, or Board member has concerns, we encourage you to report it through one of our reporting compliance program options identified below so that we may investigate and resolve the issue. However, if you believe we have left an issue unresolved, the matter can be reported to other entities such as Adventist Health, the Medical Board of California, The Joint Commission, and the Department of Public Health. There will be no retaliatory disciplinary action taken against any individual who reports concerns to any of these entities.

Resources for Guidance and Reporting Concerns

To obtain guidance on an ethics or compliance issue or to report a concern, individuals may choose from several options. We encourage the resolution of your concerns, at a local level. You may report issues to your immediate supervisor or any member of the Leadership Team. Your other reporting options include:

Our policies and procedures can be accessed through our Intranet.

WMMC makes every effort to maintain, within the limits of the law, the confidentiality of the identity of any individuals who report concerns or possible misconduct. WMMC does not retaliate or discipline anyone for reporting a concern in good faith. Any staff member who deliberately makes a false accusation with the purpose of harming or retaliating against another staff member is subject to discipline.

Internal Investigations of Reports

We are committed to investigating all reported concerns promptly and confidentially to the extent possible. The Compliance Officer coordinates any findings from investigations and immediately recommends corrective actions or changes that need to be made. We expect all staff to cooperate with investigation efforts.

Corrective Action

Where an internal investigation substantiates a reported violation, it is WMMC's policy to initiate a corrective action, including, as appropriate, making prompt restitution of any overpayment amounts, notifying the appropriate governmental agency, instituting whatever disciplinary action is necessary, and implementing systemic changes to prevent a similar violation from

recurring in the future.

Discipline

All violators of the Code of Conduct will be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with the WMMC Employee Handbook. Discipline of WMMC Staff may include:

- Counseling;
- Verbal warning;
- Written warning;
- Final written warning;
- Termination; or
- Other actions as determined by WMMC management.

WMMC contractors and sub-contractors are subject to possible contract termination.

WMMC Medical Staffs are subject to the Medical Staff Bylaws and Medical Staff Rules and Regulations that define the disciplinary processes.

Measuring Program Effectiveness

We are committed to assessing the effectiveness of our Compliance Program through various efforts. Much of this effort is provided by the Adventist Health Corporate Compliance Department, which routinely conducts audits of issues that have regulatory or compliance implications. Responsible executives routinely undertake monitoring efforts in support of policies and compliance in their areas of responsibility.

Review:

This Code of Conduct is reviewed at least every two years and revised as necessary in response to issues which arise in the health-care industry, changes in accreditation, legal and/or regulatory requirements, and recommendations, which may arise from resolution of ethical issues.

Acknowledgment Process:

WMMC requires all affected individuals to sign an acknowledgement confirming they have reviewed the Code of Conduct and understand that it represents the mandatory policies of WMMC. Attached are lists comparing degrees and certificates earned for spring 2013 and spring 2014. A list of spring intersession 2014 degrees and certificates is included as well. Also attached, please find a list of students who have completed coursework at Santa Ana College leading to the Associate Degree and/or Certificate for spring 2014 and spring intersession 2014.

ANALYSIS

Santa Ana College awarded 1,128 Associate Degrees at the conclusion of the spring 2014 semester, 742 Associate of Arts, 82 Associate of Arts Transfer, 246 Associate of Science and 58 Associate of Science Transfer. This is up 165 degrees over spring 2013 in which 963 Associate Degrees were conferred. The area that shows significant increase is Liberal Arts, Arts, Humanities & Communications which grew from 270 degrees awarded in spring 2013 to 314 awarded in spring 2014. Spring intersession 2014 awarded 62 Associate Degrees, 40 Associate of Arts, 8 Associate of Arts for Transfer, 10 Associate of Science, and 4 Associate of Science for Transfer.

Santa Ana College awarded 904 Certificates of Achievement at the conclusion of the spring 2014 semester. This is up 159 certificates over spring 2013 in which 745 Certificates of Achievement were conferred. The area with the most significant increase in certificates is CSU General Education which awarded 431 certificates. This is an increase of 50 from the 381 certificates awarded at the conclusion of spring 2013. Spring intersession 2014 awarded 151 Certificates of Achievement.

BACKGROUND

Attached is a list of students who successfully completed coursework at Santiago Canyon College leading to an associate of arts degree, associate of arts for transfer degree, associate of science degree, associate of science for transfer degree, certificate of achievement, and/or certificate of proficiency for spring 2014 including spring 2014 intersession. Also attached are the statistical tables showing degrees and certificates awarded by major.

ANALYSIS

Santiago Canyon College awarded 920 associate degrees in spring 2014 (this number includes 9 associate degrees awarded in spring 2014 intersession), as compared to 810 in spring 2013. The degrees with the most significant increase are the associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer programs. Santiago Canyon College awarded 170 associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer degrees in spring 2014 (this number includes 2 associate degrees for transfer awarded in spring 2014 intersession), compared to 75 in spring 2013. Business Administration and Psychology are the two programs with the highest associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer degrees. The increased awareness and importance placed on the transfer degrees has had a significant impact on the increased number of degrees awarded.

Santiago Canyon College awarded 578 certificates of achievement in spring 2014 (this number includes 4 certificates of achievement awarded in spring 2014 intersession), as compared to 566 in spring 2013. A total of 394 certificates of proficiency were awarded in spring 2014, as compared to 39 in spring 2013. Notable increases were seen in Apprenticeship Electricity (Power Lineman), CSU General Education Breadth, Accounting (General Accounting), Business Management, Cosmetology (Esthetician) and Public Works (Code Enforcement Officer). The increase in the certificate of proficiency numbers is due to the continued work on identifying and awarding students who, in the past, were not awarded a certificate even though they completed the program requirements.

The difference in the CSU numbers is a reflection of the associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer programs. Students must earn either CSU or IGETC- CSU Option General Education Certification to be awarded one of these degrees. These programs' popularity adds to the increase of degrees and CSU certifications that are being awarded. As Santiago Canyon College adds to the list of majors within the associate in arts for transfer and associate in science for transfer programs, we will continue to see an increase in these programs.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees confirm the recipients of the associate degrees and certificates for spring 2014 intersession and spring 2014 as presented.

BACKGROUND

Measure Q was passed by voters in November 2012. Planning for the Santa Ana College projects funded by Measure Q has been occurring since the passage of Measure Q. The District plans to issue the first general obligation bonds authorized by Measure Q (Series A) in the amount of \$70 million in October 2014. According to the District's bond counsel, Lisel Wells of Nixon Peabody, in order to receive reimbursement from the first bond issuance for costs already incurred associated with planning, design, program management and construction costs associated with the Measure Q projects, it is necessary to approve a reimbursement resolution.

ANALYSIS

The adoption of Resolution 14-25, as prepared by bond counsel, will allow for reimbursement of costs that have already been expended in the planning and early construction stages of Measure Q projects at Santa Ana College. Only authorized Measure Q expenditures will be reimbursed from the issuance of Series A bond proceeds. Reimbursements are authorized for costs incurred up to the receipt of Series A bond proceeds. Estimates for cost reimbursements are currently about \$4 million.

**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF
RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT
AUTHORIZING REIMBURSEMENT OF
QUALIFIED PROJECT EXPENDITURES
IN CONTEMPLATION OF A
FUTURE TAX-EXEMPT FINANCING**

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees (the “**Board**”) of Rancho Santiago Community College District (the “**District**”) has determined the necessity to provide a number of improvements and to engage in the construction, equipping and furnishing of certain of its facilities outlined in the project list approved by the requisite fifty-five (55%) of the voters of the District at an election held within the boundaries of the District’s Santa Ana College service area (the “**Improvement Area**”) on November 6, 2012 (collectively, the “**Capital Projects**”); and

WHEREAS, the Board now anticipates the need for the District to borrow moneys on a tax-exempt basis through the issuance of general obligation bonds (the “**Tax-Exempt Obligations**”), in order to fund certain of the Capital Projects located within the Improvement Area; and

WHEREAS, in contemplation of the issuance of the Tax-Exempt Obligations to finance such Capital Projects, the Board desires to adopt this Resolution in order to permit reimbursement of qualified project expenditures described herein made prior to the date of issuance of the Tax-Exempt Obligations;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT HEREBY RESOLVES, DETERMINES, AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Reimbursement of Qualified Project Expenditures. The Board presently intends and reasonably expects to have the Tax-Exempt Obligations issued on its behalf no later than 18 months of (i) the date of the expenditure of moneys, if any, made with respect to the Capital Projects or (ii) the date upon which the Capital Projects for which expenditures are to be reimbursed are placed in service or abandoned, whichever is later (but in no event more than 3 years after the date the original expenditure of such moneys is paid), and to allocate an amount of the proceeds thereof to reimbursable expenditures in connection with the Capital Projects, as may be qualified under the provisions of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations of the Internal Revenue Service (the “**Reimbursable Expenditures**”). All of the Reimbursable Expenditures covered by this Section were paid not earlier than 60 days prior to the date of this Resolution or constitute preliminary expenditures within the meaning of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. The Board intends to allocate within 30 days after the date of issue of the Tax-Exempt Obligations, the proceeds therefrom to reimburse the District for the Reimbursable Expenditures. With respect to the proceeds of the Obligations allocated to reimburse the District for prior expenditures, the Board hereby covenants not to employ an abusive device under Treasury Regulation Section 1.148-10, including using within one year of the reimbursement allocation, the funds corresponding to the

proceeds of the Tax-Exempt Obligations in a manner that results in the creation of replacement proceeds, as defined in Treasury Regulation Section 1.148-1, of the Tax-Exempt Obligations.

The above provisions are made solely for the purpose of establishing compliance with the requirements of said Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. This provision does not bind the District or the Board to make any expenditure, incur any indebtedness, or proceed with the financing, acquisition or construction of the Capital Projects.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

BACKGROUND

RSCCD has successfully utilized the Chancellor’s Office Tax Offset Program (COTOP) since its inception in 1982 to collect delinquent student fees and obligations owed to the District. It has helped to lower the District’s National Direct Student Loan (NDSL)/Perkins Loan default rate. It also meets the Federal Government’s due diligence requirement necessary for assignment of outstanding student loans with the Department of Education. COTOP is also used in the recovery of financial aid grant over awards, which become an institutional expense that needs to be paid back by the student to the district.

ANALYSIS

Renewal of the attached contract will authorize the Chancellor’s Office and the State Controller to continue to collect any outstanding student financial aid obligations and debt, on behalf of the district, by offsetting the amount in default against any money the state may owe the student such as a state income tax refund or lottery winnings. There is no incurred cost to the district to participate in the COTOP program, the state deducts 25% of the amounts collected as an administrative fee before remitting the funds to the District. The percentage deducted has not changed from the previous year. The term of this contract is from October 1, 2014 through December 20, 2015.

THIS CONTRACT, made and entered into on or before this first day of October, 2014, in the State of California, by and between the

The CHANCELLOR of the CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGES
(hereinafter Chancellor) and the

RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT
(hereinafter District) do agree that:

I.

Performance of this contract shall be pursuant to Government Code Sections 12419.2, 12419.5, 12419.7, 12419.9, 12419.10. Both parties' performance of this contract shall conform to the requirements of those statutes.

The Chancellor agrees to act on behalf of the District for the purpose of collecting through the State Franchise Tax Board's Interagency Offset Program, outstanding student financial aid and proper non-financial aid obligations owed to the District.

II.

The Chancellor's Office Tax Offset Program (hereafter known as COTOP) will be a (self-supporting) program with collection fees charged to the participating districts for the administrative costs incurred by the Chancellor in operating the program.

The Chancellor will, if a debtor owes an obligation to more than one college or district, eliminate the name of that debtor from the college or agency to which the debtor owes the smaller obligation.

The District will pay to the Chancellor an amount equal to but not greater than 25 percent (25%) of the amount which the Chancellor collects on behalf of the district from the Franchise Tax Board.

III.

The Chancellor will perform only those administrative services necessary to implement the legislation and related functions concerning the repayment of student financial aid and proper non-financial aid obligations through the COTOP program. Names and amounts submitted in error by the district will be treated as all other names and amounts and may be offset by the Franchise Tax Board.

The district may submit requests for deletions or revisions to the unpaid account balance to the Chancellor at any time and as often as needed.

Districts must enter their initial COTOP debtor data to the Chancellor's Office Tax Offset Program web-based system no later than November 17, 2014. Districts may make modifications to accounts (adds/changes/deletes) until November 17, 2014. If an offset occurs prior to the implementation of the deletion or modification by the Franchise Tax Board, it will be the responsibility of the District to make restitution directly to the debtor as required by Section IV.6 below.

The Chancellor or Franchise Tax Board will delete all names which cannot be processed by the Chancellor's Office or the Franchise Tax Board.

IV.

The District will:

1. Submit a single record for each affected individual as specified in #3 below according to the format and specifications in Appendices A and B which are incorporated into and made a part of this contract.
2. Notify those debtors whose names are submitted for collection of the pending action no later than submitting those names to the Chancellor's Office and review any objections received from those debtors. This notification should inform the debtor that the individual is entitled to request a review of the decision to collect the debt by the offset procedure. Immediately submit to the Chancellor's Office any modifications of the amount or deletions of any record found to be submitted in error, as necessary, as a result of the review as required by Appendix C, which is incorporated into and made a part of this contract.
3. Submit for collection through the COTOP program only the following types of debtor obligations:
 - A. defaulted Perkins, Nursing, Emergency and Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) loans;
 - B. campus financial aid funds; EOPS Grants and Board of Governors Enrollment Fee Waivers for which the student was ineligible;
 - C. other financial aid obligations.
 - D. Proper student non-financial aid obligations limited to: non-resident tuition; enrollment fees; library fines; library replacement material charges; parking fees; parking fines (incurred within 3 years of date submitted for collection only); residence hall rent contracts; cafeteria meal contracts; telephone bills; drop fees (incurred prior to January 1992); personal checks returned for non-sufficient funds (limited to bookstore and other charges listed in this section only); returned check service charges; child care charges; instructional equipment breakage/replacement charges; health fees; transcript fees; foreign student insurance charges; dental health center charges; community services fees; lost key charges; transportation charges/fees; audit fees; contract class charges; instructional material fees; damage to campus facilities/equipment charges; personal checks written to "Cash" returned for non-sufficient funds (including returned check service fee); auto repair costs (including parts, lab fee, sales tax on parts); student representation fee; student center fee.

BACKGROUND

Measure Q was passed by voters in November 2012. It has now become necessary to issue the first series of bonds in order to continue planning and construction for Measure Q projects at Santa Ana College.

With regulatory and legal changes in how general obligation tax exempt bonds are to be issued by underwriters, it has become necessary to engage the services of a financial advisory firm to represent the District's interests in the issuance of bonds.

The first issuance (Series A) of Measure Q bonds is scheduled to be sold in October 2014 in the amount of \$70 million. In preparation for the sale, a financial advisor consultant is necessary to assist in the preparation of the bond structure and assistance in pricing of the bonds for sale.

ANALYSIS

A Request for Proposals (RFP) for Financial Advisory Services (RFP#14/15-01) was issued on July 31, 2014. RFP packages were sent to 13 financial advisory firms. Seven responses were received by the August 25, 2014 deadline at 4:00 p.m. The seven responses were reviewed and evaluated. The District recommends engaging the services of the Dolinka Group.

The Dolinka Group proposal is to provide financial advisory consulting services in issuing Measure Q bonds for a flat fee of \$38,500 per bond issuance plus expenses not to exceed \$3,000 per issuance.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement with Dolinka Group to provide Financial Advisory Services for Measure Q as presented.

AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTING SERVICES ("Agreement") is made and entered into this ____ day of _____ 2014 ("Effective Date"), by and between Rancho Santiago Community College District at 2323 North Broadway, Santa Ana, CA 92706, hereinafter called "Client", and Dolinka Group, LLC at 20 Pacifica, Suite 900, Irvine, CA 92618, hereinafter called "Consultant". The Client and the Consultant in consideration of the mutual promises and conditions herein contained agree as follows:

ARTICLE I.

SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED BY CONSULTANT

Section 1.1 Consulting Services, Statement of Work. Client hereby retains Consultant to perform the services ("Consulting Services") set forth in the statement of work (the "Statement of Work" or "SOW") as attached as Exhibit A to this Agreement. The Consulting Services and the Statement of Work are governed by this Agreement. In the event of any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the terms of the SOW, the terms of this Agreement shall control. This Agreement along with the SOW shall be referred to hereinafter as the "Agreement". Consultant may subcontract any portion of the Consulting Services, provided that Consultant shall notify Client in writing of the name and address of any proposed subcontractor and Client either consents or fails to respond to the notification with respect to the use of any particular proposed subcontractor within ten (10) business days of delivery thereof.

Section 1.2 No Agency. The relationship of Client and Consultant hereunder is that of independent contractors. In all matters relating to this Agreement, each of Client and Consultant shall be solely responsible and liable for the acts of its employees and agents, and the employees or agents of either party shall not be considered employees or agents of the other party. Neither party shall have any right, power or authority to create any obligation, express or implied, on behalf of the other party, nor shall Client or Consultant act or represent or hold itself out as having authority to act as an agent or partner of the other, or in any way to bind or commit the other to any obligations. Nothing in this Agreement is intended to create or constitute, nor does it create or constitute, an employment, joint venture, partnership, agency, trust or other relationship or association of any kind between the parties.

ARTICLE II.

OWNERSHIP; USE

Section 2.1 Consultant Materials. As between Client and Consultant, Consultant owns any and all, including all intellectual property rights therein, (collectively, "Consultant Materials") (a) computer software (including without limitation financial models, compilations of formulas and spreadsheet models), inventions, designs, programs, improvements, techniques, ideas, concepts, trade secrets and know-how, proprietary models, processes and methods used by Consultant in the performance of the Consulting Services, and (b) reports, drawings, templates, specifications, computer files, field data, notes, other documents and instruments and other works of authorship and developments made, conceived, created, discovered, invented or reduced to practice in the performance of the Consulting Services or otherwise under this Agreement.

Section 2.2 Client's Rights and Obligations. Client acknowledges and agrees that the consideration paid by Client herein only entitles Client to a right to use the hard copy or electronically transmitted reports portion of the Consultant Materials generated pursuant to the Consulting Services (each a "Report"). Client shall not reuse (for any purpose other than the purpose for which the Report was intended) or make any modification to the Reports without the prior written authorization of the Consultant. As Consultant is performing the Consulting Services

solely for the benefit of Client, Client shall, to the fullest extent permitted by law, indemnify and hold harmless Consultant, its shareholders, officers, directors, employees and subcontractors against any damages, losses, liabilities and costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, arising from or allegedly arising from or in any way connected with the unauthorized use of the Consultant Materials or the unauthorized use, reuse or modification of the Reports by or through Client.

Section 2.3 Rights. Consultant reserves all rights in the Consultant Materials, including without limitation the Reports, not granted hereunder. Nothing in this Agreement shall prohibit Consultant from using the Consultant Materials for any purpose either during the term of this Agreement or thereafter. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, Client acknowledges that Consultant may have used reports and analyses that Consultant authored for other clients as base works or templates for the Reports, and Client acknowledges and agrees that Consultant has the right to use the Reports as base works or templates for reports and analyses that Consultant authors for Consultant's other clients, provided, however that Consultant shall not use any Confidential Information (defined below) provided by Client in such future reports and analyses. Client further acknowledges and agrees that Consultant has spent and will spend substantial time and effort in collection and compiling data and information (including without limitation Client Data, as defined below) (the "Data Compilations") in connection with the Consulting Services and that such Data Compilations may be used by Consultant for its own purposes, including, without limitation, sale or distribution to third parties; provided, however, that Consultant will not sell or distribute any of Client's Confidential Information that may be contained in such Data Compilations, unless such information is used only on an aggregated and anonymous basis.

ARTICLE III. COMPENSATION

Section 3.1 Fees. Client shall pay Consultant a professional fee computed according to the fee schedule attached as Exhibit B hereto (the "Fee Schedule") for the Consulting Services rendered hereunder. Consultant may adjust its rates in the event of an amendment of the Statement of Work, any other agreed-to expansion of the Consulting Services to be rendered hereunder or upon agreement of the parties. Rates are exclusive of taxes, levies, duties, governmental charges or expenses. If Consultant is required to pay any of the foregoing based on Consultant Services provided under this Agreement, such taxes, levies, duties, governmental charges and expenses (with the exception of any Consultant's income taxes) will be billed and paid by Client.

Section 3.2 Reimbursement. Client agrees that it shall reimburse Consultant for Consultant's out-of-pocket expenses incurred in performance of the Consulting Services plus a 15% administrative charge calculated thereon. Expenses of Consultant in the performance of any Consulting Services may include, without limitation, the following:

- (a) Cost of clerical assistance @ \$50.00 per hour;
- (b) Transportation costs, including mileage for the use of personal automobiles at the prevailing IRS standard rate, rental vehicles, travel, lodging and regularly scheduled commercial airline ticket costs;
- (c) Third-party photographic reproduction and data purchases; and
- (d) Cost of photocopies, facsimile, postage, overnight deliveries, conference call hosting, and phone calls at 5% of Consulting Services billed.

4.7 (3)

Section 3.3 Invoices. On or about the fifteenth (15) day following each month during which Consulting Services are rendered hereunder, or as soon as is reasonably practicable thereafter, Consultant shall deliver to Client an invoice covering the Consulting Services performed and the reimbursable expenses incurred in the prior month. Client shall pay all invoices within forty-five (45) days of the date of each invoice. A monthly charge of 1.2% may be imposed against past due accounts. Payment of invoices shall not be subject to any discounts or set-offs by Client, unless agreed to in writing by Consultant.

Section 3.4 Records. Consultant shall maintain records of its fees relating to the Consulting Services performed and any reimbursable expenses incurred under this Agreement for review by an authorized representative of Client for a period of three (3) years from the date of each invoice delivered by Consultant in relation thereto, provided, however, that (a) Client shall be entitled to no more than one such review per year, (b) any such reviews shall take place during normal business hours, and (c) all authorized representatives of Client performing a review under this Section 3.4 shall first sign a nondisclosure agreement in form and substance reasonably satisfactory to Consultant protecting Consultant's confidential information before conducting such review.

ARTICLE IV. OTHER AGREEMENTS OF CONSULTANT

Section 4.1 Performance. Consultant shall perform the Consulting Services in accordance with the Statement of Work and the applicable generally accepted industry standards and practices. Client shall provide prompt written notice to Consultant if Client becomes aware of any fault or defect in the Consulting Services, including any errors, omissions or inconsistencies in the Reports. Subject to Section 5.2, should any errors in the Reports caused by Consultant's negligence be detected within thirty (30) days after the applicable Consulting Services were performed, Client's sole remedy and Consultant's exclusive liability shall be for Consultant, at Consultant's option, to (a) correct the error at no additional charge to Client by revising the Reports to eliminate the errors; or (b) refund to Client the amount paid by Client for the deficient portion of the Consulting Service(s) that resulted in the error.

Section 4.2 Necessary tools. Consultant shall supply all tools and instrumentalities required to perform the Consulting Services under the Agreement.

Section 4.3 Workers' Compensation. Consultant shall maintain workers' compensation insurance for Consultant's employees and agents performing Consulting Services as required by law. Consultant agrees that it shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws and ordinances as it relates to the work to be performed under this Agreement.

Section 4.4 Liability Insurance. Consultant shall, at its sole cost and expense, carry and maintain throughout the term of this Agreement professional liability insurance covering errors and omissions, with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence or \$2,000,000 aggregate. Evidence of such insurance shall be provided to Client upon request.

ARTICLE V. OTHER AGREEMENTS OF CLIENT

Section 5.1 Client's Assistance. Client shall provide all information, data and documents as specified in the SOW, or reasonably requested by Consultant and which is reasonably necessary to the performance of the Consulting Services. Client shall also satisfy any assumptions and perform any Client obligations identified in the Statement of Work, and shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations in performing hereunder.

4.7 (4)

Section 5.2 Client Responsibility.

(a) Client acknowledges that, in performing the Consulting Services and preparing the Reports, Consultant will be using and relying upon various data, reports, studies, computer printouts and other information, documents and representations as to facts, the source of which may be Client, public agencies or other third-parties, (all of which shall be referred to herein as the "Client Data"). Client agrees that Consultant is entitled to use and rely upon such Client Data in preparing the Reports and performing the other Consulting Services hereunder, and that Consultant shall not be obligated to establish or verify the accuracy of the Client Data, nor shall Consultant be responsible for the impact or effect of Client Data on its work products (including without limitation the Reports) in the event that such Client Data is in error and therefore introduces error into the work products (including without limitation the Reports).

(b) Client represents and warrants to Consultant that Client has the right to deliver to Consultant the Client Data delivered to Consultant hereunder and neither the Client Data, nor its use as contemplated hereunder, shall (i) infringe any intellectual property rights of any third party, (ii) violate any laws or privacy rights of any third party, or (iii) violate any third parties' privacy policies, and Client shall use commercially reasonable efforts to ensure that the Client Data does not contain any viruses or other damaging or disabling code.

(c) Client shall defend, indemnify and hold Consultant harmless from and against all obligations, losses, liabilities, damages, claims, attachments, executions, demands, actions and/or proceedings (collectively, "Claims") and all costs and expenses in connection therewith, including reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses, arising out of or connected with the performance of the Consulting Services under this Agreement when such Claims arise from, relate to, or in any way result from (i) errors contained in Client Data furnished to Consultant, or (ii) Client's breach of its warranties or covenants hereunder. Client's obligations under this subsection shall be reduced to the extent that they arise out of Consultant's gross negligence or willful misconduct.

Section 5.3 Testimony. In the event that court appearances, testimony or depositions are required of Consultant by Client in connection with the Consulting Services rendered hereunder, and the parties do not separately contract for such additional services, Client shall compensate Consultant for such appearances at a rate of \$300 per hour and shall reimburse Consultant for out-of-pocket expenses on a cost basis. In the event Consultant is subpoenaed by a third-party in relation to services provided under this Agreement, fulfilling such obligations will be considered out of scope services and be billed based on time and materials expended.

Section 5.4 Non-Solicitation. Client shall not solicit the employment of or hire any of Consultant's employees during the term, and for one year following the termination of, this Agreement; provided, however, that the foregoing restrictions shall not prohibit Client from generalized solicitation or advertising, including the use of an independent employment agency or search firm whose efforts are not specifically directed at such employees. Notwithstanding the foregoing, such employees shall not include any individual (a) whose employment with Consultant has terminated for any reason (other than through breach of this Section 5.4), or (b) whose employment or solicitation thereof has been agreed upon in writing by Consultant.

ARTICLE VI.
TERM; TERMINATION

Section 6.1 Term. This Agreement shall become effective on the Effective Date and will continue in effect until the earlier of (a) completion of performance under the SOW, or (b) termination as provided herein.

4.7 (5)

Section 6.2 Convenience. Either party may terminate this Agreement (and the Statement of Work) for convenience upon thirty (30) prior written days' notice to the other party.

Section 6.3 Breach. Either party may terminate this Agreement (and the Statement of Work) with written notice to the other party if the other party is in material breach of any of its obligations under this Agreement, which breach is not cured within three (3) days' written notice from the other party. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, if Client fails to make payments when due hereunder, Consultant may suspend performance of the Consulting Services upon notice to Client. Consultant shall have no liability to Client for any costs or damages arising as a result of such suspension. Upon payment in full by Client (provided that Consultant has not terminated the Agreement in the interim), Consultant shall resume Consulting Services under this Agreement, and the Statement of Work shall be equitably adjusted to compensate for the period of suspension plus any other reasonable time and expense necessary for the Consultant to resume performance.

Section 6.4 Fees. Upon expiration or termination of this Agreement, Client shall pay all of Consultant's fees, expenses and other costs payable by Client pursuant to Article III, which have accrued through the date of expiration or termination.

Section 6.5 Survival. Sections 1,2, 3.1, 3.2, 3.3, 5.2, 5.4, 6.4, 6.5 and Articles II, VII and VIII shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE VII. CONFIDENTIALITY

Section 7.1 Definition. "Confidential Information" means all information that is disclosed by a party to the other party and that: (a) is designated as confidential, regardless of the form in which it is disclosed; or (b) relates to a party's markets, customers, patents, trade secrets, inventions, procedures, methods, designs, strategies, distributors or business in general. The term Confidential Information shall not include any item of information which: (i) the receiving party can prove was in its possession without a duty of confidentiality prior to disclosure thereof by the disclosing party whether prior to or during the term of this Agreement; (ii) is or becomes generally available to the public other than as a result of any action or omission by the receiving party; (iii) is rightfully disclosed to the receiving party by a third party without the imposition on the third party of any confidentiality obligation or restrictions on use; or (iv) is independently developed by the receiving party without reference to the disclosing party's Confidential Information, as evidenced by the receiving party's written records. The Consultant Materials are Consultant's Confidential Information (subject to the rights set forth in Section 2.2).

Section 7.2 Obligation. Each party, as a receiving party, shall (a) hold all Confidential Information of the disclosing party in confidence and not disclose the other party's Confidential Information to anyone except its employees who have a need to know and who are at all times informed of, and understand that they are bound to observe, the same confidentiality and nondisclosure restrictions and obligations as are set forth in this Agreement; (b) use the other party's Confidential Information only as necessary for its performance hereunder; and (c) hold and protect the other party's Confidential Information with the same degree of care that it uses with its own information of like importance, but in no event less than a reasonable standard of care.

Section 7.3 Compelled Disclosure. If either receiving party is requested or required by law or legal process to disclose any of the disclosing party's Confidential Information, the person required to disclose such Confidential Information shall provide the disclosing party with prompt oral and written notice, so that the disclosing party may seek a protective order or other appropriate remedy. In the event that such a protective order or other remedy is not promptly obtained, the receiving party shall furnish only that portion of the disclosing party's Confidential Information which is legally required and shall exercise its best efforts to obtain a protective order

or other reliable assurance that confidential treatment shall be accorded to the disclosing party's Confidential Information.

Section 7.4 Injunctive Relief. Each party, as a receiving party, agrees that remedies at law are inadequate to protect against its breach or threatened breach of this Article VII. Accordingly, each party agrees that the other party may obtain injunctive relief against it in the event of any such breach or threat thereof, in addition to any other legal or equitable remedies that may be available.

ARTICLE VIII. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 8.1 Notice. Any notices to be given hereunder by either party to the other may be effected either by personal delivery in writing, by mail or by electronic mail (reader receipt requested). Mailed notices shall be addressed to the parties at the addresses appearing in the introductory paragraph of this Agreement, or at the following email addresses (Consultant: bdolinka@dolinkagroup.com; Client: _____), but each party may change the address by written notice in accordance with the first sentence of this Section 8.1. Notices delivered personally or by electronic mail (reader receipt requested) will be deemed communicated as of actual receipt. Mailed notices will be deemed communicated as of two (2) days after mailing.

Section 8.2 Assignment. Neither party may assign this Agreement, in whole or in part without the express written consent of the other party, with the exception of an assignment carried out as part of a merger, restructuring or reorganization, or as a sale or transfer of all or substantially all of a party's equity or assets. Any such attempted assignment or delegation without proper consent shall be void. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the party's respective successors and permitted assigns.

Section 8.3 Not Public Official. Neither this Agreement, nor any duties or obligations under this Agreement, nor the intentions or expectations of Client will cause Consultant to be a "public official" as that term is used in Section 87100 of Title 9 of the California Government Code. Client and Consultant agree that Consultant is not a "public official" or "participating in governmental decision" as those terms are used in Section 87100. Client and Consultant also agree that no actions and opinions necessary for the performance of duties under this Agreement will cause Consultant to be a "public official" or "participating in a governmental decision" as those terms are used in Section 87100.

Section 8.4 Entire Agreement. This Agreement and Exhibits A and B hereto supersede any and all agreements, either oral or written, between the parties hereto with respect to the rendering of service by Consultant for Client and contains all of the covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to the rendering of the Consulting Services. Each party to this Agreement acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises, or agreements, orally or otherwise, have been made by any party, or anyone acting on behalf of any party, which are not embodied herein, and that no other agreement, statement, or promise not contained in this Agreement shall be valid or binding. Any reference to any statute herein shall be construed as including all statutory provisions consolidating, amending or replacing such statute.

Section 8.5 Amendment. This Agreement and any exhibit hereto (including the Statement of Work) may not be amended or modified except as expressly provided herein or in writing by the parties and signed by authorized representatives of both parties.

Section 8.6 Severability. If any provision in this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

Section 8.7 Dispute Resolution.

(a) Except as set forth in Section 7.4, the parties agree to first try in good faith to settle any dispute hereunder by mediation pursuant to the Mediation Rules of the American Arbitration Association. If the dispute is not settled by mediation, the dispute may be resolved by final and binding arbitration.

(b) Except as set forth in Section 7.4, on the written request of one party served on the other, the dispute shall be submitted to binding arbitration in accordance with the commercial rules and regulations of the American Arbitration Association and the provisions of the California Arbitration Act (Sections 1280 through 1294.2 of the California Code of Civil Procedure). The arbitration shall take place in Orange County, California, or such other location mutually agreed to by the parties. Consultant shall select the arbitrator. If Consultant and Client do not agree on such arbitrator, however, Client shall select a second arbitrator. The Client-selected arbitrator and the Consultant-selected arbitrator shall then select a third arbitrator, which arbitrator shall conduct the arbitration. The parties may select arbitrators from JAMS, ADR, ARC or any independent arbitrator/neutral for dispute resolution. The parties are not required to hire an AAA arbitrator for resolution of a dispute hereunder. No arbitration shall include by way of consolidation or joinder any parties or entities not a party to this Agreement without the express written consent of Client, Consultant and any party or entity sought to be joined with an express reference to this provision. Any party or entity joined in the arbitration, after mutual consent, shall be bound by this provision. The decree or judgment of an award rendered by the arbitrator(s) may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof.

(c) The prevailing party in any arbitration brought by one party against the other and arising out of this Agreement shall be entitled, in addition to any other rights and remedies it may have, to reimbursement for its expenses, including court costs and reasonable attorneys' fees. The non-prevailing party shall be liable, to the extent allowable under law, for all fees and expenses of the arbitrator(s) and all costs of the arbitration.

Section 8.8 Governing Law. This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, excluding its choice of law rules.

Section 8.9 Third Parties. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of a third party against either Client or Consultant. The Consulting Services are being performed solely for Client's benefit, and no other party or entity shall have any claim against Consultant because of this Agreement or the performance or nonperformance of services hereunder.

Section 8.10 DISCLAIMER OF CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES. EXCEPT FOR DAMAGES ARISING FROM BREACH OF SECTION 2.2 or ARTICLE VII, NEITHER CONSULTANT NOR CLIENT, NOR THEIR RESPECTIVE OFFICERS, DIRECTORS, PARTNERS, EMPLOYEES, CONTRACTORS OR SUBCONTRACTORS, WILL BE LIABLE FOR ANY INDIRECT, INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, EXEMPLARY, TREBLE, PUNITIVE OR SPECIAL DAMAGES (INCLUDING DAMAGES FOR LOST PROFITS, LOST BUSINESS OPPORTUNITY, LOSS OF USE, LOSS OF INCOME, LOSS OF REPUTATION, PERSONAL INJURY OR THE LIKE) RESULTING FROM OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION, LIABILITY ARISING OUT OF CONTRACT, TORT, NEGLIGENCE, AND STRICT LIABILITY, EVEN IF SUCH PARTY HAS BEEN ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES.

Section 8.11 Force Majeure. Neither party will be liable for any failure to perform (except for payment of monies due hereunder) due to unforeseen circumstances or causes beyond its reasonable control, including, but not limited to, acts of God, war, acts of terrorism, embargoes, acts of civil or military authorities, fire, flood, accident, strikes, inability to secure transportation, facilities, fuel, energy, labor or materials. In the event of force majeure, time for delivery or other performance will be extended for a period equal to the duration of the delay caused thereby.

Section 8.12 Limitation. The parties intend that the Consulting Services shall not subject the Consultant's individual shareholders, officers, directors, members, managers or employees to any personal legal exposure for the risks associated with the Consulting Services. Therefore, and notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, Client agrees that Client's sole and exclusive remedy, any claim, demand or suit shall be directed and/or asserted only against Consultant and not against any of the individual shareholders, officers, directors, members, managers or employees.

Section 8.13 DISCLAIMER. EXCEPT AS MAY BE SPECIFIED IN THIS AGREEMENT, CONSULTANT EXPRESSLY DISCLAIMS ALL WARRANTIES UNDER THIS AGREEMENT, EXPRESS AND IMPLIED, INCLUDING THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, NON- INFRINGEMENT AND WARRANTIES ARISING UNDER COURSE OF DEALING OR TRADE USAGE.

Section 8.14 Limitation of Liability. In recognition of the relative risks and benefits of the Consulting Services to both Client and Consultant, the risks have been allocated such that Client agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, that, except for breach of Article VII by Consultant, Consultant's total aggregate liability under or relating to this Agreement for any cause of action, including contract, tort and otherwise, shall not exceed the sum of amounts actually paid to Consultant under this Agreement. The limitations of liability set forth in this Article VIII and exclusion of certain damages shall apply regardless of the success or effectiveness of any of the exclusive remedies provided for under this Agreement. Any action against Consultant must be brought within eighteen (18) months after the cause of action arises.



BACKGROUND:

This is a new agreement for architectural services related to the New Johnson Student Center Project at Santa Ana College. The District is in need of professional services for the design and related work. The existing Johnson Center was built in 1968 and the majority of the building components are beyond useful life. Therefore, it was determined by both the District and the campus that it would be best to demolish and reconstruct Johnson Center which will support all the program requirements established and meet the objectives of the Facility Master Plan for Santa Ana College. The new target budget for construction is \$20,925,000 and a revised total project budget increased from \$16,700,000 to \$28,498,138.

ANALYSIS:

A Request for Proposal (RFP) #1314-54 was issued on April 30, 2014 to ten pre-qualified firms with a response deadline of May 20, 2014. The District received eight responses from Hammel, Green & Abraham, Inc. (Santa Monica), HPI Architecture (Newport Beach), Lionakis (Newport Beach), MVE Institutional, Inc.(Santa Ana), NTD Architecture (Newport Beach), R2A Architecture (Costa Mesa), Steinberg Architects (Los Angeles), and Westberg+White Architects (Tustin). A committee of six members reviewed the proposals on June 2, 2014 and interviewed five firms on June 10, 2014; Hill Partnership, Inc., R2A Architecture, Westberg+White Architects, Steinberg Architects, Hammel, Green & Abraham, Inc. The selection and interview committee recommends HPI Architecture by consensus based upon a thorough review and the culmination of their RFP response, experience, team members, approach to the project, ability to meet the schedule requirements, and significant experience with student activity and student union centers.

The District recommends the architectural and engineering services of HPI Architecture. The services covered by this agreement shall commence September 9, 2014 and end June 30, 2019. The contract is a total not-to-exceed fee of \$2,105,735.00 and includes a reimbursable allowance of \$25,000.

This agreement is funded by Measure Q.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the contract with HPI Architecture based in Newport Beach, California, for the New Johnson Student Center Project at Santa Ana College as presented.

This is a new agreement for Labor Compliance Program and Community Student Workforce Project Agreement Coordinator Consulting Services. On March 24, 2014 the Board of Trustees entered into a Community and Student Workforce Project Agreement (“CSWPA”) with the Los Angeles/Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council for all Measure Q Projects. Additionally, Labor Code Section 1771.7 requires school districts that use funds derived from the Kindergarten-University Public Education Facilities Bond Act for a public works project to initiate and enforce, or contract with a third party to initiate and enforce a labor compliance program. The District, per the CSWPA, will also need the assistance of a Project Labor Coordinator to work with the District, contractors and the unions to administer and comply with the agreement.

ANALYSIS:

A Request for Qualifications/Request for Proposals (RFQ/RFP) #1314-55 for Labor Compliance Program/Certified Payroll Collection and Prevailing Wages Coordinator and Community and Student Workforce Project Agreement Project Coordinator Consulting Services (CSWPA) was released and advertised on June 16, 2014. The District received six responses from CS & Associates (Santa Clarita), GCAP Services (Costa Mesa), Padilla & Associates (Santa Ana), The Solis Group (Pasadena), Parsons Constructors, Inc. (Irvine), and Contractor Compliance and Monitoring, Inc. (San Mateo). A selection committee convened on July 10, 2014 to review the proposals and held interviews with CS & Associates, Padilla & Associates, The Solis Group and Parsons Constructors, Inc. on July 14, 2014. The selection committee recommends The Solis Group after a thorough review based upon the culmination of their RFQ/RFP response, experience with Community College Districts, comprehensive team with clearly defined roles and responsibilities, approach to the project, fee, schedule and familiarity with coordination of similar workforce and Labor Compliance Programs. It is recommended that the District enter into an agreement with The Solis Group for Labor Compliance and Student Workforce Project Agreement Project coordinator consulting services for various projects at Santa Ana College.

The services covered by this agreement shall commence on September 9, 2014 and end December 19, 2019. The services are based on a fixed fee in the amount of \$441,169.

This agreement is funded by Measure Q.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the agreement with The Solis Group for Labor Compliance and Community Student Workforce Project Agreement Coordinator Consulting Services for Various Projects at Santa Ana College as presented.

BACKGROUND:

On September 24, 2013, a comprehensive roof survey was conducted inclusive of Buildings C, N, P and R on the Santa Ana College campus to assess the condition of the existing roof membrane systems. The existing systems were installed in early 1990's and have been exhibiting signs of deterioration due to cracking, blistering, ponding and leakage. The survey determined that the roofs had reached the end of their lifecycle after approximately 24 years. It was recommended that the roof membranes be replaced or restored. As a result of the survey and recommendation, Bid #1242 was issued for the replacement or restorations of the roof membrane systems on Buildings C, N, P and R.

ANALYSIS:

In accordance with the Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act, Bid #1242 Roofing Repairs to Fine Arts/Art Gallery (C), Music (N), Phillips Hall Theatre (P) and Russell Hall (R) buildings was appropriately advertised in the Orange County Newspaper, two trade journals and a Notice Calling for Informal Bids was sent to the qualified contractor list (approximately 13 contractors).

A mandatory job walk was held on July 14, 2014. Bids were opened on July 31, 2014 for the Roofing Repairs to Buildings C, N, P, and R at Santa Ana College as noted on the attached Bid Results form. The District received nine (9) bids for the project. Letner Roofing Company (Orange) submitted the lowest responsive bid for the amount of \$409,000. District staff has conducted a due diligence review to ensure compliance with license and bid bond requirements. After review of the project bids received, it is recommended moving forward with award of the work described within Bid #1242 to Letner Roofing Company.

This project is funded by Scheduled Maintenance.

BACKGROUND:

On February 18, 2014, the Board of Trustees approved an agreement with McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. for Santa Ana College - Tessman Planetarium Upgrade and Restroom Addition, Parking Lot #11 Expansion and Improvements and Temporary Village. This project includes three distinct project scopes of work and had originally a short timeline for completion with the entire project to be completed by the end of October 2014. The project has encountered significant challenges early on which have impacted costs and schedule. In May 2014, termite damage was discovered to the Planetarium and required a termite inspection report, a structural inspection and DSA review. It was determined that the building framing had both dry wood and subterranean termite damage which resulted in remediation design plans to be prepared for submittal to DSA. As a result of the redesign plans with additional DSA review time, along with several unforeseen conditions such as the relocation of a domestic waterline on the site and re-phasing of work along Campus Road to facilitate one-way traffic, the project has incurred additional costs. The termite damage has resulted in a delay to the Planetarium project with completion now not expected until the end of January 2015 with re-occupancy likely to occur in February 2015 based on best estimates. This is an unfortunate situation. The majority of the costs associated with Change Order #1 are for the termite damage repairs as well as the costs for the extended general condition costs for McCarthy.

ANALYSIS:

Change Order #1 increases the contract value by \$1,049,572.26. The revised contract amount is \$13,523,299.26. The costs indicated in the change order are considered fair, reasonable and within industry standards by the architect, construction manager and staff. The total Change Order #1 for the project is at 8.4% of the construction contract. Additionally, the contract time will be extended by 123 days and the new end date is January 31, 2015. Pursuant to Administrative Regulation 3504, staff has approved this change order.

This project is funded by Measure E.

RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND:

On August 2, 2012 an annual compliance inspection was conducted by the SCAQMD at the Santa Ana College and was issued a Notice of Violation (NOV) P58930 in respect to the required permit necessary to operate certain boilers at the campus in buildings A, F and R. Working with SCAQMD and in consideration of the District's non-intentional conduct and the course of corrective actions undertaken to address the violation, plans and specifications were immediately prepared and submitted to the DSA in March of 2013. Corrective work began in the summer of 2013 and was completed and certified with the DSA on July 16, 2014. Given, the District has completed the corrective action work, additional discussions with the SCAQMD occurred to minimize the assessment of penalties. Consequently, a Settlement Agreement was proposed by the parties and reviewed by both entities district legal counsels. Bryce Chastain, legal counsel, reviewed the agreement on behalf of the District.

ANALYSIS:

Given that the Santa Ana College has demonstrated compliance with regards to the violations alleged in NOV P58930, including the replacement and registration of the four boilers noted, the parties agree to settling any civil penalties authorized by the California Health and Safety Code Section 42400 et seq., for violations alleged in the NOV on the terms and conditions set forth in the attached proposed Settlement Agreement in the amount of \$6,000. This assessment is a minimal assessment and it is recommended that the agreement be approved.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

This Settlement Agreement (“Agreement”) is entered into by and between Santa Ana College and the South Coast Air Quality Management District (“District” or “SCAQMD”) (collectively referred to as “Parties” or individually as “Party”).

RECITALS

A. The District is a political subdivision of the State of California created by the legislature to exercise responsibility for comprehensive air pollution control within Orange County and designated portions of Los Angeles, Riverside, and San Bernardino Counties, with its headquarters located at 21865 Copley Drive, Diamond Bar, California 91765.

B. Santa Ana College is community college located in the District’s jurisdiction at 1530 W. 17th Street, Santa Ana, California 92706 (the “Facility”) with facility identification number 20926.

C. On August 2, 2012, a District Inspector conducted an annual compliance inspection and issued Notice of Violation (“NOV”) P58930 to the Facility for violations of District Rules 203(a), 222, 1146.1, 1146.2, and 1415. The alleged violations and matters which are the subject of this Agreement are limited to the violations of District Rules as alleged in NOV P58930.

D. **District Rule 203(a)** provides, in relevant part, that no person shall operate or use any equipment without first obtaining a written Permit to Operate.

E. **District Rule 222** provides an alternative to written permits for certain specified equipment, including boilers.

F. **District Rule 1146.1** pertains to boilers and other specified equipment that are greater than 2 million Btu per hour and less than 5 million Btu per hour rated heat input capacity. Subsection (d)(7)(A) pertains to checking NOx emissions at specified intervals.

G. **District Rule 1146.2** pertains to boilers and other specified equipment that have a rated heat input capacity of less than or equal to 2,000,000 Btu per hour. Subsection (e) pertains to a demonstration of compliance with specified NOx emission limits.

H. **District Rule 1415** addresses, in relevant part, registration plans for stationary air conditioning systems.

I. Santa Ana College has demonstrated compliance with regards to the violations alleged in NOV P58930, including the replacement and registration of four boilers in compliance with District Rule 222 pursuant to application numbers 545338; 545339; 545340 and 545341. Accordingly, the Parties enter into this Agreement with the intention of settling any civil penalties authorized by California Health and Safety Code Section 42400 et seq., for violations alleged in Notice of Violation P58930 on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

AGREEMENTS

NOW, THEREFORE, In consideration of the foregoing Recitals and the mutual covenants, agreements, and releases set forth herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree to the following:

1. **Effective Date.** The effective date of this Agreement shall be the date upon which final signatory signs this Agreement.
2. **Scope.** This Agreement resolves all civil liability related to Notice of Violation P58930. No other violations are resolved by this Agreement.
3. **Performance and Release.** Subject to the complete and timely performance of obligations agreed to by Santa Ana College in this Agreement, the District hereby releases Santa Ana College from any and all civil liability, including penalties, and any other liability arising from the matters set forth in the scope of this Agreement.
4. **Civil Penalties.** Santa Ana College shall pay civil penalties to the District to resolve all civil liability related to Notice of Violation P58930 in the total amount of \$6,000.

5. **Failure to Perform.** In the event that Santa Ana College fails to make the penalty payment in a timely manner, the District may elect in writing to have this Agreement deemed null and void. In such event, the District shall have the right to commence and prosecute litigation based upon the NOV and seek all appropriate relief, including civil penalties to the maximum extent allowable under the law. In such event, the District shall have the right to retain all funds paid prior to the failure to perform.
6. **Warranty of Authority.** Each of the Parties hereto represents and warrants that it has the full power and authority to enter into this Agreement.
7. **Successors and Assigns.** The provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed to obligate, extend to, and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, and the legal successors, assigns, transferees, grantees, and heirs of each party hereto, including those who may assume any or all of the above-described capacity subsequent to the execution and effective date of this Agreement.

8. **Enforceability.** Nothing herein shall be deemed to limit or preclude the right of the District to seek civil or criminal penalties, injunctive or any other legal or administrative relief allowed by law for any other violations of District rules or any other applicable regulations or laws.

9. **Execution by the Parties.** The District and Santa Ana College hereby execute this Agreement by their authorized representatives. The parties agree that this Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and all of which shall be deemed to be one and the same instrument. For purposes of this provision, a facsimile signature shall be deemed to be the equivalent of an original signature, and shall be effective to bind a party thereto.

10. **Modification.** This Agreement may only be modified by written agreement by the Parties.

11. **Governing Law.** The validity, construction, and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California, regardless of the choice-of-law provisions of California or any other jurisdiction.

12. **Recital Incorporation.** The Recitals are made a part of this Agreement as if they were fully written herein.

13. **No Party Deemed Drafter.** The Parties acknowledge that the terms of this Agreement are contractual and are the result of negotiations between the Parties and their respective counsel. Each Party and their respective counsel cooperated in the drafting and preparation of this Agreement.

14. **Notices.** All notices, requests, and other communications which may be given under or concerning this Agreement shall be made in writing and shall be deemed to have been given when received. In each case notice shall be sent to:

BACKGROUND

On behalf of community colleges, the Foundation for California Community Colleges (FCCC) underwent competitive solicitation for Cost Per Copy Printing Services, RFP #13-001. This included cost per copy service and supply plus equipment lease and equipment purchase of multi-function devices (copiers) and production equipment. In order to utilize this agreement, Board approval is required.

ANALYSIS

As yearly copier leases expire and technology advances, replacement of multi-function devices for instructional and office use is an ongoing necessity for the District. The District has been purchasing and leasing these devices, related software, and services from the Xerox Corporation through the California Multiple Award Schedule (CMAS) program and the Western States Contracting Alliance (WSCA) contracts at competitive pricing. Recently, the FCCC awarded a contract to Xerox Corporation that includes piggybackable language allowing utilization by any California community college. It is in the best interest of the District to engage in as many cooperative and piggybackable contracts to take advantage of the different services and price levels. This will allow us to select the best solution for our specific needs.

The FCCC RFP was developed through a rigorous specification and evaluation process with participation from purchasing representatives of the CA community college districts. Under this agreement, the District has the option to lease equipment with a \$1.00 buyout or purchase equipment. Depending on the procurement option and model selected, the FCCC contract pricing can range from 35% to 115.6% less compared to the current contracts. Both lease and purchase options comprise an all-inclusive cost per copy service which includes all maintenance (parts & labor) and consumables (except paper and staples) regardless on the volume. The term of this contract is two years with three one year renewals.

Attached are excerpts from the FCCC contract. The remaining pages are available for review in the Purchasing Department.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the use of the Foundation for California Community Colleges Administrative Services Agreement #CB 13-012 related to RFP #13-001 for Cost Per Copy Printing Services including equipment lease and purchase of multi-function devices (copiers) and production equipment and all future renewals offered by Xerox Corporation as the vendor as presented.

CB 13-012

This ADMINISTRATION SERVICES AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) is made this **9th day of September, 2013**, between the Foundation for California Community Colleges (“Foundation”) and **Xerox Corporation** (“Supplier”).

RECITALS

The Foundation desires to have **Xerox Corporation** (“Supplier”) provide (Services/Products) as described in RFP #13-001, which in its entirety shall serve as Exhibit C.

This Agreement provides that any or all public agencies, public school districts, public colleges or universities, or the Foundation in California (collectively, "Participating Public Agencies") may purchase Products at prices stated in the RFP #13-001;

THEREFORE, in consideration of the payments to be made hereunder and the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, the Foundation and Supplier hereby agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. The Supplier shall perform all of its duties, responsibilities, and obligations in the time and manner as required to be performed by the Supplier as set forth in the Agreement.
2. The Foundation shall perform all of its duties, responsibilities, and obligations as administrator of purchases under the Agreement as set forth herein, and the Supplier hereby agrees that the Foundation shall act in the capacity of administrator of purchases under the Agreement.
3. With respect to any purchases by Participating Public Agencies pursuant to the Agreement, the Foundation: (i) shall not be construed as a dealer, re-marketer, representative, partner, or agent of any type of the Supplier or such Participating Public Agencies; (ii) shall not be obligated, liable or responsible for any order made by Participating Public Agencies or any employee thereof under the Agreement, or for any

payment required to be made with respect to such order; and (iii) shall not be obliged, liable, or responsible for any failure by any Participating Public Agencies to comply with procedures or requirements of applicable law or to obtain the due authorization and approval necessary to purchase under the Agreement. The Foundation makes no representation or guaranty with respect to any minimum purchases by any Participating Public Agencies or any employee thereof under this Agreement or the Agreement.

4. With response to Supplier use of Subcontractors: within ten (10) days of the issuance of a Purchase Order or other instrument evidencing the procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options) under this Agreement, the Supplier shall provide the Participating Public Agency issuing such Purchase Order or other instrument with a written list of Subcontractor(s) to the Supplier for completing the Supplier's obligations under such Purchase Order. The written list of Subcontractors shall identify each Subcontractor who will provide work, labor, or materials valued at one-half of one percent (0.05%) of the total value of the Purchase Order and shall identify the work to be performed by each such Subcontractor and each Subcontractor's business location. The Supplier shall not substitute any listed Subcontractor, except upon the express consent of the Participating Public Agency, as applicable and in strict conformity with applicable law.
5. Insurance. Within ten (10) days of the issuance of a Purchase Order or other similar instrument for the procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options) under this Agreement, the Supplier and each Subcontractor, identified in its Subcontractors List issued by the Supplier for such Purchase Order, shall deliver to the Foundation, and to the Participating Public Agency issuing the Purchase Order or other similar instrument, Certificates of Insurance evidencing the insurance coverage in the minimum coverage amounts noted below. The foregoing notwithstanding, a Participating Public Agency may require additional or different insurance coverage or minimum coverage amounts in connection with any specific procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options). In such event, such additional or different insurance requirements shall be noted in the Purchase Order or other instrument evidencing the procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options), and the Supplier shall comply with the same.
 - a. Workers' Compensation Insurance. The Supplier and all Subcontractors shall obtain and maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance with coverage amounts under such policies in accordance with applicable law.
 - b. Commercial General Liability Insurance. The Supplier and all Subcontractors to the Supplier shall obtain and maintain Commercial General Liability Insurance Policies covering: injuries, including accidental death, to persons; damage to property; completed operations; and contractual liability. Minimum coverage amounts under each such Commercial General Liability insurance policy shall be One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate.
 - c. Professional Liability Insurance. The Supplier and all Subcontractors to the Supplier shall obtain and maintain Professional Liability Insurance policies covering liability arising from any error, omission, negligent or wrongful act

of the Supplier or Subcontractor with limits of not less than \$1 million per occurrence and \$2 million aggregate.

- d. Modifications; Cancellation; Additional Insured. The Foundation and each Participating Public Agency procuring Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options) hereunder shall be named additional insured to the Commercial General Liability insurance policies of the Supplier and its Subcontractors for each specific procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options). The Workers' Compensation insurance policy, the General Liability insurance policy, and the Professional Liability insurance policy of the Supplier and each Subcontractor for each specific procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options) shall include provisions that the policy terms will not be materially modified and that the policy will not be cancelled or terminated without at least thirty (30) days advance written notice to the Participating Public Agency, as applicable.
6. Performance Bond. The Supplier shall, if required by the terms of the Purchase Order or other similar instrument, provide the Participating Public Agency with a Performance Bond in connection with a specific procurement of Cost Per Copy Print Services (Purchase and/or Lease Options). If required, the Performance Bond shall be in the form and content included in the RFP and shall be in a penal sum equal to One Hundred Percent (100%) of the value of such Purchase Order or other instrument. Performance Bonds, if required, shall be acceptable only if issued by an Admitted Surety Insurer under California law.

SPECIFIC PROVISIONS

7. Term. The Term of this Agreement will be for two (2) years, commencing on the date set forth in the Agreement and terminating two (2) years thereafter. The Foundation and Supplier, upon mutual consent, shall have the option to extend the Term for three (3) additional one (1) year Terms ("the Extended Terms") by written notice not less than one (1) month prior to and not more than three (3) months prior to expiration of the Term or the Extended Term, as applicable. If the option for the Extended Terms are exercised, all terms and conditions set forth herein shall be applicable to the Extended Terms, except as expressly modified by written modifications duly executed on behalf of the Foundation and the Supplier. In the event that any of, or a portion of, the extension options are not exercised and additional time is required by the Foundation to initiate a new RFP and subsequent Agreement, the Supplier agrees to continue to provide goods and/or services to the Participating Public Agencies on a month to month basis, for a period not to exceed six (6) months, at the prices, terms and conditions currently at the Agreement expiration date.
8. Right to Terminate. Foundation has the right to terminate this Agreement for any reason, without penalty, at any time by providing Supplier with written notice of the termination at least thirty (30) days in advance.

QUARTERLY FEES & REPORTING

9. Accounting and Right to Audit. Supplier shall, at its expense, maintain accounting of all purchases made by Participating Public Agencies. The Foundation reserves the right to audit the accounting for a period of four (4) years from the date the Foundation receives the accounting. In the event of such an audit, the requested materials shall be provided at the location designated by the Foundation. Furthermore, the Foundation, at its sole discretion, may compare Participating Public Agency Records with quarterly reports submitted by Supplier. If a discrepancy is found, the Foundation will notify the Supplier in writing. The Supplier will have thirty (30) days from the date of such notice to resolve the discrepancy to the Foundation's reasonable satisfaction. If the Supplier does not resolve the said discrepancy, the Foundation shall have the right to engage outside services to conduct an independent audit of the Supplier's quarterly reports. The Supplier shall be obligated to reimburse any and all of the Foundation's costs and expenses related to or connected with the record and report reviews; the audit; Foundation staff time; and expenses, counsel, and collection.
10. Quarterly Fees and Reports. Supplier shall pay the Foundation a quarterly administrative fee in the amount of 2% of the total purchase invoice, less taxes for all purchases by Participating Public Agencies under the awarded RFP, and shall provide the Foundation with an electronic accounting report, in a format prescribed by the Foundation, summarizing all purchases under the Agreement. A sample of the reporting format appears in Attachment 2. Quarterly fees and reports shall be made with respect to all purchases shipped and billed pursuant to the Agreement for the applicable quarter. Quarterly reports are due within fifteen (15) calendar days after the conclusion of the preceding quarter. Quarterly administrative fees applicable to each quarter, are due within thirty (30) days of the end of each calendar quarter. The Foundation reserves the right, upon thirty (30) days advance notice to the Supplier, to change the prescribed reporting format. Administrative fee payments shall be made by check to the Foundation for California Community Colleges.
11. Material Breach. Failure to provide a quarterly report and/or payment of the administrative fee within the time and manner specified in item 10 shall be regarded as a material breach under this Agreement, and if not cured within thirty (30) days of written notice to Supplier, shall be deemed a cause for termination of the Agreement at the Foundation's sole discretion. All administrative fees not paid within thirty (30) days of the end of each quarter shall bear interest at the rate of 1 1/2% per month until paid.
12. Errors and Omissions on Quarterly Reporting and Overpayment of Administrative Fee to the Foundation. Supplier is provided ninety (90) days or until the conclusion of the subsequent quarter (whichever comes first) from when a quarterly report was due or submitted, to correct error(s) and/or omission(s) on a quarterly report; and/or to recover an overpayment of the administrative fee from the Foundation. Once the ninety (90) days or the conclusion of the subsequent quarter (whichever comes first) has lapsed, the Foundation reserves the right to retain the amount of the overpaid administrative fee. The Foundation also reserves the right to recover any unpaid administrative fee(s) from

the Supplier discovered during an audit conducted pursuant to Section 10 above, and/or the correction of error(s) and/or omission(s) on quarterly report(s).

GENERAL PROVISIONS

13. Supplier may submit for review new or enhanced products within the various Applications specified in the RFP #13-001 that were not part of the supplier's product line at contract signing. The Foundation will review the products to ensure they meet minimum requirements and at the Foundation's sole discretion, add products to the contract if deemed acceptable. Supplier must honor enhanced warranty and offer same tiered discount (for similar application) from original RFP response.
14. This Agreement constitutes the entire, complete, final and exclusive agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes and replaces any and all prior and contemporaneous communications between Foundation and Supplier regarding such subject matter. Any terms and conditions which are additional to or different from the terms and conditions of this Agreement are hereby deemed rejected by Foundation and shall not be of any effect or in any way binding upon Foundation. To the extent that the terms and conditions of this Agreement conflict with, or are in any way inconsistent with, the terms and conditions of any exhibit hereto, the terms and conditions of this Agreement will prevail. The exhibits will be given precedence as follows: (1) Mandatory Performance of Services Specifications (Exhibit A); (2) Special Terms and Conditions (Exhibit B); (3) Request for Proposal or RFP (Exhibit C); (4) Supplier's Additional Terms and Conditions (Exhibit D); and (5) Supplier Response to the RFP (Exhibit E).
15. Any use of the Foundation or CollegeBuys name or logo by the Supplier in marketing materials including but not limited to: press releases, print pieces, broadcast emails, and website postings, requires prior review and written approval from the Foundation.
16. If any action at law or in equity is brought to enforce or interpret the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs in addition to any other relief to which the prevailing party may be entitled.
17. This Agreement and the Foundation's rights and obligations hereunder may be assigned, at the Foundation's sole discretion, to an existing or newly established legal entity that has the authority and capacity to perform the Foundation's obligations hereunder. This Contract shall not be assignable by the Contractor in whole or in part without the written consent of the Foundation. For the purpose of this paragraph, Foundation will not unreasonably prohibit Contractor from freely assigning its right to payment, provided that Contractor remains responsible for its obligations hereunder.

All reports, notices, and other written or electronic communications given hereunder shall be delivered by email or by express delivery requiring signature on receipt to the addresses as set forth below. The Foundation may, by written or electronic notice delivered to the Supplier,

designate any different electronic or physical addresses to which subsequent reports, notices or other communications shall be sent.

18. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to be, or shall in fact be, illegal, inoperative, or unenforceable, the same shall not affect any other provision or provisions herein contained or render the same invalid, inoperative, or unenforceable to any extent whatever.
19. This Agreement may not be effectively amended, changed, modified, altered, or terminated without the prior written consent of the parties hereto.
20. **General Indemnity.** Each party to this Agreement ("Indemnitor") agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other, and its directors, officers, employees, successors and assigns (collectively, "Indemnitees") against any and all losses, liabilities, claims, actions, suits, proceedings, penalties, fines, damages, costs or expenses, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees (including fees and disbursements of in-house and outside counsel), property damage, loss of use, maintenance, cure, or wages, and personal injury or illness and/or death, resulting from, arising out of, or connected with: (a) breach by Indemnitor of this Agreement; and (b) the performance of services or any error, act or omissions related to the same by Indemnitor or its employees, subcontractors, or any person or entity for whom the Indemnitor is responsible under this Agreement. The Indemnitor assumes no liability for the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnitees. It is the intention of the Parties that where the fault of Foundation and Supplier is determined to have been contributory to a matter subject to this Section 21, principles of comparative fault shall be followed and each party shall bear the proportionate cost of any share of such proportional comparative fault and pay such proportionate cost of any defense and indemnity attributable to the fault of that party, its directors, officers, employees, subcontractors, or any person or entity for whom the Indemnitor is responsible under this Agreement.





BACKGROUND

It is very common in California Community Colleges to enter into exclusive beverage agreements. These agreements represent partnerships between the institutions and the bottling companies, which grant exclusive rights for installing and maintaining soft drink vending, fountain, bottle and can refrigerators for use in the retail outlets located on the district premises. These agreements also generate funds from the bottling companies in the form of exclusive rights sponsorship dollars, commissions, rebates and additional funds for scholarships and district programs, such as sustainability.

The current agreement is with PepsiCo and has expired on August 31, 2014. In order to enter into another agreement, competitive bidding was required.

ANALYSIS

The project was advertised and RFP packets emailed to three companies. Proposals were received from Pepsi Beverages Company (PepsiCo) and Coca-Cola Refreshments. A committee was formed to evaluate and make recommendations. The committee consisted of representatives from the District Office, both colleges and student constituents.

After a thorough evaluation, the committee determined that the PepsiCo agreement best met the overall needs of the District. Highlights of the agreement include sponsorship funding, commission and rebates, scholarship funding, sustainability funds, marketing, product donation and an athletic sideline program. PepsiCo agrees to pay the District an initial sponsorship fee of seventy-thousand dollars (\$70,000) and an annual sponsorship fee payable annually commencing on the first anniversary date of the signing of the agreement and each anniversary date thereafter until the end of the term of the Agreement in the amount of sixty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$62,500) per year not to exceed four (4) consecutive payments (“Annual Sponsorship Fee”).

The term of this agreement is for a five year (5) period beginning October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2019. Below are the three (3) responses for a five year agreement.

SPONSORSHIP AGREEMENT

This sets forth the agreement (“*Agreement*”) made as of October 1, 2014 (the “*Effective Date*”) between Bottling Group, LLC and its affiliates and/or respective subsidiaries collectively comprising Pepsi Beverages Company, with an office located at 27717 Aliso Creek Rd, Aliso Viejo, CA 92656 (“*Pepsi*”) and Rancho Santiago Community College District with its principal place of business at 2323 N. Broadway, Santa Ana, CA 92706 (the “*District*”).

WHEREAS, Pepsi desires the right to be the exclusive supplier of Beverages (as defined below) to the District; and

WHEREAS, Pepsi has submitted a bid in response to an invitation to bid issued by the District for the exclusive right to develop and carry out a program for the sale of its beverage products in all facilities owned or operated by the District; and

WHEREAS, Pepsi is experienced in installing, operating, servicing and maintaining equipment for dispensing beverage products and the District has determined that it is in the best interests of the District to contract with Pepsi to provide services for the sale of beverage products; and

WHEREAS, Pepsi wishes to identify itself with the District and to have its products promoted and sold at the Facilities (as defined below) and further wishes to receive the other promotional benefits provided for by the District in this Agreement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, covenants and conditions herein contained, and the other mutual promises set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. DEFINITIONS.

“*Approved Cups*” means the disposable cups approved by Pepsi from time to time as its standard trademark cups and other containers approved by Pepsi from time to time and bearing the trademark(s) of Pepsi and/or other Products. In addition, Pepsi agrees that the District shall have the right to produce limited-run commemorative plastic cups reasonably acceptable to Pepsi for use at the Facilities and that such cups shall also be considered to be Approved Cups, provided that Pepsi’s trademark(s) for Pepsi® shall be included on such commemorative cups. The use and size of Pepsi’s trademark(s) on such commemorative cups shall be subject to the prior approval of Pepsi.

“*Beverage*” or “*Beverages*” means all carbonated and non-carbonated, non-alcoholic drinks, however dispensed, including but not limited to, (i) colas and other flavored carbonated drinks; (ii) fruit juice, fruit juice containing and fruit flavored drinks; (iii) chilled coffee drinks; (iv) chilled tea products; (v) hypertonic, isotonic and hypotonic drinks (sports drinks and fluid replacements); (vi) energy drinks, (vii) packaged carbonated or still water (including spring, mineral or purified), (viii) liquid concentrate teas (“*LCT*”), (ix) frozen carbonated and non-carbonated beverages (“*FB*”), and (x) any future categories of nonalcoholic beverage products that may be distributed by Pepsi.

“**Cases**” shall mean the number of cases of Packaged Products purchased by the District from Pepsi, initially delivered in quantities of 24, 15, and 12 bottle/can units, and thereafter in such other size, quantity and type of containers as determined by Pepsi, from time to time.

“**Competitive Products**” shall mean any and all Beverages other than the Products.

“**Designations**” shall include, but not be limited to, the following: “A Proud Sponsor of the [District],” “Official Water and Soft Drink of the [District]” and “Official Sponsor of the [District].”

“**District Marks**” shall mean (i) the Designations (as defined below) and (ii) the District’s characters, colors, emblems, designs, identifications, logos, mascots, name, service marks, symbols, trademarks, all trade names, uniforms and other proprietary designations which are owned, licensed to or controlled by the District and which relate to the Facilities and which are in existence on at the beginning of the Term or which will be created during the Term. For clarity purposes, District Marks shall include, without limitation, characters, colors, emblems, designs, identifications, logos, mascots, name, service marks, symbols, trademarks, all trade names, uniforms and other proprietary designations associated with or related to all intercollegiate athletic teams associated with the District, at the beginning of the Term or which will be created during the Term, if any.

“**Equipment**” means the following types of equipment owned and operated by Pepsi and used to sell or dispense the Products: (i) full service vending machines (“**Vending Machines**”); (ii) retail single-serve food service equipment and (iii) fountain service equipment.

“**Facilities**” shall mean the entire premises of every facility owned, leased, occupied or operated by the District or its Food Service Provider, now or in the future, including all buildings, the grounds, parking lots, dining facilities, snack bars, food carts, book stores, athletic facilities and concession stands, and, for each building, the grounds, parking, lots, dining facilities, unbranded and branded food service outlets and vending areas. “**Facilities**” shall also be deemed to include: other convenience store operations and restaurants initiated during the Term of this Agreement in space leased to third-party commercial tenants within District-owned buildings principally utilized for educational purposes, student activities or student residences.

“**Food Service Provider**” shall mean Campus Services or any food service provider which may serve at the Facilities at any point during the Term. The District acknowledges and agrees that this Agreement, including the pricing, funding and other consideration provided for herein is based on the District’s current operating model/use of third party Food Service Providers. Thus, in the event that: (i) if the District is currently self-operated, the District switches to a Food Service Provider, or (ii) if the District currently uses a Food Service Provider to operate its concessions, such agreement between the District and the current Food Service Provider expires or is terminated, and the District enters into a new arrangement with a Food Service Provider; then any such new or subsequent agreement between the District and any Food Service Provider (pursuant to either (i) or (ii) above) shall require such Food Service provider to abide by the applicable pricing and other terms set forth in this Agreement to the exclusion of all other benefits, and shall specifically require such Food Service Provider to affirm that it will not be entitled or seek to receive any funding or other benefits/consideration in connection with any agreement such Food Service Provider may separately have with Pepsi or Pepsi’s affiliates. In the event that the District fails to adhere to this requirement (or the Food Service Provider refuses to abide

accordingly), then District hereby authorizes Pepsi, and Pepsi shall be entitled to adjust its pricing, funding or other consideration provided to the District by an amount equal to the incremental costs incurred by Pepsi as a result of the District's change in Food Service Providers.

“*Gallons*” shall mean the number of gallons of the Postmix Products purchased by the District from Pepsi.

“*Packaged Products*” shall mean Beverages that are distributed in pre-packaged form (*i.e.*, Bottles & Cans). A current list of Pepsi's Packaged Products is found in attached Exhibit A which may be amended by Pepsi from time to time.

“*Postmix Products*” shall mean beverage products used to create and dispense fountain beverages. A current list of Pepsi's Postmix Products is found in attached Exhibit A which may be amended by Pepsi from time to time.

“*Products*” shall mean Postmix Products and Packaged Products manufactured, bottled, sold and/or distributed by Pepsi.

“*Year*” shall mean each 12-month period during the Term commencing on the first day of the Term or an anniversary thereof.

2. TERM.

The Term of this Agreement shall be for a five (5) year period beginning on October 1, 2014 and expiring on September 30, 2019, unless sooner terminated as provided herein (“*Term*”).

3. GRANT OF BEVERAGE AVAILABILITY AND MERCHANDISING RIGHTS.

During the Term, District hereby grants to Pepsi the following exclusive Beverage availability and exclusive Beverage merchandising right as set forth and described below:

A. Beverage Availability at the Facilities.

(1) Grant of Rights.

(a) Pepsi shall have the exclusive right to make Beverages available for sale and distribution throughout the Facilities, including the right to provide all Beverages sold at athletic contests (*i.e.*, concession stands, sales in stands (hawking) or other means), booster club activities, and all other special events conducted at or any location on the Facilities (“*Special Events*”). The Products shall be the only Beverages sold, dispensed or served at the Facilities (*i.e.*, at concession stands, sales in stands (hawking) or other means), and the Products shall be sold at all food service concession or vending locations located within the Facilities; and

(b) Pepsi shall have the exclusive right to install the Equipment throughout the Facilities. Pepsi shall have the further right to install additional Equipment in buildings and facilities acquired and/or constructed by the District after the date of this

Agreement. Pepsi shall install the Equipment at its sole expense; *provided, however*, that the District will be responsible for all electrical hook-ups and charges related thereto. Pepsi shall have the right to place full trademark panels on all sides of its Equipment. Pepsi, or one of its affiliates, shall retain title to all Equipment.

(2) Purchasing of Postmix Products.

The Postmix Products shall be purchased by District or the Food Service Provider from Pepsi at the prices established by Pepsi in Exhibit A. Current pricing for Postmix Products will be fixed for Year One of the contract. Any price changes after that time will not exceed 3% per Year. The District requires a 30-day advanced written notice of any price change by Pepsi.

(3) Purchasing of Packaged Products.

The Packaged Products shall be purchased by District or the Food Service Provider from Pepsi at prices established by Pepsi Exhibit A. Current pricing for Packaged Products will be fixed for Year One of the contract. Any price changes after that time will not exceed 3% per Year. The District requires a 30-day advanced written notice of any price change by Pepsi.

(4) Food Service.

During the Term, Pepsi shall work directly with District and the Food Service Provider for the Facilities, to provide all of its requirements for the Products. District shall cause its Food Service Provider to purchase the Product from Pepsi at prices as determined by Pepsi. The District shall cause its Food Service Provider to purchase Products from Pepsi in sufficient quantities to ensure the regular and continuous distribution of the Products at the Facilities. Pepsi shall work directly with District and its Food Service Provider to promote sales of the Products through appropriate point-of-sale and other advertising materials bearing the trademarks of the Products at Pepsi's expense.

(5) Vending.

Pepsi shall have the right to place no less than twenty-seven (27) Vending Machines at the Facilities for dispensing the Products; *provided, however*, that Pepsi shall work with District to identify optimal locations for such equipment. Pepsi shall not be assessed common area maintenance fees, taxes or other charges based on its occupation of the space allocated to Vending Machines.

B. Product Merchandising Rights.

During the Term and subject to the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement, District grants Pepsi the exclusive right to merchandise Beverages at the Facilities as set forth and described below:

(1) Menu Board Advertising.

District agrees that Pepsi's trademarks for products shall be listed on the menu boards at concession locations in which Products are served to customers at the Facilities. All brand identification containing Pepsi trademarks and/or service marks for menu boards set forth herein will be prepared and installed by District at District's sole cost and expense.

(2) Approved Cups; Product Hawking and Catering.

District agrees that all Products served, sold or dispensed at concession locations in which Products are served to customers at the Facilities shall be served in Approved Cups and all other Beverages served, sold or dispensed within the Facilities shall be served in either Approved Cups or other disposable cups which do not bear, display or contain the trademarks or service marks of a manufacturer of Competitive Products. Pepsi agrees to make Approved Cups available for purchase and the District shall purchase, and shall require that all concessionaires, Food Service Providers, booster clubs and other third parties selling Beverages at the Facilities purchase all Products, cups, lids and carbon dioxide directly from Pepsi at prices determined by Pepsi. District shall cause Products to be "*hawked*" at the Facilities at all events taking place at the Facilities (including, without limitation, at all home games of all intercollegiate athletic teams associated with the District, if any), and served as part of the catering selection in private boxes, suite, backstage areas, lockerrooms and press areas. District further agrees that Products to be "*hawked*" in the stands shall be sold only in Approved Cups. As used herein, "*hawking*" shall refer to the sale of single servings of a product in the seating areas of the Facilities through the use of vendors circulating through such seating areas.

4. GRANT OF ADVERTISING AND PROMOTIONAL RIGHTS.

During the Term, District hereby grants to Pepsi the right to advertise and promote Products in and with respect to the District and the District Marks upon the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement and as set forth and described below.

A. Advertising

(1) Facilities and Print Advertising.

Pepsi shall have the right to Facilities and print advertising as mutually agreed between the parties.

(2) Design and Installation of District Advertising.

Pepsi agrees, at its own cost, to provide District with the general design of all District Advertising. The District Advertising shall be constructed and installed by District (or an agent thereof) at District's sole cost and expense. All District Advertising shall be in conformity with the general scheme and plan of the District and the surrounding areas.

(3) Advertising/Signage Changes/Removal.

District recognizes Pepsi's right to change, modify, alter or remove its advertising for, or identification of, any of the Products or to discontinue the manufacture of any of the Products. Pepsi shall reimburse District for all reasonable costs and expenses incurred by District in changing, modifying, altering or removing any Facilities Advertising, menu boards and other Pepsi identification or references to any of the Products necessitated by Pepsi's changes to or removal of the advertising, trademarks or trade names, designations or identification thereof. Pepsi shall have the right to modify, change, alter or remove the promotional messages appearing thereon and all such modifications, changes, alterations and/or removals shall be at Pepsi's sole cost and expense. District shall use reasonable efforts to minimize the cost to Pepsi for changing, modifying, altering and/or removing Pepsi's advertising.

(4) Maintenance of Signage.

District shall maintain all Facility Advertising and other signs and advertising for Products in good order. District shall effect any necessary repairs reasonably determined by District at District's sole cost and expense. Where practical, District shall consult with Pepsi prior to incurring any material signage or other related maintenance expenses.

B. Promotional Rights.

(1) General Sponsorship Designation.

District hereby agrees that Pepsi shall have the right to promote the fact that Pepsi is an official sponsor of the District and its intercollegiate athletic teams, if any, and that the Products are available at the Facilities, including the right of Pepsi to refer to itself using the Designations. Such promotion may be conducted through the distribution channels of television, radio and print media, on the packaging of (including cups and vessels) and at the point-of-sale of any and all Products wherever they may be sold or served.

(2) Grant of License to Use the District Marks for Promotional Activities.

District hereby grants to Pepsi a nonexclusive license to use the name of the Facilities and the District Marks for the limited purposes of promoting Products within the context of promotional activities. District acknowledges that, in order to make full use of the rights granted in this Agreement, Pepsi may conduct the promotional activities through its primary distribution channels in which Pepsi sells Products to the ultimate consumer, such as at the retail level, within drug stores and other retail outlets, by and through mass merchandise campaigns and together with Pepsi's food service accounts and customers.

C. Representations, Warranties and Covenants regarding the Ownership and Protection of the District Marks and Related Proprietary Rights.

District represents and warrants that it is the sole and exclusive owner of all right, title and interests in and to the District Marks (including without limitation, all goodwill associated

therewith) and Pepsi's use of the District Marks pursuant to this Agreement will not infringe the rights of any third parties. Pepsi acknowledges that nothing contained in this Agreement shall provide Pepsi with any right, title or interest to the District Marks other than the right to use such District Marks granted under this Agreement. Pepsi (on behalf of itself and its affiliates) agrees that it shall not attack the title or any rights of District and its affiliates and cooperate with District and its affiliates to procure any protection or to protect any of the rights of District and its affiliates in and to the District Marks. Pepsi shall cause to appear on all materials incorporating the District Marks such legends, markings and notices as District or its affiliates may request in order to give appropriate notice of any trademarks, service mark, trade name, copyright or other right with respect to the District Marks. Pepsi shall not make any alterations or changes to the design or type of the District Marks without the prior written consent of District.

D. Representations, Warranties and Covenants Regarding the Ownership and Protection of Proprietary Rights of Pepsi.

Pepsi represents and warrants that Pepsi is authorized to use certain names, logos, service marks and trademarks of PepsiCo, Inc. (including without limitation, all goodwill associated therewith) (the "*Pepsi Marks*") under a license from PepsiCo, Inc. District acknowledges that nothing contained in this Agreement shall provide District with any right, title or interest to the names, logos, service marks and trademarks of PepsiCo, Inc. without the prior written approval of PepsiCo, Inc. District (on behalf of itself and its affiliates) agrees that it shall not attack the title or any rights of PepsiCo, Inc., Pepsi and its affiliates and cooperate with PepsiCo, Inc., Pepsi and its affiliates to procure any protection or to protect any of the rights of PepsiCo, Inc., Pepsi and its affiliates in and to the Pepsi Marks. District shall cause to appear on all materials incorporating the Pepsi Marks such legends, markings and notices as Pepsi or its affiliates may request in order to give appropriate notice of any trademarks, service mark, trade name, copyright or other right with respect to the Pepsi Marks. District shall not make any alterations or changes to the design or type of the Pepsi Marks without the prior written consent of PepsiCo, Inc.

5. GRANT OF OTHER RIGHTS.

A. Sampling.

District agrees to permit to conduct, at Pepsi's sole cost and expense, limited sampling of Pepsi products at the Facilities in a form and manner as specifically authorized and approved by District and in accordance with rules and procedures established by District, in its sole discretion, as may be amended or supplemented from time to time by District.

B. Right of First Negotiation/Refusal.

It is hereby agreed that District shall not enter into another agreement for the rights granted hereunder commencing within 365 days after the end of the expiration of the Term unless it shall have complied with the following procedures:

- (1) It is hereby agreed that District and Pepsi shall enter into negotiations to extend the terms of this Agreement no later than one hundred twenty (120) days prior to the end

of the Term. In the event the parties cannot agree to the terms under which this Agreement will be continued thirty (30) days prior to the end of the Term, District shall be free to enter into negotiations with third parties.

(2) In the event that District receives a bona fide offer for any of the rights granted under this Agreement, District shall notify Pepsi of such offer including the consideration payable to District and the length of term. Pepsi may, within sixty (60) days of such notice, notify District that it is willing to enter into an extension of this Agreement for the term set forth in such notice and providing for the fees and other consideration payable to described in such notice.

(3) If Pepsi fails to send the notice set forth in subparagraph (2) within the time period provided therein, District shall be free to enter into an agreement with any party thereafter, free and clear of any rights of Pepsi; *provided, however*, that such arrangement may not provide for a term, fees and other consideration payable to District which are less than those stipulated in District's notice given pursuant to subparagraph (2). Nothing herein shall preclude District from entering into any arrangement whatsoever (i) following a termination of this Agreement by reason of Pepsi's default; or (ii) for a period commencing more than 365 days after the expiration of the entire Term set forth herein.

6. EXCLUSIVITY.

A. During the Term, District, its agents, representatives, intercollegiate athletic teams coaches and players, and staff (i) shall not themselves nor shall they permit a third party to, sell, serve, promote, market, advertise, sponsor or endorse Competitive Products at the Facilities or in connection with the District, its intercollegiate athletic teams coaches and players, and its staff and (ii) shall ensure that the Products are the only Beverages sold, served, promoted, marketed, advertised, merchandised, sponsored or endorsed, at the Facilities or in connection with the District, intercollegiate athletic teams coaches and players, and its staff.

B. District recognizes that Pepsi has paid valuable consideration to ensure an exclusive associational relationship with the Facilities, District, and/or District Marks with respect to Beverages and that any dilution or diminution of such exclusivity seriously impairs Pepsi's valuable rights. Accordingly, the District will promptly oppose Ambush Marketing (as defined below) and take all reasonable steps to stop Ambush Marketing and to protect the exclusive associational rights granted to Pepsi pursuant to this Agreement. In the event any such Ambush Marketing occurs during the Term, each party will notify the other party of such activity immediately upon learning thereof. As used herein, "**Ambush Marketing**" shall mean an attempt by any third party, without Pepsi's consent, to associate Competitive Products with the Facilities, District and/or District Marks, or to suggest that Competitive Products are endorsed by or associated with the Facilities, District and/or District Marks by referring directly or indirectly to the Facilities, District and/or District Marks.

7. CONSIDERATION.

In consideration for the advertising, merchandising, promotional rights, and the other related rights and benefits provided to Pepsi by District as described herein, and provided District is not in breach of this Agreement, Pepsi agrees to pay to District:

A. Annual Sponsorship Fees.

An Annual Sponsorship Fee (the “*Annual Sponsorship Fee*”), payable annually pursuant to the following:

* The District acknowledges and agrees that each Annual Sponsorship Fee payable to the District is based on a minimum number of Units purchased from Pepsi and sold throughout the Facilities pursuant to this Agreement during the applicable Year. The minimum number of Units per Year is 12,080 (“*Annual Units Threshold*”). As used herein, “*Units*” means Gallons and Cases (including Cases sold through Vending Machines). For the purposes of determining Units sold, 1 Case shall equal 1 Gallon. Therefore, if during any Year the number of Units falls below the Annual Units Threshold, then the Annual Sponsorship Fee payable for the next Year will be reduced by a percentage equal to the percentage decrease between the Annual Units Threshold and the actual number of Units sold during such Year. *For example, if the Annual Sponsorship Fee is \$1,000 and the Annual Units Threshold is 500 Units, and during Year 1 the actual Units sold is 250 Units, and then the Annual Sponsorship Fee for Year 2 will be \$500 (reduced by 50%).*

The Annual Sponsorship Fee is earned throughout the Year in which they are paid. In the event Pepsi terminates this Agreement due to the District’s failure to cure a breach hereof, the unearned Annual Sponsorship Fees will be repaid to Pepsi pursuant to the terms of Section 10.D herein.

(1) Annual Scholarship Fund

An Annual Scholarship Fund (the “*Annual Scholarship Fund*”), payable annually pursuant to the following:

The Annual Scholarship Fund is earned throughout the Year in which they are paid. In the event Pepsi terminates this Agreement due to the District’s failure to cure a breach hereof, the unearned Annual Scholarship Fund will be repaid to Pepsi pursuant to the terms of Section 10.D herein.

(2) California Community College Foundation Scholarship Support Payment

Pepsi will provide the District with a one-time scholarship fund payment in the amount of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) as a qualified California Community College Foundation member.

(3) Sustainability Fund

A Sustainability Fund (the “*Annual Sustainability Fund*”), payable annually pursuant to the following:

The Annual Sustainability Fund is earned throughout the Year in which they are paid. In the event Pepsi terminates this Agreement due to the District’s failure to cure a breach hereof, the unearned Annual Sustainability Fund will be repaid to Pepsi pursuant to the terms of Section 10.D herein.

C. Commissions.

Commissions, as a percentage of the actual cash (“*cash in bag*” or “*CIB*”) collected by Pepsi from the Vending Machines placed at the Facilities, plus actual amounts received by Pepsi in connection with credit card or debit card sales (collectively with CIB, “*Revenue*”), less any applicable fees or deposits (“*Commissions*”). Such Commissions shall be at the rate(s) set forth below (the “*Commission Rate*”) and shall be calculated as follows:

*Commission Rate stated above shall only apply to Products sold by Pepsi through its Vending Machines at the beginning of the Term. If Pepsi proposes any new Products to the District during the Term, then Pepsi shall have the right to apply a different Commission Rate and/or Minimum Vend Price for such new Product.		

(1) **Commissions Payment.** Commissions shall be remitted by Pepsi to the District within thirty (30) days of the end of each 4-week accounting period established by Pepsi. Pepsi shall make all pertinent revenue and sales records respecting the Vending Machines available to District. District agrees that it is responsible for reviewing such records and that any claim or dispute relating to the Commissions must be brought by District in writing within one (1) year of the date such Commissions payment is due. District further acknowledges and agrees that it shall not receive any Commissions payment from Pepsi if Commissions fail to reach a certain threshold amount per period or quarter. The applicable threshold amounts vary based on the payment period and will be established and communicated pursuant to Pepsi's policies and procedures related to its Full Service Vending business, as may be revised by Pepsi from time to time.

(2) **Change to Commission Rate.** District acknowledges and agrees that Pepsi established the Commission Rate based on any applicable sales tax associated with the sale of the Products through the Vending Machines as of the commencement date of this Agreement. If, during the Term, applicable sales taxes should increase by more than five percent (5%), then Pepsi shall have the right to automatically reduce the Commission Rate by the same percentage amount.

(3) **Change to Commission Formula.** In addition to the above, District agrees that Pepsi shall have the right to change its formula/method for calculating Commissions at any time in its reasonable discretion provided that any such formula adjustments shall not result in a material change to the Commissions due with respect to the same sales of Products.

(4) **Vend Price.** The minimum vend price necessary for District to qualify for any Commissions is set forth above. Pepsi shall have the absolute right, at its sole discretion, to change such vend prices as it deems appropriate in light of cost of goods increases or to otherwise stay reasonably consistent with applicable vending prices for similar accounts operating in the relative geography.

A. **Rebates.**

Each year throughout the Term, Pepsi shall calculate the total applicable Cases of Packaged Products and applicable Gallons of Postmix Products purchased from Pepsi by the District and its Food Service Provider pursuant to this Agreement, and shall provide the District with rebates calculated based on applicable amounts set forth below (the "***Rebates***"). The Rebates, if applicable, shall be paid by Pepsi within sixty (60) days of the end of each applicable Year during the Term.

8. ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATION.

In addition to the consideration specified above, and provided District is not in breach of this Agreement, Pepsi shall provide the following further consideration to the District:

A. Pepsi will provide annual Product donations of up to a total of 200 cases per Year across the Facilities upon request of the District; *provided, however*, that the District will administer all requests through a central contact so that the District may prioritize the requests. District acknowledges and agrees that donated Product requests not used/made in any Year shall not be carried over to the subsequent Year.

B. Each Year during the Term, Pepsi will provide the District with Gatorade sideline merchandise valued at up to Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500) per Year upon request of District; *provided, however*, that the District will administer all requests through a central contact so that the District may prioritize the requests.

C. Each Year during the Term, Pepsi will provide the District with Pepsi-identified merchandise valued at up to Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) per Year upon request of District; *provided, however*, that the District will administer all requests through a central contact so that the District may prioritize the requests.

9. EQUIPMENT AND SERVICE.

A. Beverage Dispensing and Other Equipment.

(1) Pepsi shall, based upon Pepsi's survey of the Facilities' needs, provide and install all Equipment at the Facilities for the dispensing of Product during the Term. Title to all Equipment shall be with Pepsi or its affiliates.

(2) During the Term Pepsi will provide, at no charge to the District, preventative maintenance and service to the Equipment. Pepsi will service and stock, if necessary, (i) the Equipment and (ii) any additional Equipment determined by the parties to be installed at new locations on the Facilities.

(3) The Equipment may not be removed from the Facilities without Pepsi's written consent, and the District agrees not to encumber the Equipment in any manner or permit other equipment to be attached thereto except as authorized by Pepsi. At the end of the Term, Pepsi shall have the right to, and shall upon request of the District, remove all Equipment from the Facilities at no expense to the District.

(4) Pepsi shall be responsible for collecting, for its own account, all cash monies from the Vending Machines and for all related accounting for all cash monies collected therefrom. The District agrees to provide reasonable assistance to Pepsi in apprehending and prosecuting vandals. Pepsi shall not be obligated to pay commissions as provided in this Agreement on documented revenue losses resulting from vandalism or theft of product with respect to any Vending Machines on the Facilities.

(5) Pepsi, at its sole discretion or upon mutual agreement between the parties, may agree to install magnetic strip card, online or chip card offline readers on Vending Machines placed at the Facilities. If agreed to by Pepsi, Vending Machines in mutually agreed upon locations will be fitted with magnetic stripe card on-line or chip card off-line readers in accordance with a mutually agreed to conversion schedule. If Pepsi has agreed to such installation, then the District must comply with the following:

(i) Prior to Pepsi's commitment to provide such Vending Machines, District must provide Pepsi with its minimum requirements for such readers;

(ii) Pepsi will not be responsible for any transaction or maintenance fees on the debit card readers affixed to the Vending Machines;

(iii) The District shall arrange for the collection of monies from debit card transactions on Vending Machines equipped with debit card readers;

(iv) On or before the first Monday of each month during the Term, the District and/or its authorized debit card agent shall be responsible for providing a weekly report to Pepsi, in a form reasonably satisfactory to Pepsi, detailing the transactions and the dollar amounts grossed during the immediately preceding weekly period through each Vending Machine equipped with a debit card reader;

(v) On or before the first Monday of each month during the Term, the District and/or its authorized debit card agent shall remit payment to Pepsi for the monies collected through debit card readers during the immediately preceding monthly period;

(vi) The District agrees to indemnify and hold Pepsi harmless from and against losses or costs incurred by Pepsi as a result of any dispute between the District and the debit card agent over monies owed to Pepsi for the sale of Pepsi product through the Vending Machines equipped with debit card readers or the failure of the debit card agent to remit payment in a timely manner if the dispute remains unresolved for a period of sixty (60) days.

(6) Pepsi reserves the absolute right to remove any glass front Vending Equipment that sells less than eight (8) cases of Product per week or any other Vending Equipment that sells less than two (2) cases of Product per week.

B. Service to Equipment.

Other than routine maintenance, which shall be the responsibility of and completed by District or its designee, Pepsi or its designated agents shall be responsible for maintaining, repairing and replacing the Equipment. Pepsi shall provide District with a telephone number to request emergency repairs and receive technical assistance related to the Equipment. Pepsi shall respond to each District request and use reasonable efforts to remedy the related Equipment problem as soon as possible.

10. REMEDIES FOR LOSS OF RIGHTS - TERMINATION.

A. District's Termination Rights.

Without prejudice to any other remedy available to District at law or in equity in respect of any event described below, this Agreement may be terminated by District at any time effective thirty (30) days following written notice to Pepsi from District if:

- (1) Pepsi fails to make any payment due hereunder, and such default shall continue for thirty (30) days after written notice of such default is received by Pepsi; or
- (2) Pepsi breaches or fails to perform any other material term, covenant or condition of this Agreement or any representation or warranty shall prove to have been false or misleading in any material respect and Pepsi fails to cure such breach within forty-five (45) days after written notice of default is delivered to Pepsi. If such cure cannot reasonably be accomplished within such forty-five (45) day period, this provision shall not apply where Pepsi shall have, in good faith, commenced such cure and thereafter shall diligently proceed to completion; *provided, however*, that such cure is completed to the reasonable satisfaction of District within ninety (90) days from the date of Pepsi's receipt of such written notice of default.

B. Pepsi's Termination Rights.

Without prejudice to any other remedy available to Pepsi at law or in equity in respect of any event described below, this Agreement may be terminated in whole or in part by Pepsi at any time, effective thirty (30) days following written notice to the District if (i) any of the Products are not made available as required in this Agreement by the District, their agents or concessionaires; (ii) any of the rights granted to Pepsi herein are materially restricted or limited during the Term of this Agreement; (iii) a final judicial opinion or governmental regulation prohibits, or materially impacts or impairs (*e.g.*, beverage tax or size restriction) the availability or cost of Beverages, whether or not due to a cause beyond the reasonable control of the District; or (iv) District breaches any or fails to perform any other material term, covenant or condition of this Agreement or any representation or warranty shall prove to have been false or misleading in any material respect. In connection with the foregoing, Pepsi shall give District notice of the event and where applicable (for events within District's control), shall provide District forty-five (45) days to cure such breach. If the identified breach/event is not remedied with the applicable notice period, then Pepsi may terminate this Agreement and recover from the District a reimbursement in accordance with Section D below. In addition to the termination rights set forth herein, in the event of any of the occurrences outlined in subsections (i) – (iii) above, Pepsi shall have the right, at its discretion and in lieu of termination, to mandate that the District meet and engage in good faith negotiations aimed at modifying the Agreement to reduce Pepsi's ongoing support of the District by an amount that is equitable in light of the diminution of right to Pepsi (*e.g.*, equivalent to the percentage volume decline on campus). If such negotiations fail, then Pepsi shall have the right to terminate the Agreement upon thirty (30) days' notice.

C. Additional Termination Rights Available to Pepsi and District.

Without prejudice to any other right or remedy available to either party at law or in equity of any event described below, this Agreement may be terminated by either party if the other party, or any parent of such other party, shall: (i) have an order for relief entered with respect to it, commence a voluntary case or have an involuntary case filed against it under any applicable bankruptcy, insolvency or other similar law now or hereafter in effect (and such order or case is not stayed, withdrawn or settled within sixty (60) days thereafter) it is the intent of the parties hereto that the provisions of Section 365(e)(2)(A) of Title 11 of the United States Code, as amended, or any successor statute thereto, be applicable to this Agreement; or (ii) file for reorganization, become insolvent or have a receiver or other officer having similar powers over it appointed for its affair in any court of competent jurisdiction, whether or not with its consent (unless dismissed, bonded or discharged within 60 days thereafter); or (iii) admit in writing its inability to pay its debts as such debts become due.

D. Sponsorship Fees in the Event of Termination.

If Pepsi terminates this Agreement pursuant to Section 10 or District terminates this Agreement without cause, then Pepsi shall be entitled to from District, without prejudice to any other right or remedy available to Pepsi, and District shall pay to Pepsi all funding paid by Pepsi to the District which remains unearned as of the time of termination. With regard to the Annual Sponsorship Fee, the amount of such reimbursement shall be determined by multiplying Annual Sponsorship Fee by a fraction, the numerator of which is the number of months remaining in the Year in which the Agreement is terminated at the time such termination occurs and the denominator of which is twelve (12).

11. TAXES.

District acknowledges and agrees that neither Pepsi nor its affiliates shall be responsible for any taxes payable, fees or other tax liability incurred by the District in connection with any fees payable by Pepsi under this Agreement. In addition, Pepsi shall be responsible only for the payment of taxes on the sales of Products through Vending Machines. Pepsi shall not be assessed common area maintenance fees, taxes or other charges based on its occupation of the space allocated to its Equipment.

12. CONFIDENTIALITY.

A. Except as otherwise required by law or the rules or regulations of any national securities exchange or the rules or regulation of the District, the District and Pepsi agree not to disclose Confidential Information (as hereinafter defined) to any third party other than to their respective directors, officers, employees and agents (and directors, officers, employees and agents of their respective affiliates) and advisors (including legal, financial and accounting advisors) (collectively, “*Representatives*”), as needed.

B. “*Confidential Information*” shall include all non-public, confidential or proprietary information that District or its Representatives make available to Pepsi or its Representatives or that Pepsi or its Representatives make available to or its Representatives in connection with this Agreement. “*Confidential Information*” shall include, but not be limited to,

the terms and conditions of this Agreement. It is expressly understood that the disclosure in or pursuant to this Agreement by District, Pepsi or their respective Representatives of Confidential Information is not a public disclosure thereof, nor is a sale or offer for sale of any product, equipment, process or service of District or Pepsi.

C. These Confidentiality provisions and the obligations of the parties hereunder will survive the expiration or sooner termination of this Agreement for a period of three (3) years following such date of expiration or termination of this Agreement.

13. REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES AND COVENANTS.

A. Each party represents and warrants to the other: (1) it has full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to grant and convey to the other the rights set forth herein; and (2) all necessary approvals for the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement have been obtained and this Agreement has been duly executed and delivered by the parties and constitutes the legal, valid and binding obligation, enforceable in accordance with its terms, and nothing contained in this Agreement violates, interferes with or infringes upon the rights of any third party; (3) the respective signatory of this Agreement is duly authorized and empowered to bind the party to the terms and conditions of this Agreement for the duration of the Term; and (4) the parties have complied with all applicable laws, ordinances, codes, rules and regulations relating to its entering into this Agreement and its performance hereunder.

B. Each of the parties hereto agree that: (1) the representations, warranties and covenants contained herein shall survive the execution and delivery of this Agreement, and (2) except as expressly set forth herein, neither party has made, and neither party is relying on, any representation or warranty, express or implied, with respect to the subject matter hereof.

C. To the extent that the any intercollegiate athletic team is relocated to a venue which is not within the Facilities as its home venue, District agrees that it shall ensure all rights of Pepsi hereunder shall be extended to such alternate venue as to the intercollegiate athletic team and any advertising and pouring rights contained herein.

14. INDEMNIFICATION.

A. Pepsi will indemnify and hold the District, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers harmless from any and all suits, actions, claims, demands, losses, costs, damages, liabilities, fines, expenses and penalties (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of: (i) its breach of any term or condition of this Agreement; (ii) product liability suits resulting from the use or consumption of Products purchased directly from Pepsi; and/or (iii) the negligence or willful misconduct of Pepsi, (excluding claims arising out of the District's negligence or willful misconduct).

B. To the extent permitted by applicable law, the District will indemnify and hold Pepsi, its subsidiaries, affiliates or assigns harmless from and against any and all suits, actions, claims, demands, losses, costs, damages, liabilities, fines, expenses and penalties (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of (i) its breach of any term or condition of this

Agreement; and/or (ii) the negligence or willful misconduct of the District (excluding claims arising out of Pepsi's negligence or willful misconduct).

C. The provisions of this Section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

15. INSURANCE.

A. Pepsi agrees to include the District as an additional insured on Pepsi's Commercial General Liability and Comprehensive General Liability and Comprehensive Automobile Liability policies. Such policies must carry a 30-day cancellation clause. Pepsi will provide District with a Certificate of Insurance evidencing coverage and District's inclusion as an additional insured.

Prior to commencing work, and continuing during the life of the contract, Pepsi shall take out, and require all subcontractors, if any, to take out and maintain:

I. Commercial General Liability

Each vendor and contractor shall supply a Certificate of Insurance showing evidence of Commercial General Liability coverage with a limit of at least \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence. The insurance shall be primary and non-contributory.

II. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability

Each vendor and contractor shall supply a Certificate of Insurance showing Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability. The Employers Liability limits shall be at least \$1,000,000 each item. The vendor/contractor shall provide a waiver of subrogation.

III. Automotive Liability

Each vendor and contractor shall supply a Certificate of Insurance showing Commercial Automobile liability coverage in an amount no less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit for all owned, non-owned and hired vehicles.

IV. Umbrella or Excess Liability

If the vendor's and contractor's primary or underlying limits of coverage do not meet the requirements outlined above, additional limits of coverage may be provided by an umbrella policy or an excess liability policy. Endorsements to the umbrella or excess policy which limit or exclude coverage must be attached to the certificate of insurance.

V. Additional Requirements

The insurers for all coverage lines shall have a minimum A.M. Best's rating of A and be admitted in California. This can be amended by separate agreement by the District.

B. Either party shall have the right, during the Term from time to time, to request copies of such certificates of insurance and/or other evidence of the adequacy of the above insurance coverages.

16. NOTICES.

Unless otherwise specified herein, all notices, requests, demands, consents, and other communications hereunder shall be transmitted in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given when hand delivered, upon delivery when sent by express mail, courier, overnight mail or other recognized overnight or next day delivery service, or three (3) days following the date mailed when sent by registered or certified United States mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, or when deposited with a public telegraph company for immediate transmittal, charges prepaid, or by telecopier, with a confirmation copy sent by recognized overnight courier, next day delivery, addressed as follows:

17. ASSIGNMENT.

This Agreement or any part hereof or interest herein shall not be assigned or otherwise transferred by either party without the prior written consent of the other party nor shall the same be assignable by operation of law, without the prior written consent of the other party; *provided, however*, that Pepsi may assign and transfer this Agreement (in whole and not in part) to an affiliate without the consent of District hereto; *provided, however*, that, (x) such affiliate is capable of fully performing all obligations of the assignor hereunder and (y) such affiliate agrees, under a separate agreement acceptable to the other party and signed by such affiliate, to perform all of the obligations and assume all liabilities of the assignor hereunder. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective permitted successors and assigns. District represents and warrants to Pepsi that any change in the Food Service Provider at the Facilities shall not affect Pepsi's rights or obligations hereunder.

18. GOVERNING LAW.

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California without regard to conflicts of laws principles. Any legal proceeding of any nature whatsoever brought by either party against the other to enforce any right or obligation under this Agreement, or arising out of any matter pertaining to this Agreement, shall be submitted for trial, without jury, before the Courts of the State of California, or the United States District Court having jurisdiction in Orange County, California, or, if neither of such courts shall have jurisdiction, then before any court sitting in Orange County, California having subject matter jurisdiction. The parties consent and submit to the jurisdiction of any such court and agree to accept service of process inside or outside the State of California in any manner to be submitted to any such court pursuant hereto, and the parties hereto expressly waive all rights to trial by jury regarding any such matter.

19. FORCE MAJEURE.

If the performance by either party hereto of its respective nonmonetary obligations under this Agreement is delayed or prevented in whole or in part by acts of God, fire, floods, storms, explosions, accidents, epidemics, war, civil disorder, strikes or other labor difficulties, or any law, rule, regulation, order or other action adopted or taken by any federal, state or local government authority, or any other cause not reasonably within such party's control, whether or not specifically mentioned herein, such party shall be excused, discharged and released of performance only to the extent such performance or obligation is so delayed or prevented by such occurrence without liability of any kind. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as requiring either party hereto to accede to any demands of, or to settle any disputes with, labor or labor unions, suppliers or other parties that such party considers unreasonable.

20. RELEASE, DISCHARGE OR WAIVER.

No release, discharge or waiver of any provision hereof shall be enforceable against or binding upon either party hereto unless in writing and executed by both parties hereto. Neither the failure to insist upon strict performance of any of the agreements, terms, covenants or conditions hereof, nor the acceptance of monies due hereunder with knowledge of a breach of this Agreement, shall be deemed a waiver of any rights or remedies that either party hereto may have or a waiver of any subsequent breach or default in any of such agreements, terms, covenants or conditions.

21. PRIOR NEGOTIATIONS; ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

This Agreement and the exhibits attached hereto, set forth the entire understanding between the parties in connection with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no statement or inducement with respect to the subject matter by either party hereto or by any agent or representative of either party hereto which is not contained in this Agreement shall be valid or binding among the parties. This provision shall not be read to invalidate or amend any other written agreements between Pepsi and/or any of its affiliates and any affiliate of District.

22. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES.

The parties are independent contractors with respect to each other. Nothing contained in this Agreement will be deemed or construed as creating a joint venture partnership between the parties.

23. EFFECT OF HEADINGS.

The headings and subheadings of the sections of this Agreement are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall not control or affect the meaning or construction of any of the agreements, terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement in any manner.

24. CONSTRUCTION.

This Agreement has been fully reviewed and negotiated by the parties hereto and their respective legal counsel. Accordingly, in interpreting this Agreement, no weight shall be placed upon which party hereto or its counsel drafted the provision being interpreted. Wherever this Agreement provides for one party hereto to provide authorization, agreement, approval or consent to another party hereto, or provides for mutual agreement of the parties hereto, such authorization, approval, agreement or consent shall, except as may otherwise be specified herein, be given in such party's reasonable judgment and reasonable discretion, and shall be in writing unless otherwise mutually agreed by the parties.

25. SEVERABILITY.

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be void or contrary to law, such term or provision shall, but only to the extent necessary to bring this Agreement within the requirements of law, be deemed to be severable from the other terms and provisions hereof, and the remainder of this Agreement shall be given effect as if the parties had not included the severed term herein.

26. AMENDMENTS.

No provision of this Agreement may be modified, waived or amended except by a written instrument duly executed by each of the parties hereto. Any such modifications, waivers or amendments shall not require additional consideration to be effective.

27. COUNTERPARTS.

This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

28. FURTHER ASSURANCES.

Each party hereto shall execute any and all further documents or instruments and take all necessary action that either party hereto may deem reasonably necessary to carry out the proper purposes of this Agreement.

29. DEBARMENT.

Pepsi (or any subcontractors) is not currently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any State or Federal department or agency. Pepsi agrees to notify the District of any change in this status during the term of this agreement.

**RANCHO SANTIAGO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT
EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATOR EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT**

1. **Parties.** The Rancho Santiago Community College District (“District”), on the one hand, and **Cheryl Carrera** (“Administrator”), on the other hand, hereby enter into this Educational Administrator Employment Agreement (“Agreement”) pursuant to sub-section “a” of Section 72411 of the *Education Code*. District and Administrator are referred to herein individually as “Party” and collectively as “Parties.”

2. **Position.** District hereby employs Administrator in the position of **Dean, Science, Math and Health Sciences Division for Santa Ana College** (“Position”). Administrator is an “academic employee” as defined in sub-section “a” of Section 87001 of the *Education Code*, is an “educational administrator” as defined in sub-section “b” of Section 87002 of the *Education Code*, and is a “management employee” as defined in sub-section “g” of Section 3540.1 of the *Government Code*.

3. **Term.** District agrees to employ Administrator, and Administrator agrees to serve in the Position, for the period commencing **August 1, 2014** and ending **June 30, 2016**. If, prior to June 30 of any other year other than the last year of this Agreement the District does not send or deliver a written notice to Administrator that this Agreement shall not be extended for an additional year, then this Agreement automatically shall be extended for one more year. Any notice of non-reemployment in the position must be given by the District at least six (6) months in advance of the date of termination of this Agreement. If notice of non-reemployment is not given by the District at least six (6) months in advance of the date of termination of this Agreement, then the Agreement shall be extended for one (1) additional year pursuant to Education Code Section 72411(c).

4. **General Terms and Conditions of Employment.** This Agreement is subject to all applicable laws of the State of California, the regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the rules, regulations, policies, and procedures of the District. These laws, rules, regulations, policies, and procedures, which may be amended, augmented, or repealed from time-to-time, are incorporated into this Agreement.

5. **Duties and Responsibilities.** Administrator agrees to perform all of the duties, and accepts all of the responsibilities, as specified in the job description for the Position, and all duties and responsibilities which may be delegated or assigned to Administrator by the Board of Trustees, the Chancellor, or any supervising administrators. Administrator is expected to devote full efforts and energies to the Position. At any time during the term of this Agreement, the Board of Trustees may adopt or amend the job description for the Position. Administrator may undertake outside professional activities, including consulting, speaking, and writing, either with or without compensation, provided that such activities do not impair the effectiveness of Administrator or interfere with Administrator’s duties. In those cases in which Administrator engages in outside professional activities which generate compensation for services provided, Administrator shall utilize vacation days.

6. **Transfer, Reassignment, or Title Change.** The Chancellor, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, may transfer or reassign Administrator to any position within the District for which Administrator is qualified, and may change the title of the Position, during the term of this Agreement, but there shall be no loss of compensation by Administrator due to such discretionary transfer, reassignment, or title change.

7. **Salary.** District shall pay an annual salary to Administrator in the amount of **\$132,509.94** per academic year (July 1 through June 30), pro-rated if less than a full academic year, paid on a monthly basis. District reserves the right to increase the salary of Administrator during the term of this Agreement, but any such increase shall not be construed as an indication that this Agreement will be renewed or extended. Administrator agrees that District also reserves the right to decrease the salary of Administrator during the term of this Agreement as long as such decrease, on a percentage basis, is no more than what is implemented on a general basis for regular, full-time faculty of the District. Administrator is an exempt employee and is not eligible for overtime pay or compensatory time off.

8. **Work Year.** Administrator is a full-time employee of the District with a work year of 12 months per year. Administrator is entitled to be absent during District-designated holidays.

9. **Health and Welfare Benefits.** District shall provide Administrator with the same health and welfare benefits as currently approved or as subsequently modified by the Board of Trustees for all District administrators.

10. **Vacation.** Administrator shall accrue two and one-quarter vacation days for each month of service. Administrator may not accumulate more than 54 days of unused vacation as of July 1 of any academic year.

11. **Leaves.** Administrator shall be entitled to leaves of absence as provided by law or Board Policy, as may be amended from time-to-time.

12. **Teaching Assignments.** Subject to Board approval, and presuming that Administrator meets minimum qualifications, Administrator may serve as an instructor in no more than one class per semester for additional compensation, provided that such teaching does not impair Administrator's service in the Position.

13. **Professional Meetings and Activities.** Prior approval by the Chancellor shall be obtained for Administrator to attend any meeting or activity related to Administrator's employment in the Position. The reasonable and necessary expenses of attendance by Administrator at such a meeting or activity shall be paid by District only if approved by the Chancellor and the Board of Trustees.

14. **Evaluation.** Administrator shall be evaluated in writing at any time by Administrator's immediate supervisor, pursuant to Board Policy and procedures, utilizing established goals and objectives, self-assessments, the job description for the Position, and input from other employees.

15. **Retreat Rights.** If Administrator's first date of paid service was prior to July 1, 1990, Administrator's rights to faculty tenure are governed by the laws of the State of California

in effect as of June 30, 1990. The retreat rights for Administrator, if hired on or after July 1, 1990, and if Administrator does not have faculty tenure in the District, shall be in accordance with Section 87458 of the *Education Code*. Administrator has the responsibility to present the necessary transcripts and materials to District pursuant to Board policy and procedures in order to maintain any current faculty service area or acquire faculty service areas.

16. **Return to Tenured Faculty Position.** If Administrator has tenure in the District, and if Administrator has not been dismissed pursuant to Section 20 of this Agreement, then Administrator will be entitled to return to a tenured faculty position upon termination or expiration of this Agreement.

17. **Dismissal or Imposition of Penalties During the Term of this Agreement.** Pursuant to Section 72411.5 of the *Education Code*, if Administrator does not have faculty tenure in the District, then the grounds for dismissal or for imposition of penalties on Administrator during the term of this Agreement shall be dishonesty, insubordination, incompetence, unsatisfactory performance, unprofessional conduct, inability to perform, persistent or serious violation of law or of Board Policy or procedures, or any material and substantial breach of this Agreement. Administrator shall be entitled to due process protections as required by law.

18. **Dismissal or Imposition of Penalties During the Term of this Agreement If Tenured.** Pursuant to Section 72411.5 of the *Education Code*, if Administrator has faculty tenure in the District, then the grounds for dismissal or for imposition of penalties on Administrator during the term of this Agreement shall be in accordance with the statutory provisions applicable to tenured faculty members as set forth in Section 87732 of the *Education Code*. Administrator shall be entitled to due process protections as required by law.

19. **Resignation.** Administrator may resign from District employment at any time during the term of this Agreement upon 90 days prior written notice to the Board of Trustees, or upon a shorter period of time as may be approved by the Board of Trustees.

20. **Buy-Out of Agreement.** Pursuant to Section 53260 of the *Government Code*, except if District terminates this Agreement pursuant to Sections 17 or 18 of this Agreement, the maximum cash settlement that Administrator may receive shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of Administrator multiplied by the number of months left on the unexpired term of this Agreement. However, if the unexpired term of this Agreement is greater than 18 months, the maximum cash settlement shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of Administrator multiplied by 18. Any cash settlement shall not include any other non-cash items except health benefits which may be continued for the same duration of time as covered in the settlement or until Administrator finds other employment, whichever comes first. If the unexpired term is greater than 18 months, then the maximum time for continued health benefits paid for by District shall be 18 months.

21. **Medical Examination.** Upon request of the Board of Trustees or the Chancellor, Administrator agrees to undergo a comprehensive physical and/or psychiatric examination to determine if Administrator is able, with or without reasonable accommodation, to perform the essential functions of the Position. The costs of any such examination shall be paid for by District. A confidential written report regarding any such examination shall be filed with the

Board of Trustees or the Chancellor indicating whether Administrator is able, with or without reasonable accommodation, to perform the essential functions of the Position.

22. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is ruled to be contrary to law, all other provisions of this Agreement shall continue to remain in full force and effect.

23. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties. There are no terms, conditions, or oral understandings not contained in this Agreement.

24. **Amendment.** This Agreement may be modified or superseded only by a written amendment executed by both Parties.

25. **Mandatory Mediation and Arbitration.** Except as otherwise prohibited by law, the Parties agree that any dispute, claim, or controversy arising out of the Parties' employment relationship, including, but not limited to, alleged violations of federal, state, or local statutes, including those prohibiting harassment and discrimination, and any other claims, including alleged violations of any provisions of the *Education Code*, which cannot be resolved through informal and confidential discussions, shall be submitted to mediation, and if mediation is unsuccessful, to binding arbitration before a neutral Arbitrator. The mediator and any necessary Arbitrator shall be selected through Judicial Arbitration & Mediation Services/Endispute (JAMS). Attachment "A" to this Agreement sets forth the procedures to be utilized and is hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement as if fully set forth within. The Parties agree that they have carefully read Attachment "A," knowingly agree to all of its contents, and knowingly agree to the covenant to mediate and arbitrate all employment disputes contained in Attachment "A".

26. **Ratification.** The Parties agree that this Agreement is not binding or enforceable unless and until it is duly ratified by the Board of Trustees.
