Modals *May, Might and Could* for Future Possibility

Affirmative Statements			
Subject	may/might/could*	Base form of verb	
I You (singular) He She It We You (plural) They	may might could	be	happy. successful.
Negative Statements			
Subject	may/might/could*	Base form of verb	
I You (singular) He She It We You (plural) They	may not might not could not	be	happy. successful.
* <i>May, might</i> and <i>could</i> are modals. These modals are used interchangeably because they have the same meaning. Modals have only one form; they don't have a third-person -s form. Also, the base form of the main verb <u>does not change</u> in sentences with modals.			

Modal *Should* for Advice and Probability

Subject	should/should not*	Base Form of Verb	
I You (singular) He She We You (plural) They	should should not	change look for	careers. a different job.
* <i>Should</i> is a modal. Modals have only one form; they don't have a third-person -s form. Also, the base form of the main verb <u>does not change</u> in sentences with modals.
